

Cincinnati, Bradley Favorites In College Tourneys; Bearcats Oust Top-Ranked Kansas State

Cincinnati and Bradley, who waged a bitter title fight in the Missouri Valley conference race, were clearly stamped as favorites today in the two biggest post-season basketball tournaments—but look out for those upstart teams like Louisville.

The NCAA tourney champ will be crowned Saturday.

night in Louisville, Ky.—and right now the experts figure it will be national scoring king Oscar Robertson and his Cincinnati Bearcat playmates.

The National Invitation tournament will conclude with a nationally televised game Saturday afternoon—and top-seeded Bradley still is the pick to become champion for the second time in three years.

What does form mean after the way early-round games have been going in both tournaments? Who could figure that Louisville, with 10 losses, would whip both Kentucky and Michigan State?

The four regional winners in the NCAA pair off Friday night at Louisville this way: For eastern title—West Virginia (27-4) vs. Louisville (19-10).

For western title—Cincinnati (25-3) vs. California (23-4).

Only Top Team Alive
Cincinnati, which handed nationally top-ranked Kansas State an 85-75 whipping in the Lawrence, Kan., regional Saturday night, is the highest ranked team (No. 4) left alive in the competition. That, and Robertson, make them the choice.

Robertson was outscored by All-American Bob Boozer of K-State, 31-24, in their personal duel but State paid the penalty for concentrating on stopping "the big O"—Oscar's pass-offs set up teammates for 26 additional points.

Louisville, conquerer of second-ranked Kentucky Friday night, amazed again by blasting third-ranked Michigan

State, 88-81, once again Peck Hickman's Cardinals came from behind with hot shooting—.571 against Kentucky, 543 led Michigan State. State led 43-40, at intermission but Hickman "made some adjustments" and Louisville opened the second half with 12 straight points and even a 29-point performance by State ace Johnny Green couldn't stop the Cards.

Louisville Redhot
Despite its poor overall record due to a 5-6 slump in December, Louisville is red-hot now with 10 wins in the last 11 games.

West Virginia was hard-pressed to beat Boston University, 86-82, in the Charlotte, N.C., regional finals and once again, as in the Friday win over St. Joseph's, the Mountaineers were saved by All-American Jerry West. This time West tallied 33 points and now has 94 in three tourney games.

California will toss the nation's No. 1 defense 51.56 points per game and a 14-game winning streak at scoring champ Robertson. The Bears shackled St. Mary's (Calif.), 66-46, in the San Francisco regional finals Saturday.

Bradley Impressive Winner
Bradley, 1957 NIT champion, was an impressive 83-77 winner over Butler in its quarter-final game at Madison Square Garden Saturday night. The Braves, who lost out to Cincinnati in the Missouri Valley race on the last day of the season, blew almost all of an early 11-point lead but showed real class in rallying to win comfortably, led by Ben Smith's 24 points.

Mac-Hi and Myrtle Creek were the early favorites. The Mac-Hi team from eastern

Oregon had only a 9-8 worst record for the season, but played a tougher schedule than did many of the other entries. The Pioneers also have a veteran team with a starting lineup of five seniors.

Myrtle Creek, from southern Douglas county, rolled up an impressive 23-1 mark for the season, best of the field.

Other season's records include Philomath 19-3; Junction City 17-7; Newport 20-4; Stayton 18-2; Seaside 17-5 and Coquille 20-3.

Stayton has all-state Mike Cruson back again this season but he suffered a leg injury against Canby 11 days ago and is not in top shape.

Gary Bogle leads the well-liked Mac-Hi team. He's scored 412 points this season. Coquille, which might be called the host team, is led by Jim Jarvis, son of Coach Curt Jarvis, who has scored 528 points in 23 games this season.

CBS Tells Plan For Broadcast Of Baseball

New York—UPI—The "Game of the Week" program to be televised by the Columbia Broadcasting system during the coming major league baseball season actually will be two games per week, according to plans announced today.

CBS said it will telecast a big league game every Saturday and Sunday afternoon this year, starting on April 11, with 25 Saturday games running through Sept. 26 and 24 Sunday games running through Sept. 20. Games at New York, April 11-12, between the Yankees and the Boston Red Sox will inaugurate the series.

The series will be telecast nationally except into major league cities in which a game is in progress. Telecasts are "blackout" within 50 miles of cities in which the game being televised is being played.

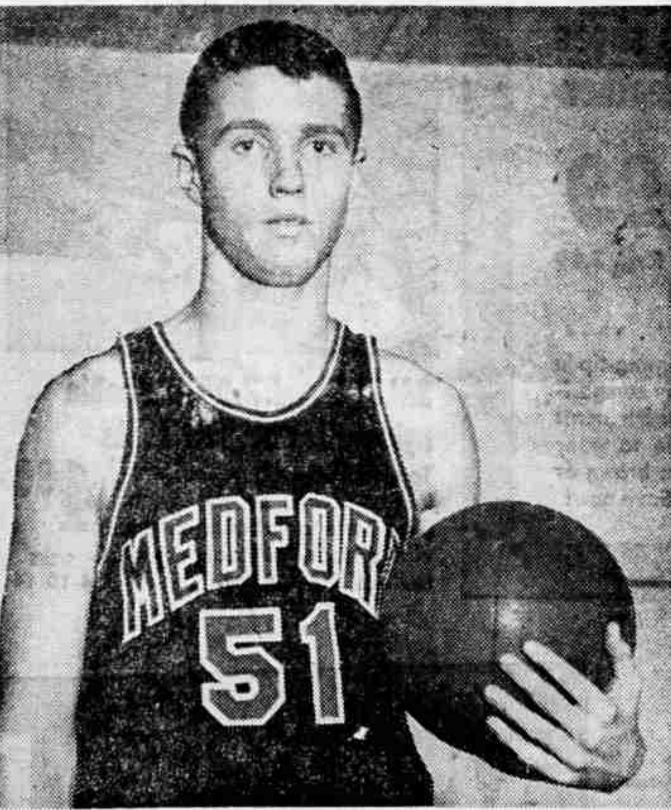

The Western first-round series, however, stalled in a 1-1 deadlock when the Detroit Pistons, who dropped the opener, bounced back on their home court to beat the Minneapolis Lakers, 117-103, despite a 26-point, 16-rebound performance by the Lakers' Elgin Baylor.

The Nats open the Eastern finals against rebounding star Russell and his Boston Celtic teammates Wednesday night at Boston.

Detroit and Minneapolis will clash in their series-deciding game Wednesday night in Minneapolis with the winner earning the right to meet the St. Louis Hawks in the Western finals.
