Edith Ingle Dies In California; Wife of Engineer

Edith Young Ingle, wife of Medford mining engineer Hugh C. Ingle Sr., died Friday morning in Mar Vista, Calif., at the home of her daughter. She had been in failing health for several months.

Funeral services will be held Monday morning in California, and Mrs. Ingle's body will be returned to Medford for interment in Siskiyou Memorial park Thursday or Friday.

Mrs. Ingle was born June 20, 1892, in New York City, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Kissam Young. She was educated in private schools in the east, and was a graduate of Swarthmore college, Philadelphia, Penn. She and her husband were married in 1920, in Portland, Ore.

During much of her life, Mrs. Ingle was a newspaperwoman and free-lance writer. She was on the editorial staff of Clayton Publications in New York City for some time, and after coming to the West Coast was a reporter and feature writer for a number of newspapers, including the Santa Monica Outlook, the San Diego Union, the Humboldt Times in Eureka, Calif., and the Spectator, Portland.

Her first successful writing was at the age of 11, when some pieces on nature study were printed in Philadelphia papers.

Mrs. Ingle was keenly interested in civic and international affairs, and was a sharp critic of some people in public life, expressing herself not infrequently through letters to editors of various papers, including in recent years the Mail Tribune.

She was a member of the Medford chapter of the Oregon United Nations association, and during the past few years was an enthusiastic advocate of improved education for children, particularly in the natural sciences and astronomy.

Survivors, beside her husband, include a son, Hugh C. Ingle Jr., Deming, N.M., and her daughter, Mrs. Roy D. Richards. A brother, Malcolm M. Young, is an attorney in Hickory, N.C. There are two grandsons and five granddaughters.

The family home here has been at 338 Bessie st.
