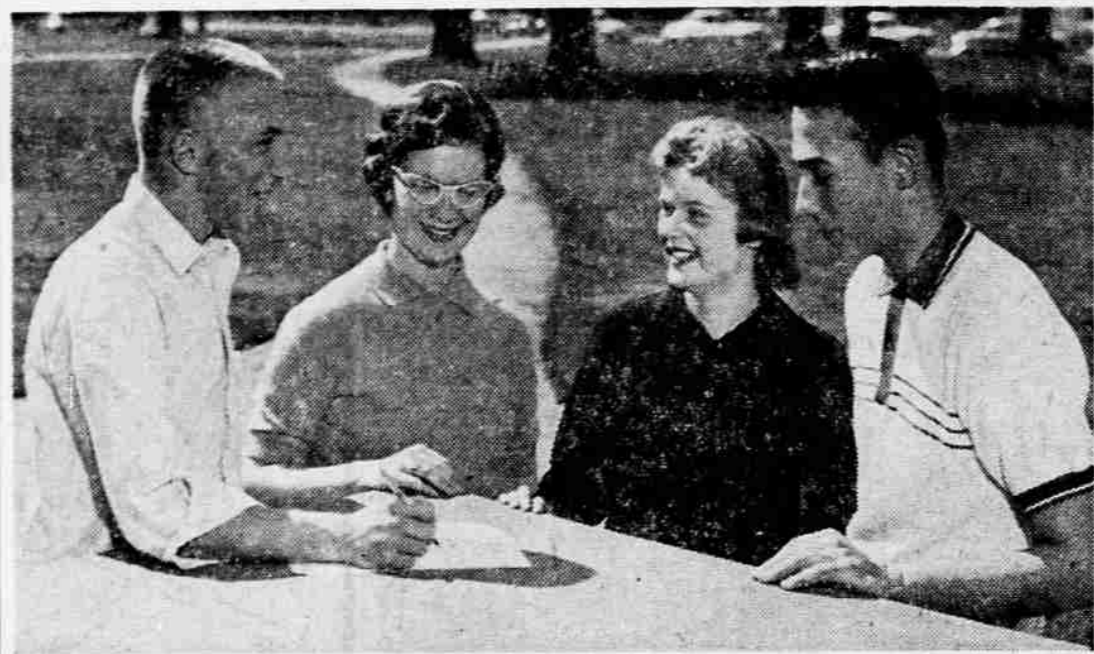

## The Family Council

**Editor's note:** The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

**Mr. J. F.** — Ruth's place is with her husband.

**Mrs. J. F.** — She's safer under our roof.

**Ruth R.** — They can't boss me anymore.

**Mr. J. F.** — Our daughter Ruth eloped six months ago at the age of 16. She married her high school boy friend who was just 18 and she went to live near his service base.

A month ago she came home and said that she wanted to finish high school and stay with us until she and her husband can make a home together. She said she could hardly ever see him and she was very lonely down in this town where she was staying. Since she has come back she has been going out with some of her old girl friends and hangs around the corner drug store with them. I feel that she will get into trouble and get a bad reputation in no time. Now that she is married her place is with her husband.

**Mrs. J. F.** — I think there is more chance of Ruth's getting into trouble if she is left all alone more than half the time and hasn't anything to do. She was working for a while at her husband's base, but then they laid off most of the civilians and she wasn't

able to get a full-time job in town.

I think it's very good that she wants to finish high school and it's much better that she is safe under our roof than off somewhere on her own.

**Ruth R.** — What is all this talk about "getting into trouble?" I am a married woman and I know what I'm doing and I have a right to do as I please. I am going to get a part-time job and pay my own board. They can't boss me around the way they used to before.

**The Council:** We agree with Ruth that there is a little too much stress on the possibility of her "getting into trouble." But there is also too little stress on the positive side of what she is going to do about her future.

Ruth has apparently found that marriage is not quite as simple as she had expected. Her parents can take it for granted that there is a lot more behind her leaving her husband than she cares to admit even to herself. Probably she is ashamed and afraid to discuss the whole story with them.

We don't think that an insistence that "her place" is with her husband will help clear up Ruth's difficulties any more than simply offering her a temporary haven in her parents' home. She needs to grow up and the normal teen-age routes of sociability and dating are closed to her. She childishly refuses to accept this, but she has to be made aware of it, not through criticism of her pathetic attempt to re-establish relationships with her old girl friends, but through some positive guidance toward a different goal.

Schooling and work experience are more important to Ruth now than ever, so she should be encouraged in these plans. Since she is already speaking of the home she hopes to make after her husband comes out of the service, she should also be encouraged to learn as much as possible about the domestic arts. This can be a very absorbing activity if it is approached seriously. Ruth could take courses in home decoration and nutrition.

As she learns and matures, Ruth will build up an enthusiasm for establishing that dream home with her husband and she will gradually lose interest in her more childish activities.

### First Aid Course Set at Gold Hill

Gold Hill — A five-session first aid course will begin Wednesday, March 25, at 8 p.m. in the Gold Hill Boy Scout hall, it was announced Friday.

The course, sponsored by the Gold Hill Explorer Scouts, is a Red Cross accredited first aid course, an Explorer official said. Ralph Merton, California Oregon Power company employee, will be instructor. The course will be held every Wednesday for five weeks without charge. Everyone in the Gold Hill area is invited to attend.

The course is part of an over-all plan by the Gold Hill Explorers to develop personnel trained to operate a small mobile rescue unit. Future plans include courses in aquatic life-saving and all phases of first aid.
