Fight Shapes Over Foreign Aid Funds

Washington — (UPI) — A bitter floor fight shaped up in the House Tuesday over President Eisenhower's plea for more foreign aid funds.

A nip-and-tuck battle was in prospect as administration backers tried to persuade the House to override its appropriations committee and provide at least \$100 million of the \$255 million requested by Eisenhower for the development loan fund.

The committee last week by a 26-18 vote refused to provide a single penny in supplemental funds for the fund, one of the three programs under which U. S. economic aid is supplied to foreign countries.

Lynn Roberts of Yreka, Siskiyou county Civil Defense coordinator, met with the group for a discussion as to ways and means of solving Hornbrook's fire fighting problem.

Roberts stated that he would investigate the possibility of the town securing a surplus fire truck. At their regular meeting in Yreka last Tuesday, the county board of supervisors tentatively placed an additional \$500 in the county budget for possible acquisition of a surplus fire truck for Hornbrook, according to an account of the board meeting appearing in the Siskiyou Daily News.

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Secrecy Clamped On Rental Records

Washington — (UPI) — House disbursing clerk Harry Livingston Tuesday clamped a lid of secrecy on records which name members of Congress who have used the \$1,800 a year allowed them for rental and operation of offices in their home districts.

Newsman and the public were barred from seeing the records after widespread publicity focused attention on how some legislators put their relatives on the federal payroll at lush salaries. Livingston said "we don't have the time or personnel" to handle all the requests to look at them.

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Cougar Dam Bids To Be Called Soon

Portland — (UPI) — Bids will be called about April 1 for construction of the Cougar dam on the south fork of the McKenzie river. Army engineers said Tuesday. The project will cost an estimated \$42,900,000.

Tentative completion date is March 1, 1963. The dam will be 4.4 miles

upstream from the mouth of the McKenzie's south fork and 7 miles upstream from the Blue river.

The dam will have two generating units with an installed capacity of 25,000 kilowatts.
