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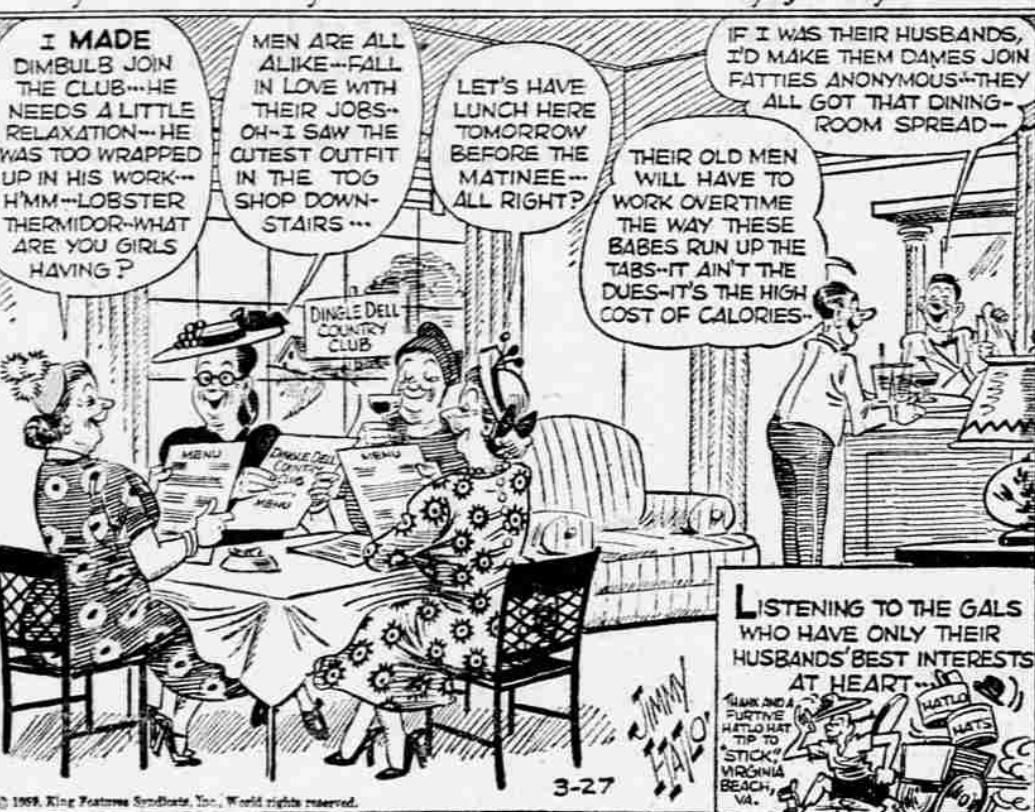

Neuro-Surgeon Takes Stand in First Degree Murder Trial Here

An attack of psychomotor epilepsy, "tripped off" by a flashing wood fire, probably occurred at the time Mrs. Maxine A. Click, 46, Ashland, killed her husband Jan. 6, Dr. James C. Luce, neurosurgeon, testified Thursday in her first-degree murder trial.

The trial started Tuesday in circuit court after the jury was selected. Judge Edward Kelly is presiding.

Questioned by Defense Attorney Otto Frohnmayer, and later by District Attorney Thomas J. Reeder, Dr. Luce said, "I believe she was suffering from psychomotor epilepsy at that time" and was not capable of distinguishing between right and wrong.

Explains Test

The Medford physician explained in detail the electroencephalograph test made of Mrs. Click's brain waves, showing results which indicated brain damage and which produced an epileptic seizure.

He stressed that the psychomotor type of the disease was not "the type where you chew the tongue," and where there is inability to use the muscles. He said the seizure is accompanied by a great fear and involves "thought processes, reasoning, memory."

In a second examination of

Mrs. Click, Dr. Luce said he went into a history of the defendant to find "if there were any other manifestations of psychomotor epilepsy" and to pin down the time of change of function.

He said Mrs. Click recalled a first head injury with unconsciousness about seven years ago.

Morning of Shooting

Of the morning of the shooting, he said she told him she remembered getting out of bed, fixing the fire, watching the fire, seeing the gun and hearing her husband "turn in bed."

Next, she said, she remembered looking at the gun in her hands. It had been fired twice.

Dr. Luce explained that the sensations she described as having at the time of the shooting were the same as those which occurred at the time the epileptic seizure was induced during the brain-wave test.

When Frohnmayer asked him if, as a result of the examinations, he had an opinion as to whether she was suffering from any mental disease, Dr. Luce said "I feel Mrs. Click has damage in the left side of the brain."

Answer Question

In answer to Frohnmayer's questioning, Dr. Luce said the disease is capable of treatment and control through medication.

During cross examination, the district attorney questioned Dr. Luce's use of only one test and asked if he "knew" for certain that Mrs. Click had a seizure on the morning of the shooting.

The physician said he did "not know" but that the symptoms were compatible with those of the seizure during his test.

Reeder questioned Luce's testimony that the lights from the fire could have triggered the attack, inasmuch as the doctor earlier had said it required 15 flashes of the test light per second to induce the epilepsy.

He asked, "Could the seizure still occur" if conditions during the shooting had varied from those stated by the defense?

'Essential Factors'

Dr. Luce's lengthy answers brought out that brain damage and the light were "essential factors."

Reeder also asked if a person was "likely to do a thing they had never done before" and Dr. Luce replied, "No, not likely, although rage is common."

He also asked if it was possible for Mrs. Click to have been unable to remember the shooting when she made her first statement to investigating officers, and then to give details of the actual shooting in a later statement.

Dr. Luce replied that it was the "natural tendency of anyone with an amnesic period" to attempt to fill it in.

Defense witnesses preceding the neurosurgeon were five Click children, Beverly, 16; Tommy, 12; Elsie Darlene, 10; Nancy, 9; and David, 8. Four-year-old Russell was brought to the courtroom momentarily, holding the hand of a court aide.

Children Excused

Elsie Darlene and David were excused after they failed to answer the defense attorneys questions and said they did not remember anything which happened on the morning of the shooting.

Also appearing for the defense were Mrs. Marie Clark, Jackson county welfare case-worker, who appeared earlier for the prosecution; Dr. Harry Danielson, local psychiatrist; and Jack Dunlap, county jailer.

Dr. Danielson told the court that in an interview with Click in 1957, Click had shown a "surprising lack of concern" for his wife and children.

In cross-examination, the district attorney appeared critical of opinions based on a one-hour interview and opinions of other doctors.

Read Deposition

Frohnmayer and Reeder read from a deposition taken earlier for the trial from Dr. A. Erin Merkel, county health officer, who examined Mrs. Click when she was brought to the county jail following the shooting.

The health officer, who is attending a health conference in southern California, testified that Mrs. Click was suffering from numerous bruises at that time, which she said had been inflicted by her husband.

Lowell Thomas Describes Great Monasteries in City of Lhasa

Editor's note: Lowell Thomas, noted newscaster and world traveler, is probably America's leading authority on Tibet. In 1949, Thomas made a 300-mile journey across the "roof of the world" accompanied by his son, Lowell Jr. They were the seventh and eighth Americans citizens ever granted permission to visit Tibet. During the expedition, the Thomases visited the capital city of Lhasa and were received by the Dalai Lama, spiritual and political ruler of the country. The book "Out of This World," written by Lowell Thomas Jr. after their return to the United States detailed the life and customs of Tibet and its people as seen by an American newscaster. Lowell Thomas Sr.'s description of the country and people follows.

Los Angeles—UPI—Recent news dispatches from the Himalayas tell us that the Chinese Communists have bombed or dropped bombs on two of the great monasteries near the city of Lhasa.

These two are the Drepung Gompo and Sera Gompo. If they have destroyed these monasteries, in a way it would be comparable to the destruction of the great Alexandrian library that once was so important in the ancient city of Alexandria at the mouth of the Nile. For Drepung and Sera are two of the most important centers of Tibetan Buddhism.

Visited Monasteries

When Lowell Jr. and I visited Lhasa just before the Chinese Communists overran Tibet, we spent some time in these two monasteries. They are the largest in the world—or were. In Drepung we were told there were some 10,000 monks. In Sera, approximately 8,000. There is a third large monastery on the outskirts of Lhasa, Ganden Gompo—Ganden meaning the "joyous." The total number of monks in these three is around 25,000, and the civilian population of Lhasa, the Dalai Lama's capital, is another 25,000.

If Drepung and Sera have been destroyed by the Reds, it would be like demolishing two towns. Drepung, for example, is a vast honeycomb of buildings, all tied together in one mass at the foot of a mountain. On the roofs of these structures are scores of turrets and towers sheathed in gold. And each monastery is a depository for large stores of Tibetan treasures—sacred books and sacred images and objects of many kinds covered with layers of gold.

Science Teachers Meet at College

Ashland—Members of the Southern Oregon Science Teachers association met Wednesday at Southern Oregon college. President of the organization, J. D. Paisley, Rogue River high school teacher, was presiding officer.

Dr. Clarence Diebel, newly-appointed U. S. regional director of the National Science Foundation's Traveling Science Teacher program for the northwest, explained the purposes and organization, as well as the history of the project.

"The Commercial Applications of Nuclear Power" was the topic of an address by Dr. Elliott B. MacCracken, chairman of the SOC science-mathematics division.

A tour of the new science structure followed, which was conducted by members of the division staff. The formal dedication of the building will be April 29, Dr. MacCracken said.

Dr. Franklin W. Sturges, SOC staff member, served as program chairman for the conference.

We were told by the chief abbot both at Sera and Drepung that there were more than a quarter of million monks, or lamas, in Tibet. As a rule, one boy from each family goes into a lamastery. The boys do this for a number of reasons. For centuries it has been traditional for at least one son to devote himself entirely to religion. And then, it is one way for a boy of low birth to become an important man in Tibet. Naturally, Lowell Jr. and I are wondering how greatly these Dalai Lama lives in an apartment near the top of the

Potala. During the summer months he lives in a lesser palace, on the outskirts of Lhasa, in a park of popular trees. Dispatches say this has been bombed by the Reds in the recent fighting.
