

GOLD HILL City 'Clean Up' Planned

Gold Hill - Mayor Milton Steinmetz and members of the city council made plans to make Gold Hill more attractive for Oregon's Centennial year at the last regular session of the council.

Superintendent Floyd Taylor was instructed to begin at once to clean up all alleys in the city and remove all brush which besides being unsightly, constitutes a fire hazard during the dry season.

Following a thorough discussion on the problems of how to dispose of large piles of combustible trash, such as shrub and tree trimmings, during the time it is not legal to burn such material on premises in the city, the council instructed Taylor to use the city truck once a month (probably on the first or second day of the month) to haul away the trash from homes and lots in the city, providing that no cans, bottles, metal material or cartons be included.

Mayor Steinmetz said that Pat's Sanitary service, Grants Pass, which has the franchise to haul all garbage materials in the city will haul, for a small additional charge, miscellaneous trash when prepared for hauling according to regulations. Residents of the city and officials have expressed appreciation for the outstanding cooperation and service provided by Pat's Sanitary service since they took over the garbage service here.

Officials of the local volunteer fire department have suggested that residents take advantage of the short time left before the fire season to eliminate fire hazards from their premises. Firemen wish to express their appreciation to residents for the fact that there have been no grass fires within the city limits during the past two summers.

Taylor reported to the council that in order to remove some stumps from the road around the hill below the reservoirs, some blasting powder would be needed.

Taylor was instructed by the council to make daily chlorine residual tests at four selected stations in Gold Hill and to turn in reports daily to the city recorder for entry on blanks supplied by the State Health department. This order is in compliance with a stricter state law. Taylor will be sent to the waterworks short school to be held in Corvallis March 23, 24 and 25.

The appointment of O. W. Newland and Paul Molloy by Mayor Steinmetz, naming them to serve a three year term on the city budget committee, was approved by the council and Floyd Lance was appointed to replace Delos Walker on the budget committee. Walker is now a member of the council. It was decided that safety factors would be the obligation of the owner when building a fence within the city limits.

Persons who were among those receiving notices last month from the city to remove debris from about their premises appeared before the council to get more information in regard to what the council expected them to do to comply with the order.

The council referred to the street committee a request by a property owner to have the alley behind his home made wider.

The Margaret E. Patrick school youngsters in Gold Hill held a rock gathering bee during clean-up week at the school.

Pupils of the first, second, and third grades picked up some two tons of gravel from the physical education field. Culminating the clean-up activity of these young citizens, was a treat of ice cream bars and a showing of the educational film, "Beaver Valley."

The rock piling was under the supervision of the classroom teachers, Mrs. Marie Brannock, Mrs. Cora MacDonaid, Mrs. Barbara Toner and Mrs. Wilda Franks. Custodian use of his pickup.
