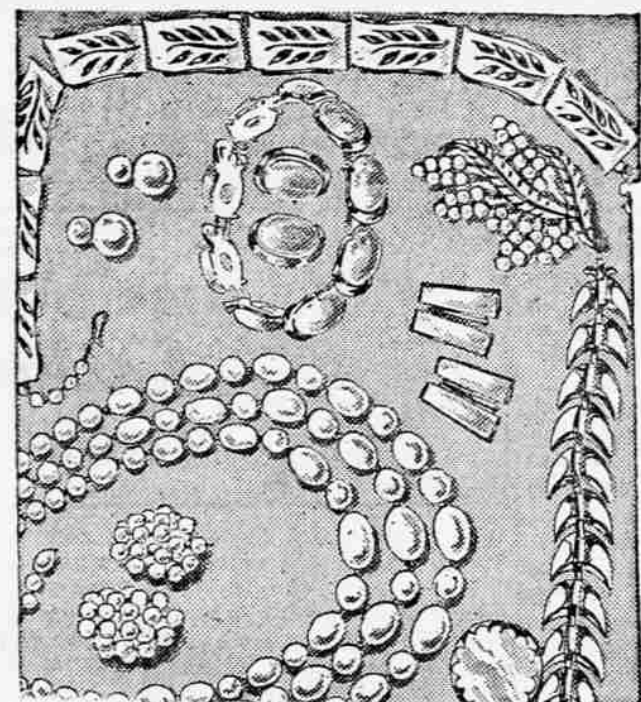

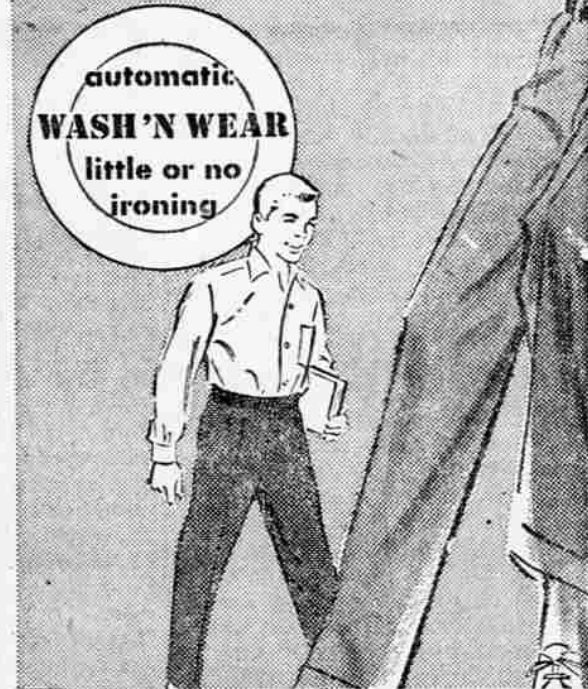

Crater FFA Members To Attend Meeting

Central Point—Twenty-four boys from the Crater Future Farmers of America chapter in Central Point plan to attend the state FFA convention in Corvallis, March 17 through March 21, according to Ed Griggs, vocational agriculture instructor and chapter advisor.

Among those attending will be three state farmer applicants from Crater—John Caster, Don Ryan and Jim Conger. Also, Jim Frink will be applying for the soil and water management award and Mike Redmond for the farm mechanics award. Competition for these awards will be carried to a national level. In these contests, first place award for the state winner will be \$100, winner at the regional level will receive \$250 and top man in the national management award is determined by how much is done in that field. Frink is caring for 100 acres of land plus several dairy animals. Redmond, seeking the farm mechanics award, owns a tractor and equipment, does custom farm work and works on his own project. Mike's value of farm equipment is \$4,000. He cares for his father's land and a herd of registered polled Herefords.

Don Denning, chapter reporter, will take a scrapbook of 70 pages filled with the chapter's achievement record. First place winner of this contest will be given a banner to place in the chapter room. Redmond will also be competing with his treasurer's book. In this he keeps records of the chapter budget which is well over \$2,000.

Talent Contest Set
Crater's talent team will be competing also. This includes Tommy Samples, Dennis Samples, Dennis Fisher, Leon Sherman and Floyd Sherman. The five guitar players will go to the state convention to compete with other Oregon districts. They are scheduled to perform Thursday, March 19. First, second and third place teams will receive banners.

The parliamentary team from the Crater high chapter will be participating also. This team recently took first place in the sectional contest held at Crater High school. The

chapter also took second place in the public speaking contest. Competition for this group is set for Wednesday, March 18. Six regulars competing on the team are John Caster, chairman, Pet Melstad, Nate Banry, Don Ryan, Dave Foote and Don Denning. Aim of the parliamentary activity is to develop rural leadership and train the boys to conduct a meeting.

Allen Barnes, chapter president, will go to the convention as district president and a member of the state executive council. John Caster, chapter vice president, is on the nominating committee for this year's state officers.

Russian Mars Experiment Seen As Tip on Plans

New York (Science Service)—Russian scientific experiments conducted high in the windswept Himalaya Mountains are believed to hold a key to Russian intentions of putting a man on Mars.

Dr. Lloyd Motz, associate professor of astronomy at Columbia University here, said Russian experiments have proved that animals can indeed live on Mars. He said the U.S.S.R.'s Himalayan laboratory reportedly reproduces conditions believed to exist on the red planet.

Believed Ahead
Dr. Motz believes the Russians still are ahead of the U.S. in space hardware, and that a Russian is likely to be the first man into space—agreeing in that respect with Dr. Fred Singer, physics professor at the University of Maryland. Dr. Singer has predicted the Russians will have launched a two-man satellite into orbit by this summer.

But Dr. James A. Van Allen, University of Iowa space scientist, has predicted the first U.S.-manned flights in a space capsule will come within a year to 18 months. Dr. Van Allen said a major problem to be solved is how to keep a man alive in the cylinder that would carry him into space.

Differences Cited
To substantiate his belief that Russia still leads the U.S. in space technology, Dr. Motz, however, cited payload differences between U.S. and Russian moon rockets. These payloads were 13 pounds versus 796 pounds, respectively.

"The energy required to launch the Russian satellite was more than 100 times greater. Our finer instruments cannot make up for such a vast difference in power," he said.

Dr. Motz predicted the first space voyager will land on the moon, but other landings eventually will be made on Mars, Venus, Mercury and Jupiter.

Fertilizer Sales Show State Drop

Salem — Based on inspection fee reports to the state department of agriculture, fertilizer sales of 182,687 tons in Oregon last year dipped 1000 tons from the 1957 high.

However, sales were up almost 50,000 from 1952, the first year of reporting. Sales of agricultural lime at 49,079 tons were off 303 tons and agricultural minerals were also down, from 15,197 tons a year earlier to 13,125 tons in 1958.
