Vacuum Cleaner Pump Saves Man

Honolulu—UPI—A young doctor, an enterprising destroyer crew and a makeshift pump fashioned from vacuum cleaner parts were credited today with saving the life of a gravely ill seaman in the Pacific.

The 21-year-old apprentice seaman was rushed to Pearl Harbor Wednesday night aboard the destroyer USS Cowell, suffering from pneumonia and a heart condition.

The victim, whose name was withheld pending notification of kin, was reported in "grave" condition at Tripler Army Hospital.

The Navy credited Lt. A. H. Fix, 29, of Long Beach, Calif., with saving the seaman's life. Fix, in turn, credited the 240-man crew of the Cowell for his cooperation.

The seaman was stricken Monday while the vessel was en route to Pearl Harbor from Pago Pago.

In a desperate effort to save his life, Fix made an incision in the youth's throat—and the Cowell's shipfitters and corpsmen fashioned a pump from a vacuum cleaner. Fix inserted a vacuum cleaner nozzle into the incision to pump liquid from the patient's lungs.

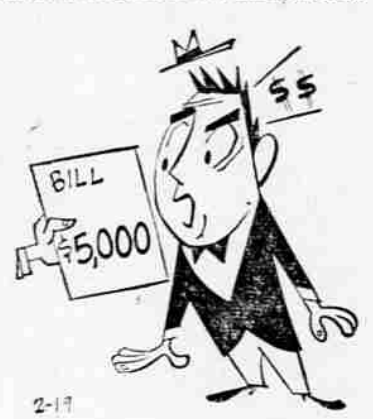
Try and Stop Me
