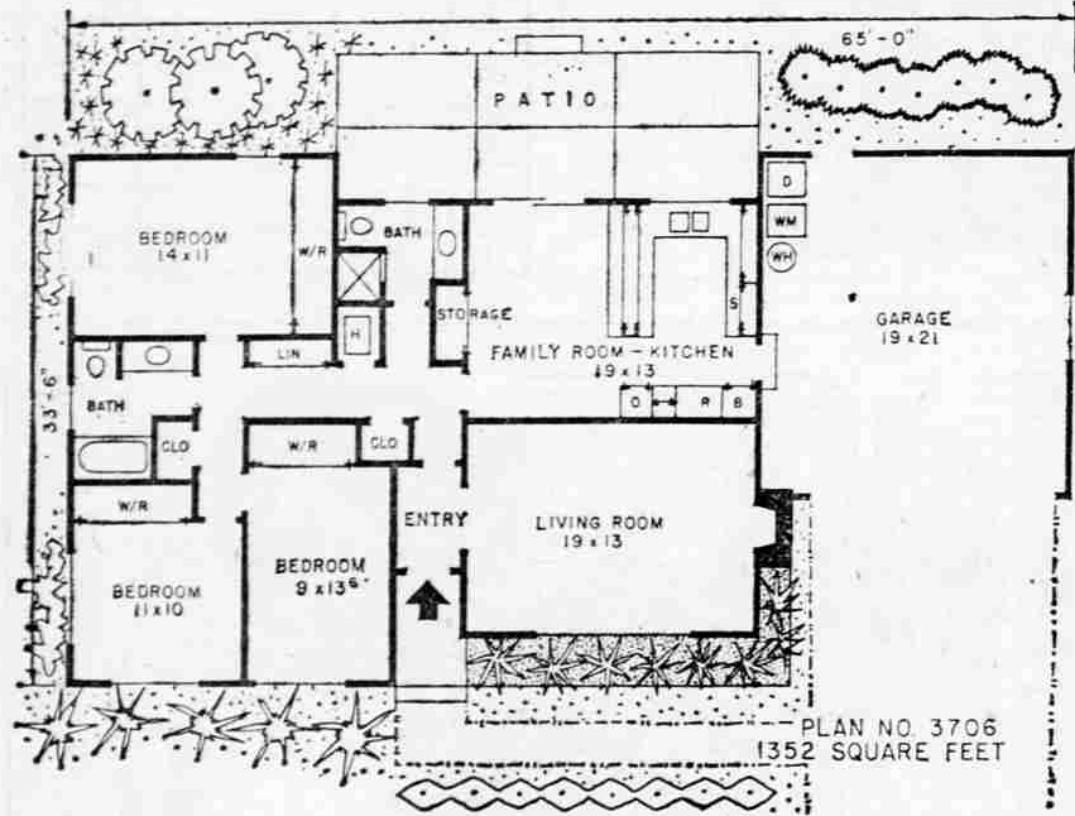
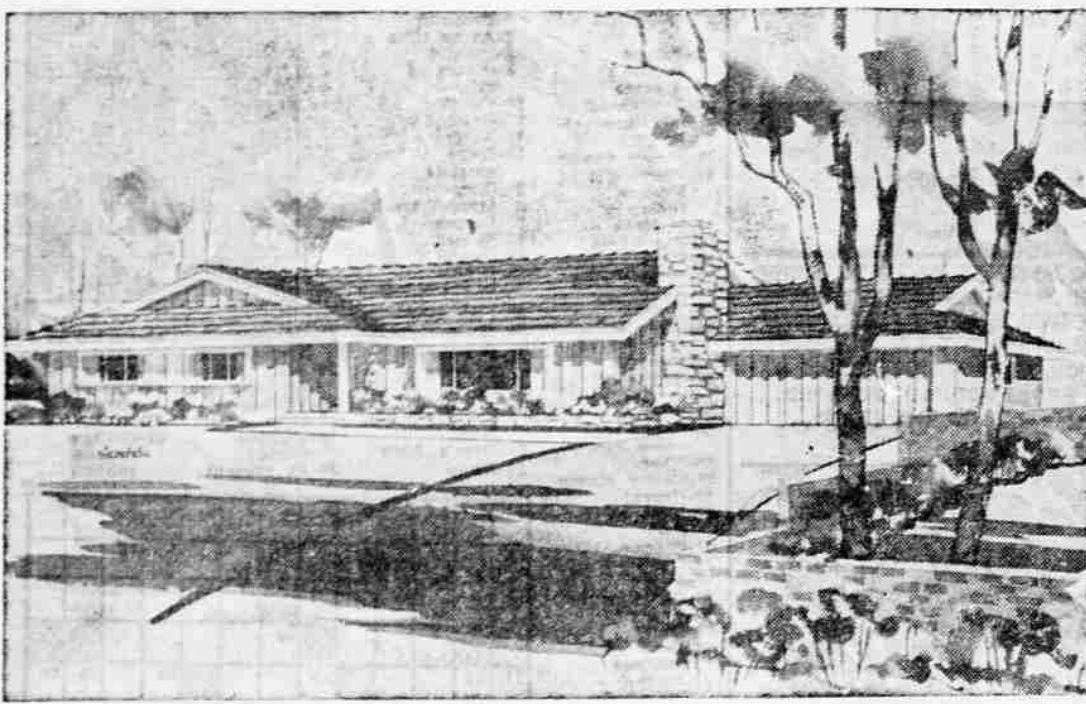


This Week's Home For Living

This versatile home was planned for a family of four yet it would be equally comfortable for a larger or smaller family. All areas radiate from a short center hall. The three bedrooms are well-proportioned with unbroken wall areas and high casement aluminum windows, below which furniture can be placed. Wardrobes are unusually large, and three extra closets and a linen closet open from the hall. At one end of the living room a big stone fireplace with a raised hearth is built flush with the wall. An opening in the wall next to the fireplace provides easy access to a wood box in the garage. Broad windows across the front of the living room offer a broad view of the street.

Family living will center mostly in the big family

room, kitchen and patio area. The work center of the kitchen is U-shaped, providing an exceptional amount of counter surface and cupboard space. The family room boasts a large storage closet which includes a built-in table, drawers and shelves. This spot could be used for swing, keeping family records, a game area, or a general storage closet. An eating bar between the family room and kitchen offers a place to serve quick meals and snacks. Cupboards above open to both sides. The range and separate oven are built in.

Double sliding glass doors open between the family room and partially roofed patio. A door from the kitchen opens directly into the double garage, where the washer, dryer and water heater are located. Hand-hewn shakes, a large

stone planter, and vertical siding are combined in a modern ranch style exterior suitable to either a city or suburban setting.
