State Police Head Having Troubles, Senate Informed

Salem--(UPI)--Sen. Richard Groener (D-Milwaukee) has declared in the Senate that Superintendent of State Police H. G. Maison "is in a quandary as to whether to fire state police officer Wallace A. Ummel for fear that he might admit that he railroaded state police officer Robert Wampler out of the department."

Groener said that Ummel, who is under suspension from the state police, was one of the main witnesses against Wampler last year when his case was heard by a special state police board of appeals.

Asked to Watch

"I ask the members of this Senate and the governor to watch what Superintendent Maison does in the case of officer Ummel," Groener said. Groener is author of a Senate joint resolution authorizing appointment of interim committee to investigate the state police. This resolution is now being considered by the Senate committee on state and federal affairs.

A bill allowing insurance companies to place an endorsement on insurance policies saying such policies will not cover losses resulting from atomic attacks was introduced.

May Attach Rider

The bill also provides that if an insurance company elects to make this coverage it may do so by a rider attached to the policy.

Anthony Yturri (R-Ontario) and Rep. Ed Oakes (R-Ontario) introduced a bill under which county courts may borrow money on short term notes to construct courthouses, providing that such authority has first been gained from the voters.

Authority to construct an armory on the State Fair grounds, if Marion county and the city of Salem formulate satisfactory financing plans, is given in a bill introduced by Joint Ways and Means committee.

Editors note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Eloise R. -- We must help them. John R. -- Let them live in their nightmare.

Eloise R. -- I thought things like this only happened in books -- the worst kind of that. It's hard to believe it has actually happened to us.

Three years ago my 23-year-old son John married a very attractive girl of his own age. They now have a year-old son. I thought their lives were wonderfully happy until one day John came to me in tears and asked whether I realized what was going on.

It turns out that John's wife and my husband have had a thing going on for the past year. They both want divorces and they want to get married. I feel that they have both lost their minds and we must stand by and help them. But John says we must give them divorces.

John R. -- I certainly don't want to have anything to do with my wife again as long as I live and I don't see how my mother can feel any differently about my father. It would be different if it was a stranger involved, but this way what kind of life can there be for any of us?

Mother and Dad have been married for 30 years and they have always been very happy. I know that Dad wasn't a gadabout, but something crazy has just gotten at him -- and I think it's my wife. She just doesn't know what she wants.

At first I thought I was going to kill the two of them, but now I feel I want to see them live in the nightmare they have created. That would be the worst punishment.

The Council: John is quite right about the punishment he has devised for the culprits in this miserable affair. Marriage to one another is about the worst thing that could happen to them.

However, natural as it is for John to want this vengeance, it is not his business to measure out punishments. He is too intimately involved to sit in the seat of justice.

John's problem and his mother's problem is to figure out a way of dealing with their torn and tangled lives from here on.

We believe that one step in the right direction would be to get rid of some of the entanglements by cutting the two problems away from one another. They must stop talking in terms of what "we" should do or not do. John should not presume to advise his mother and Eloise should pull herself out of John's affairs as far as possible.

Eloise, happily married to one man for 30 years, has a special kind of problem. She has a rich reservoir of past associations to draw upon. If her husband retains any flashes of clear-mindedness at this point, he is undoubtedly suffering severely and knows that he is drowning in a violent sea. He may give himself up without struggle to the hand that reaches out to save

Americans Earn At Record Rate

Washington --(UPI)--Americans earned money at a record rate last month and the output of the nation's factories climbed back almost to the pre-recession level.

In separate reports the Federal Reserve Board said industrial production rose for the 10th consecutive month and the Commerce Department said personal income climbed to an all-time annual rate of \$364,500,000,000.

Incomes were \$1,500,000,000 higher than the January rate and \$17 million above the recession low of February a year ago. The increase resulted largely from payroll hikes and higher Social Security benefits.

The production index, based on a 1947-49 average of 100, moved up to 144. This was one point below the pre-recession level of August, 1957, and two points below the all-time high of February, 1957.

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Smoking May Cost Mayor School Job

Monroe, Ore. --(UPI)--The mayor of Monroe may lose his job as a school teacher and basketball coach because he smokes.

Stephen A. Beck, who was elected mayor of this community of 370 south of Corvallis, has been notified his contract will not be renewed by the Monroe Union High School Board of Directors. The board acted on recommendation of Principal Donovan Kimball.

Orvin Hought, who is circulating a petition for a review of the school board's action, said the reason behind dropping Beck was "because he smokes."

Under Beck, the Monroe High basketball team had its best record in several years in the past season. It lost the league title by one point in the final game with Mapleton.

Beck was elected mayor last November in a stiff race with a Monroe oil distributor. Beck said he was uncertain whether he would continue as mayor when the school term is over in June.

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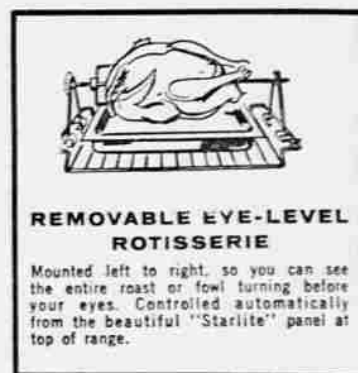

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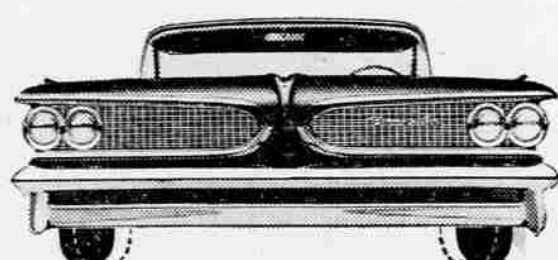
