Orchestra Schedules Concert

Portland — The Portland Symphony orchestra, conducted by Theodore Bloomfield, will present an all-orchestral program for its next-to-last subscription concert of the season on March 23.

The program will be climaxed with a performance of the Brahms "Symphony No. 4 in E Minor" after opening with Wolf-Ferrari's sparkling Overture to "The Secret of Suzanne."

Seven first chair members of the orchestra will perform the Concerto for Seven Wind Instruments, Strings and Percussion by Frank Martin. John May, Flute; Felix Katus, Oboe; Catherine Moore, Clarinet; Margery Smith, Bassoon; John Waitt, French horn; James Smith, Trumpet; and John Trudeau, Trombone, will be featured in this unusual work, a first performance in Portland.

Also to receive its initial public performance here is Aaron Copland's suite from the ballet, "Billy the Kid." This descriptive suite, written in 1938, concerns itself with significant moments in the life of Billy, ending when the posse catches up with him.

The Brahms playing is significant to some because it was back in 1954 when Bloomfield was one of a series of guest conductors with the Portland symphony, this work was performed. This playing will provide some measure of the orchestra's progress during the four years of the conductor's leadership. He leaves to conduct the Rochester Philharmonic at the close of this season, with the Italian conductor, Piero Bellugi, signed to take over the Portland orchestra.

Tickets for all concerts are on sale at J. K. Gill box office beginning Thursday prior to each concert or may be placed in advance by writing the symphony office in the Park building.

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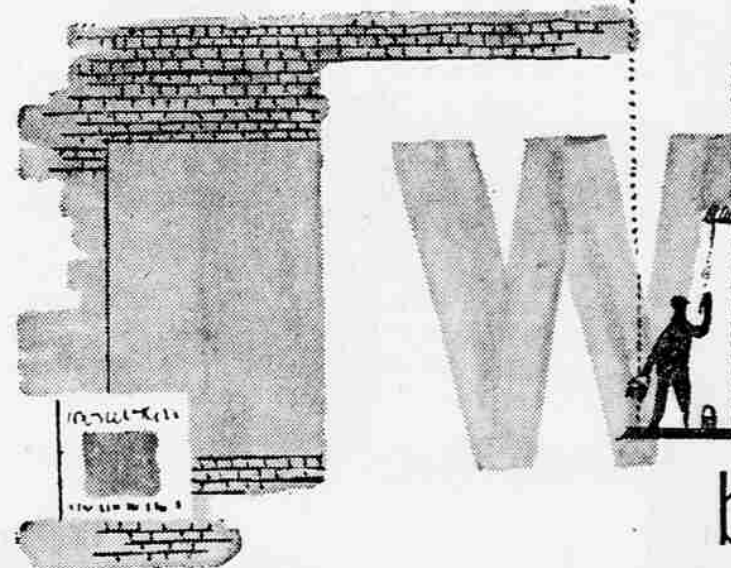
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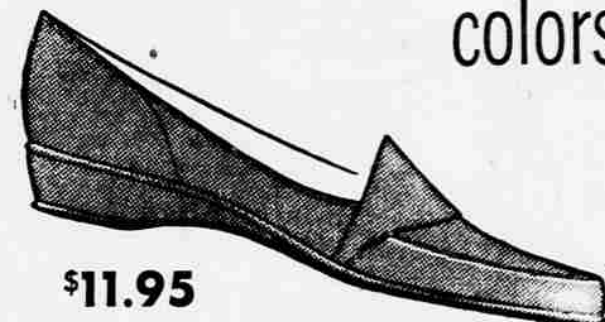


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
