Matt Johnson returned Friday from a visit to Hayward, Calif., bringing with him his new bride and her 18-year-old son, Jim Hamilton.

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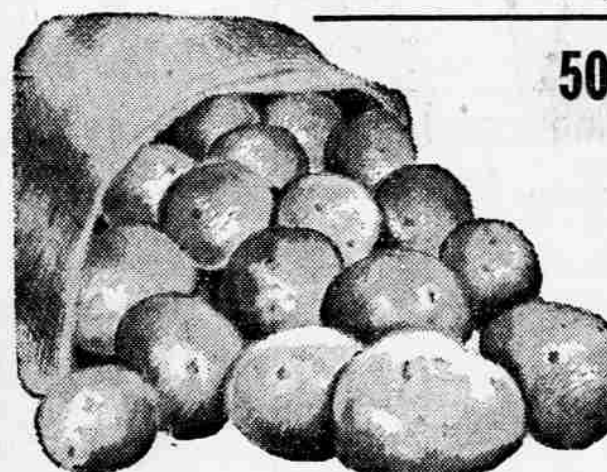
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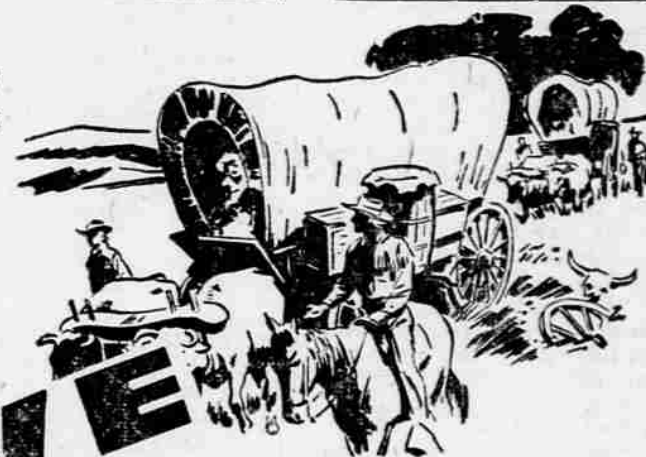
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
