

Rogue Valley Club to Be Host For Pro-Am Golf Sweepstake

One of the major golf events of 1959 at Rogue Valley Country club is scheduled on Tuesday, March 24. On that date 25 professionals from 12 Oregon and two southwest Washington communities will contend in the final round of a three-day tournament. It will bring some of the top amateurs in Oregon to compete with them. The event will be the pro-amateur sweepstakes of the Oregon division of the Professional Golfers association. Competition will start on Sunday, March 22, with play at Roseburg Country club. On Monday action will move to Oak Knoll club, Ashland.

Each of the professionals will be paired with four amateurs for best play ball. Each will bring two amateurs from his own club and the host course will provide the other two.

In addition to cash provided from entry fees, pros will contend for \$600 in an added purse. Of this total \$200 will come from each of the three clubs. Of each club's share

Admission of two more teams to the Rogue Valley baseball league will be the main topic of discussion at a meeting of team representatives to be held at the Cave Shop in Grants Pass Sunday. The meeting is set for 2 p.m.

The Klamath Cubs and Kingsley Air Base, both of Klamath Falls, have applied to the league for admittance, according to Harry Chipman, league president. The Cubs played in the Northern California league last year.

The 1959 schedule and obtaining of umpires also is expected to occupy a considerable portion of the meeting time.

Teams currently making up the league are Ashland, Camp White, Butte Falls, Grants Pass, Cave Junction and Riddle.

3 Lakes Back In Production

Portland - Coastal anglers will have three additional lakes to try their luck on opening day, April 25. These waters are Lost, Earhart, and Georgia lakes located south of Florence between Siltcoos and Tahkenitch lakes.


All of these lakes will be back in trout production this year following experimental toxaphene tests by the game commission during the past year. The lakes are the first in Oregon to be successfully treated with this new chemical.

The lakes were chemically treated in February of 1958, each with different concentrations of toxaphene to determine lethal amounts on fish as well as plankton, bottom organisms, and other fish foods. Many tests were made throughout the year using live fish to determine the longevity of the chemical in each body of water. Chemical properties of the waters were recorded before, throughout, and after the treatment.

In January of this year, the lakes were restocked with equal numbers of cutthroat and rainbow trout in each body of water. The trout averaged five to the pound which would put them in the 8-inch class. Each lake received about 200 fish per surface acre of water. Tests will continue throughout the summer to determine which species of trout gives the greatest return to the angler.

Klamath Falls Edges Astoria In First Round

Eugene - (UPI) - Defending champion Klamath Falls edged Astoria in a 41-39 thriller and Sandy stunned highly-favored Jefferson of Portland 59-50 in first round action at the Oregon Class A-1 high school basketball tournament Tuesday night.

Six games were scheduled today with Marshfield playing St. Helens and North Salem meeting Baker in morning contests.

A howling crowd of 6000 saw Astoria barely miss a tie with Klamath Falls at the final gun as Gordon Scott sank a desperation 40-foot shot. The timers ruled he cast off a fraction of a second too late.

Sandy was led by Ed Hoffman and Bill Henselman in knocking off the Portland champions. Hoffman scored 22 points and Henselman 16.

Astoria, rated the state's top team, meets Jefferson in a consolation game Thursday morning while Klamath Falls and Sandy meet Thursday afternoon for a semi-final berth.

Coach Jerry Mosby of Astoria agreed with the officials' decision that Scott's shot came just after the final buzzer.

Klamath Falls was ahead most of the game—11-9 at the quarter. At one point in the third period it was 33-22.

Invitational Tourney In Semi Finals

New York - (UPI) - The National Invitation Basketball tournament, true to its upstart tradition, headed today for a surprise semi-final with Bradley the only seeded team still "alive" and Providence the merriest madcaps of them all.

"How the heck did we do it? I don't know," shouted Coach Joe Mullane of Providence in the wild jubilation following the Friars' double-overtime, 75-72 upset of third-seeded St. Louis Tuesday night.

A crowd of 14,269 at Madison Square Garden roared at the Friar triumph and then shuffled their feet uneasily through the second game as New York University drubbed fourth-seeded Oklahoma City, 63-48, in the most lopsided game in this year's tourney.

Providence earned the right to meet St. John's which previously ousted third-seeded St. Bonaventure in one semi-final Thursday night while NYU qualified for a tussle with top-seeded Bradley.

Providence seemed beaten at least twice by St. Louis, a team which boasted a two-inch-per-man height advantage and one of the nation's top "big" men in 6-8 Bob Ferry. The Billikens took an 18-9 early lead only to have Providence tie it at 18-18. St. Louis led 33-30, early in the second half but the Friars came back again.

Mac-Hi In Title Wrap-up For Cagers

Coos Bay - (UPI) - The Mac-Hi Pioneers will try to wrap up a second straight Oregon high Umattilla county tonight when they meet Newport in the final game of the class A-2 tournament here.

Mac-Hi mowed down Coquille 66-51 and Newport moved into the finals by downing Philomath 55-43 Tuesday night.

Last week Pilot Rock of Umattilla county won the class B championship at Bend.

Junction City and Stayton play this afternoon for the consolation crown while Coquille meets Philomath tonight for third place before the Mac-Hi - Newport game.

Junction City eliminated Myrtle Creek 61-43 and Stayton bounced back from its 20-point performance against Mac-Hi Monday by drubbing Seaside 56-44.

Gary Bogle, Mac-Hi's slender forward, paced a fourth-quarter drive that carried the Pioneers to victory over the tough Coquille team. Bogle got a dozen points in the final quarter as Mac-Hi overcame a 46-44 deficit.

Bogle had 25 and Mickey Gillette 20 for the winners while Don Purvis got 17 for Coquille. Mac-Hi led at the half 30-26, although Coquille had an early 8-0 lead.

Newport fell behind Philomath early in their game but moved ahead 23-17 at the half. Philomath missed nine of its first 10 free throws.


Herb Harms hit 13 and Phil Barnett and Cliff Hunter a dozen each for Newport while Phil Davis had 12 for Philomath.

Stayton moved into a quick 16-6 lead over the surprised Seaside team and at one point was ahead 45-21 in the third quarter. Mike Vermillion of Seaside, who had 39 points Monday, was held to only 7. Don Bomberger with 17 and Dick Sherman with 16 led Stayton.

Junction City had little trouble in downing Myrtle Creek. The Lane county team got 21 points from Robbie Snow and 16 from Frank Burgess. It was only the third defeat of the season for Myrtle Creek, which lost to Philomath Monday and one game during the regular season to Newport.

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Bullshivics Winners in Cage Loop

Bullshivics defeated the Roses 37 to 30 yesterday afternoon for the recreation basketball league championship at Medford senior high school.

Bob Pond led the champs with 12 points and Gary Cummings scored 10 for the Roses.

The Bullshivics were unbeaten in regular season play, capturing the morning circuit of the Saturday league with 10 straight triumphs. Only one loss was suffered by the Roses in winning the afternoon league. They had seven victories in the loop.

The Hoopsters nicked the Roses 24 to 22 last Saturday in the last regular afternoon league fracas for the two clubs. In other combats the Bullshivics dumped the Horde 40 to 29, the Bony Five clipped the Buzzards 61 to 28 and the Blobs beat the Bachelors 37 to 26. The Misfits took a win by default from the Things.

With the three leading scorers in morning play, the Bullshivics averaged 50 points per game in their circuit. The Roses topped afternoon play with 36 per conflict.
