

Senate Calls on Congress To Give Aid To Education

Salem—UPI—The Oregon Senate has called on Congress to provide federal aid for elementary and secondary education.

The Senate late Thursday, after prolonged debate, voted 18-10 in favor of the House memorial.

Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D-Milwaukie) said there need be no fear of federal control of schools if aid were given.

Points To Programs
The federal aid concept has long been in vogue in this state," Sweetland said as he pointed to Hill-Burton funds for hospital construction, federal aid for welfare, highway construction and to various segments of the educational program.

While he admitted that the memorial was a popular one, Sen. Carl Francis (R-Dayton) said he opposed it because it carried with it "some dangerous implications."

Francis declared that federal subsidies lead to federal control.

With only one dissenting vote, the Senate passed a bill which provides that no greater than one-third of state funds on deposit in banks and trust companies at any one time shall be deposited by the state treasurer in any one bank or trust company.

Sen. Alfred Corbett (D-Portland) alone voted against the measure.

Carried by Groener
The bill was carried on the Senate floor by Sen. Richard Groener (D-Milwaukie) who said the United States National Bank of Portland had \$18,940,000 of state funds on deposit while the First National Bank of Portland had \$18,950,000.

"But the independent banks, chartered by the state have only \$1,050,000 of state funds on deposit," Groener said.

Corbett expressed fear that some future state treasurer "less respected than the present occupant of that office" might take one-third of the state funds and deposit them in some small bank in the state.

Precision Flier Killed in Jump

Nellis AFB, Nev. —UPI—A member of the Air Force's famed Thunderbird jet precision flying team was killed Thursday when he was forced to bail out of his craft in an in-flight collision.

Capt. Charles B. (Fish) Salmon, 30, Port Jervis, N.Y., winner of the Distinguished Flying Cross in Korea, fell to his death in a rugged area about 12 miles from this base on the outskirts of Las Vegas.

The Air Force said Salmon was killed either because his parachute did not open or because of injuries received when it brought him down in mountainous terrain.

More Control Urged Over Road Group

Salem—UPI—More legislative control over the programs, policies and administration of the State Highway Department is sought by Sen. R. F. Chapman (D-Coos Bay) in a resolution reported out favorably by the Senate and Federal Affairs Committee Thursday.

The resolution now goes to the Ways and Means Committee for a \$10,000 appropriation. It calls for an interim committee to go into all aspects of the Highway Department's operations and to report back with recommendations to the 1961 Legislature.
