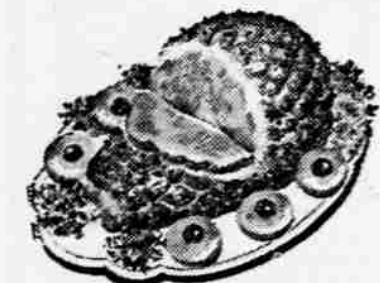

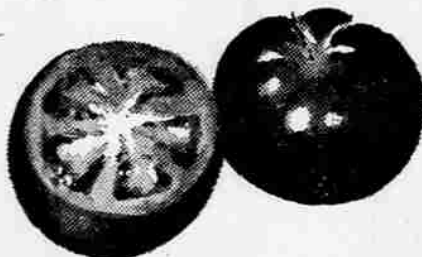

Hearing on Increasing Basic School Support Held in Salem

Each week it becomes more difficult to find even the short time which I devote to this column. The tempo is increasing, as it is to be expected, and if we are really to wind up the session in time the Democrats have specified, we will either be working evenings, Saturdays and Sundays, or we'll leave a lot of bills in committees. Of course, we are all anxious to get through in the shortest time possible, and I'm sure every legislator will cooperate to the utmost to bring about a speedy adjournment.

Tonight the big hearing room will be packed with people urging passage of House Bill 514, increasing basic school support. I wonder if anyone opposing it will show up? Every legislator has been deluged with mail on this bill, and I, for one, have been at a loss as to how to answer.

Of course, the education committee can send it out of committee with a "do pass" recommendation, and there is no doubt but what we will, but it will have to go to ways and means committee because of the appropriation of \$20,400,000 which it carries. And there, of course, is the rub, because at that point we run into politics.

Urges Greater Support Many of the people who are urging greater state support for schools would gladly vote a sales tax if given an opportunity, but the sales tax is controversial matter in both parties. Some others are saying, "Please vote for more school aid" in one paragraph, and "We can't stand any tax increases" in the next one. A net receipts, or universal income tax, as suggested by Governor Hatfield, would be a step in the direction of broadening the tax base and increasing revenue, but it is doubtful if a tax program with Governor Hatfield's name on it will be passed by a Democrat-controlled legislature.

Senate President Walter Pearson is now again proposing a sales tax to be voted by the people in 1960, the proceeds to finance a new formula for state aid to education. This is the second time Pearson has come out with this suggestion, although in between times he changed his mind and stated categorically "no new taxes."

Since both Speaker of the House Robert Duncan and House Taxation Committee Chairman Clarence Barton oppose the sales tax, it seems unlikely that it will go far in this session. Representative Fred Meek, Republican, Portland, attempted to introduce a sales tax measure but was prevented by the rules committee.

Answer Letters In answering some of the many letters I've received on House Bill 514 I've asked the writers to let the legislature know what increase in taxes, or what new taxes they would be willing to approve in the interest of more state support for education. This may be what Mail Tribune Managing Editor Eric Allen is referring to in his editorial "Who's To Pay," in the March 20 issue. By way of clarification let me point out that it was ex-Governor Holmes, speaking to the OEA in convention, who castigated them for urging certain tax measures on the legislature in order to finance salary increases and other increased school costs.

He felt that was an improper area of activity for them, and frankly said so. For a legislator to inquire from his constituents as to their opinion regarding tax increases seems to me to be a perfectly legitimate and democratic procedure. Maybe I am trying on a shoe which doesn't fit, but it occurred to me that my letters on this subject might have

caused the editorial comment. And along this same vein, I feel, as do many other legislators on both sides of the political fence, that Cecil Posy, the executive secretary for OEA, has seriously diminished its already waning influence on the legislators by his dive into bitter partisan politics at the OEA convention in

Appling Discusses Good Government at Kiwanis Club

Principles of the dignity and sovereignty of the individual, of free enterprise, of equal responsibility of management and labor and of helping other people to help themselves were supported by Howell Appling Jr., Oregon secretary of state, yesterday in a talk to Medford Kiwanians at Rogue Valley Country club.

Addressing the weekly noon luncheon of the Kiwanis club, Appling spoke on "Politics is Your Business."

The secretary of state declared that government is no more than a reflection of its people and can be what people make it. He maintained that it is the fault of the governed if government fails.

Appling asked encouragement of all citizens to put their energies in a positive way to improve government and to get people who are competent and the best qualified into office. He said that government in Oregon has been "remarkably clean" and "our problem is one of competence."

The secretary of state proposed a campaign for better salaries for legislators as a means of weeding out incompetence. Appling deplored the apathy and indifference in "our government of popular choice," the tendency to consider politicians with disrepute and the loss of esteem, the abuse and ingratitude which makes hard the inducement of able servants.

The public servant serves us just about right and better than we deserve, Appling declared. "It is time for us to repent and change our ways," he charged. He termed politics the noblest career a man can choose. "It is not the critic who counts. The credit belongs to the man in the arena who strives valiantly," the secretary said. Appling spoke of his respect now for people, of whom he has been critical, because of his realization that they have been trying to do something for better government.

The secretary of state reported that he does not believe in deficit spending or in confiscatory taxes. Part of the Kiwanis program yesterday consisted of stereophonic presentation of excerpts from Handel's "Messiah." The Rev. John Reynolds arranged the musical portion of the program. The music was from Swem's Gift shop and equipment from Verl G. Walker radio with Ellis Feinstein, chief engineer at radio station KMED, as technician.

French Singer May Quit Hospital Soon

New York - (UPI) - French singer Edith Piaf, operated on for an intestinal block Tuesday night, may be able to leave the hospital in 10 days to two weeks, her physicians said today. Miss Piaf, 43, was said to be recovering satisfactorily from the operation at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center. It was her second operation within a month, following previous surgery for a bleeding gastric ulcer. Miss Piaf's relapse forced cancellation of several engagements.

He certainly isn't doing the cause of education any good when he becomes so blindly partisan that he overlooks the fact that the Holmes budget submitted to this legislature the first week of the session, made no provision for increased aid to education, nor has any Democrat leader come forward, so far, with a tax plan to support the measure, with the exception of Walter Pearson, whose plan would take effect in 1961.

First Hearing On Thursday, March 26, at 8 a.m. the local government committee will have its first hearing on the long-awaited legislation to implement the county home rule amendment. We committee members feel that the legislation is basically good but probably needs some amending before it will be in final shape for passage. It is our hope that those attending the hearing, many of whom have given this matter long study, will have suggestions which can be incorporated and that we can very soon send the measure to the floor of the House.

Also on Wednesday the judiciary committee will hold a hearing on the State Power commission bill. This is similar to the measure which failed to get on the ballot last fall for lack of signatures on the initiative petition. It would put all authority for power development in the state into the hands of three men who would make up the State Power commission.

At a special meeting of the House Education committee Friday afternoon, House Bill 544 which authorized admission of students in private and parochial schools to driver training programs in public schools, was tabled. Because of limited time and the tremendous volume of correspondence on this bill, I did not attempt to answer the letters, feeling sure that it would be disposed of rather soon and that I could notify those who were so concerned about it through this column. Another bill to do away with all driver training classes is ready for introduction, but the rules committee, which controls introduction of all bills after the 25th day of the session, has not approved this one.
