Las Vegas, Nev.—(UPI)—Heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson and British boxer Brian London today were assured the "use of the hall" on May 1—and when other obstacles to the controversial title bout can be overcome.

George H. Albright, director of the new 7,200 seat Convention hall said both Cus D'Amato, Patterson's manager, and Promoter Cecil Rhodes agreed they would accept May 1 as a suitable date for the fight.

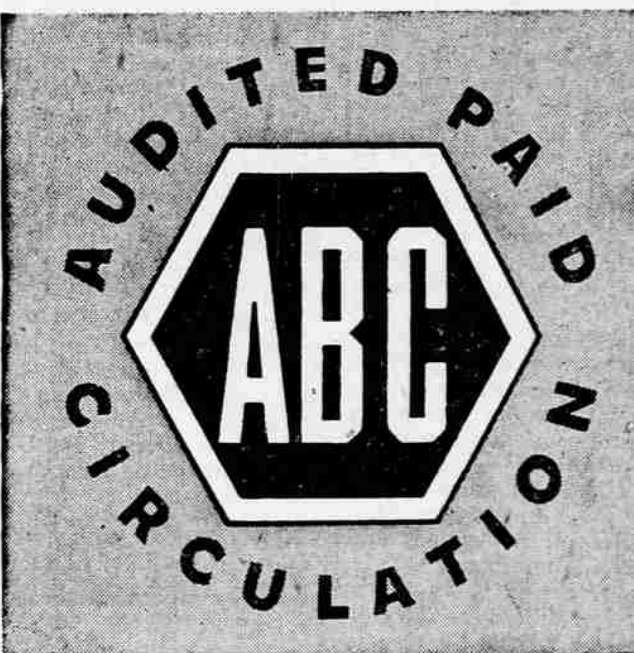
