Ike, Macmillan To Talk at Camp David

Washington—UPI—The White House announced today that the Berlin crisis conferences between President Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan will be held at Camp David, in the Catocin Mountains of Maryland.

Macmillan will arrive in Washington next Thursday. White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the President, Macmillan and their immediate staffs would go to Camp David the following day. They will confer at the secluded White House retreat Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Hagerty did not know whether Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, under treatment for cancer at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, would be able to attend the Camp David conferences.

Convicted Reds To Appeal Verdict

Denver—UPI—Six Communist conspiracy defendants found guilty in federal court Wednesday night in their second Smith Act trial said they will "appeal until we are vindicated."

U.S. District Judge Lee Knous granted the defendants' motion for five days in which to file for a new trial. Defense attorneys said all six verdicts would be appealed. They indicated that the appeals would be based on alleged errors during the six-week trial.

The defendants, who may be sentenced to five years in prison and fined \$5,000 each, are Harold Bary, San Jose, Calif.; Arthur Zepelin, Denver; Joseph and Maia Scherrer, New York; and Mrs. Patricia Blau, El Paso, Tex.

The six defendants had been found guilty in Denver federal court in 1955 of violating the Smith Act. They won a new trial.

Agreement Reached On Sale of Power

Portland—UPI—Power company officials agreed Wednesday to preliminary plans for proposed sale and delivery of federal surplus Columbia river power to California.

Bonneville Power Administrator William A. Pearl said sale proposals will be presented at a hearing scheduled by a subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs April 8-9 in Washington, D.C.

Pearl said BPA does not have any firm power available for sale to California but is negotiating with Pacific Gas and Electric to establish the best and most feasible potential market for available surplus power.

Good economic news spurred the market into new high ground, with individual gains in the main list running past three points.

Zenith, which has developed new flash X-ray equipment to study the burning patterns of solid fuel missile propellants, soared more than 15 points at its high and touched a new high. Motors moved within a fairly narrow range. Ford was the best performer following the announcement it will bring out an economy car in the 1960 model year. Chrysler also firmed on the indication it will follow Ford's lead.

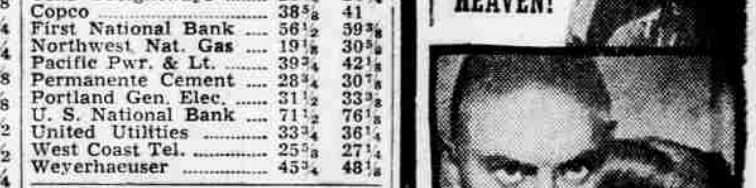
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
