Bill Rosensohn Sets June 25 For Title Bout

New York—Custer (Cus) D'Amato, manager of the heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson, says he did not know that June 25 had been selected as the date for Patterson's title defense here against Ingemar Johansson of Sweden.

Bill Rosensohn, promoter of the bout, announced in Sweden Saturday that he had decided on June 25 after conferring with Johansson and his "advisor," Edvin Ahlgvist.

D'Amato said June 23 had previously been suggested as the date. The site has yet to be determined. Yankee Stadium is available for both dates and Rosensohn also has an option on the Polo Grounds.

Rosensohn also said that Patterson would defend first against former British heavyweight champion Brian London at Las Vegas, Nev., probably on May 1, even though the British Boxing Board of Control so far has refused to sanction London's challenge.

Bowling Mark Tumbles Again

Astoria—A week-old record was broken twice at the Oregon State Bowling association championship Sunday night.

Duane Nelson of Sherwood bowled a 1965 to break the class A all-events record for the second time in one night. Earlier Wally Isaacson of Portland bowled 1937 to better the recent mark set by Bud Kuykendall of Eugene who had 1907. Kuykendall's record shattered one which had stood for 19 years.

Bosox Win 9-7 Over SF Giants

Phoenix, Ariz.—The newest San Francisco Giants of them all pitcher Sam Jones, was tentatively set to pitch a few innings today when the Bay team hosted the Chicago Cubs in a Cactus League tussle.

The gangling righthander, key figure in a big trade with the St. Louis Cardinals, arrived here late Sunday. He brought a cold with him from soggy Florida, but still said he was ready to hurl when manager Bill Rigney wanted him to. Rigney indicated that would be today.

Jones said that he had not had any arm trouble this year and also said that he felt the Giants "had as good a chance as anybody" to cop the National League flag this year.

Seven Homers

That the Giants can use another front line hurler was demonstrated again Sunday. San Francisco hammered four home runs, but came out on the short end of a 9-7 slugfest against Boston.

The Bosox had three round-trippers themselves with Frank Malzone's tworn belt in the ninth spelling the Giants' doom.

Ed Bressoud, Orlando Cepeda, Jackie Brandt and Andre Rodgers were the giant fourmaster hitters, but the most significant blow may have been a triple by Willie Mays. Willie legged it out at top speed and gave no indication of being bothered by his recently injured leg.

Brandt and Felipe Alou each had two of the Giants' 11 hits.

Malzone's game-winning blast was his second of the day, while Pumpsie Green had the other Bosox homer.

Jack Sanford started for San Francisco and was relieved by Dom Zanni, who received for the loss. The defeat evened the Giants' Cactus League record at 9-9.

Fresno, Calif.—Oregon's track and field team took 10 first places Saturday and swept four events while cruising to a 91 1/2-39 1/2 victory over Fresno State.

Shotputter Will Reeve of the Ducks set a new school record when he tossed the iron ball an even 52 feet.

Fresno's one-man gang in a lost cause turned out to be Dale Messer who scored 16 points. He took first in the broad jump and 220-yard low hurdles and placed second in the 100-yard dash and 120-yard high hurdles.

Jim Grell, the Ducks' ace distance man, won the mile in 4:13.6 while teammate Dick Miller was clocked in 9:32.2. He took two mile. Otis Davis captured the 440 and Phil Paquin sailed 14 feet, 6 1/4 inches as he won the pole vault.

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Fireballer John Allen Dies at 53

St. Petersburg, Fla.—Johnny Allen, a lantern-jawed fireballer who once was the American league's top pitcher and always a thorn in the side of umpires—a group he later joined, died here Sunday at the age of 53.

Allen, who was in the real estate business at the time of his death succumbed to a heart attack. He was survived by his widow, Leta, and his son, John L. Allen Jr., a student at the University of Florida.

The lanky righthander, who only had one losing season (his) last in 13 years in the big leagues.

McCarthy Blasted

He joined the Yankees in 1932. For four years he was a steady winner for New York but in mid-season 1935 he staged a typical dressing room explosion in which he blasted Manager Joe McCarthy for use of a rookie outfielder, whose misplay had lost a game. The taciturn McCarthy never replied, but at season's end Allen was traded to Cleveland.

It was one of the few deals that ever came home to haunt the Yankees, for in 1936 and 1937 at a time when such great pitchers as Carl Hubbell, Dizzy Dean, and Lefty Grove were operating in the majors, there was no better hurler in baseball than Johnny Allen. In 1936 he had a 20-10 record. In 1937, despite arm trouble, he had a 15-1 record.

After an arm operation in 1938, Allen never regained the pitching heights although he stayed in the majors with the St. Louis Browns, Brooklyn Dodgers, and New York Giants until 1944.

Wall Leads In Azalea

Wilmington, N.C.—Art Wall Jr., who says he would be happy just to get a par 72 in the brisk win which has whipped the course for three days, went into the final round of the 11th annual Azalea Open golf tournament today with an impressive seven-under-par 209.

Mike Souchak, who played against Wall on the Duke university course years ago, moved into the challenger's spot in the third round Sunday, only five strokes behind. The Grossinger, N.Y., pro and former Blue Devil football player turned in the day's best showing with a 70 that gave him a 214 total.

But Wall's blistering 66 of Saturday enabled him to hold a steady lead with his 36-35-71 third round score.

Wall, of Pocono Manor, Pa., Souchak and Don Whit of Borrego Springs, Calif., with a 215 total, were the only three players to come up below par through the first 54 holes of the \$15,000 tourney.

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
