Wall Street Chatter

New York—One of the significant things about this stock market is its apparent ability to assimilate and consolidate large gains and excessive trading in individual issues without developing weakness in the broad list, according to I.O. Hooper, analyst for W. E. Hutton & Co.
There is apparently no change in the background of the market picture and this is why we feel that the constructive stock market forces will continue to dominate the price structure, says Martin Gilbert, analyst for Van Alstyne, Noel & Co.
Walston & Co. notes that Carrier Corp. has budgeted a rise in profits on about the same sales volume as 1958 when the company earned \$3.27 a share, against \$3.17 in 1957.

Leeds & Northrup, producer of instruments and control systems, is in a recovery phase which is expected to continue through the year, says Reynolds & Co.
Investors Advisory Institute estimates Winn-Dixie will earn \$2.10 a share for the year to end June 30, against \$1.95 last year and \$1.71 in 1956-57. The firm has about 59 additional stores coming into operation in its current year.

Chairman Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) reported that total federal civilian employment in February was 2,335,224. Employment in civilian agencies rose 3,237 over January's figure, but the number of jobs filled in military agencies decreased by 5,833, for the net drop of 2,596.

Washington—UPI—Supplies of a new four-way vaccine which will protect pre-school children from polio, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough are expected to be available by August, Public Health Service officials has predicted.

The four-in-one inoculation announced last week by Surgeon General Leroy P. Burney will provide "safe and effective" protection against the diseases. He said this was proved by tests on thousands of individuals.

Two laboratories, Parke, Davis & Co., and Merck, Sharpe and Dhome, have been licensed to produce the vaccine.
Burney stressed that the new four-way vaccine, which includes Salk shots, was designed only for children 5 years old or less.

He said it was "inadvisable" for older children and adults because of the "well-known hypersensitive reaction to diphtheria toxoid in full dosage in this age group."

Burney said the four-way vaccine will not be available in large quantities for some time. Parke, Davis predicted its vaccine will be on the market in August.

Burney urged parents not to wait until the new four-in-one vaccine becomes available to inoculate their children against polio. He stressed that the Salk vaccine already has proven it is 90 per cent effective when three shots are given. He said parents should lose no time in obtaining such protection for their children.

Burney pointed out that there are eight million children under five years of age in the country who have not yet been inoculated against polio.
