Catholic Order To Give Concert For Centenary

Portland—Famed choral director Roger Wagner will conduct a special Holy Name centenary concert featuring two original orchestral works and a 175-voice chorus here May 1 at the Portland Civic auditorium.

Director Wagner, widely known for his popular recording, stage, radio and television group, the Roger Wagner Chorus, will lead a group of 250 musicians, largely composed of students from Holy Names schools in Portland, Spokane, Seattle, Astoria, Eugene, Medford and Salem.

A 75-piece orchestra, including 27 players from the Portland Symphony orchestra, will play two original compositions by members of the Maryhurst College faculty.

Performances of three movements from "Chronicle of Creation," an orchestral suite composed by Sister M. Anne Cecile, and the "Magnificat," a choral work by Sister Mary Teresine, will highlight the concert.

The 175-voice chorus will present a diversified program of American and European folk songs and religious music, including such favorites as the Gregorian "Ave Maria," Mozart's "Alleluia" and "Black Is the Color of My True Love's Hair," a traditional mountain love lament.

In addition to his recording and choral activities, Mr. Wagner is well known as a composer-lecturer and is currently director of choral music at UCLA.

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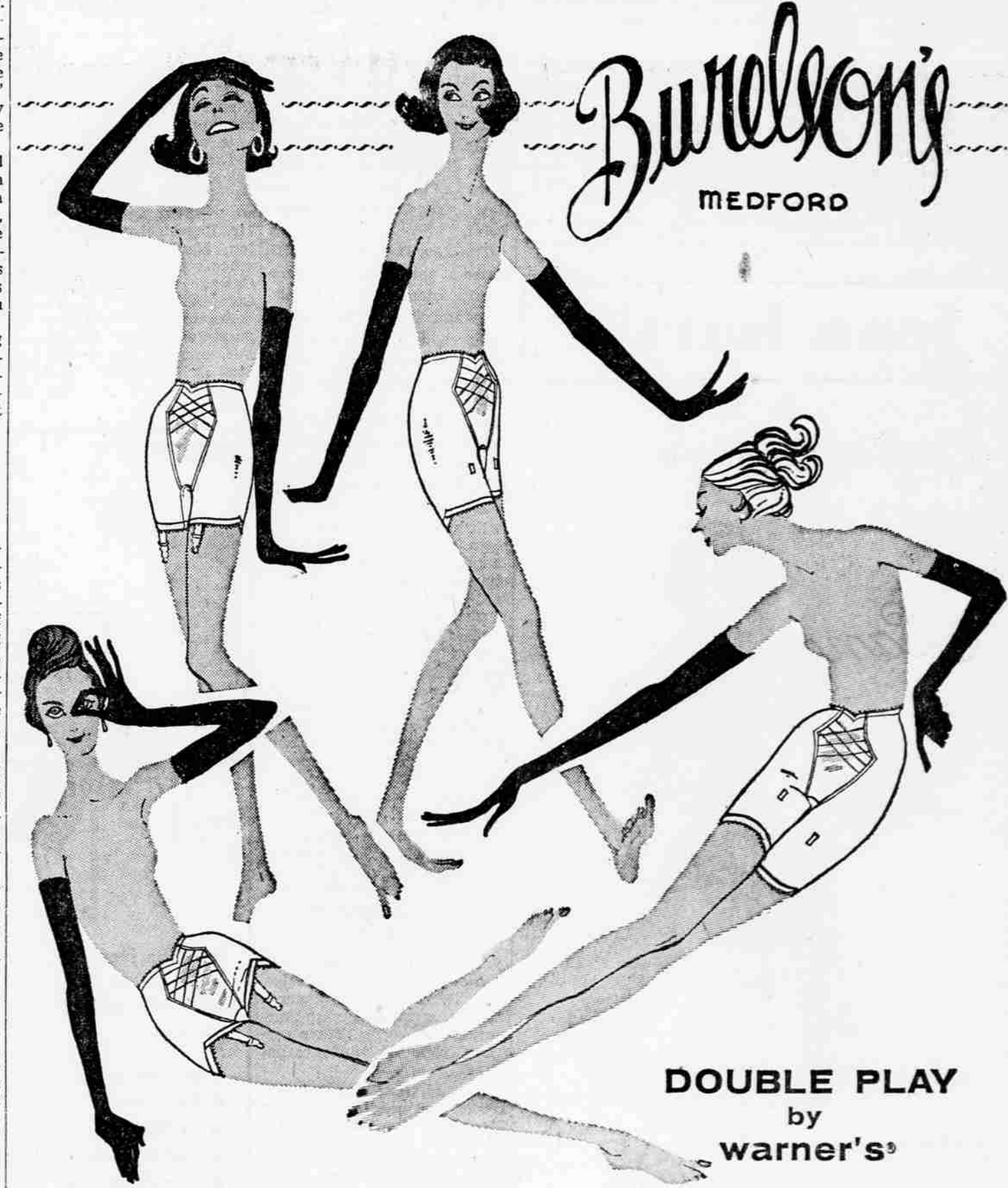
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
