

Resolution Made To Boost Membership Of Oregon House

Salem — (UPI) — A resolution was introduced in the Oregon House Monday to increase membership of the House from 60 to 65 members when the Legislature is reappointed.

The state constitution requires that the Legislature be reapportioned every 10 years following the national census.

Thirty-three House members and seven senators signed the bill which provides for a constitutional amendment to be voted upon by the people.

Helps Less Populous Areas
Effect of the bill, under a new formula of allocating seats, would be to give more representation to less populous Oregon counties.

Each district would have one representative unless two districts next to each other had a combined population of less than 15,000.

Other populous districts would get one additional member in proportion to weighted population — that is one and one-half the total population.

A third member would be elected in direct proportion to population and all other additional members on a weighted population basis.

Original Jurisdiction
The State Supreme Court would have original jurisdiction to review legislative reapportionment under the new formula.

A budget of \$257,083 for the State Board of Aeronautics was approved by the Joint Ways and Means Committee after an effort to reduce it by Rep. Clarence Barton (D-Coquille) was voted down.

Rep. Verne Cady (D-Burns) said a subcommittee had recommended a reduction in new airport reconstruction funds and elimination of one proposed position in air search and rescue, but had not disturbed the figure sought for maintenance of air strips.

Barton moved to take a fur-

ther \$28,280 out of the budget for airport construction but did not get support.

Budgets of \$99,950 for the Oregon Historical Society and \$30,000 for the Museum of Science and Industry were approved.

After approving the budget for the state treasurer, the committee tabled a bill providing for an appropriation for the State Bond Commission. This agency is being eliminated by the Legislature.

An appropriation for \$1,080,170 for the state library was approved and sent to the floor of the House with a "do pass" recommendation.

Edwards Loses Bid For Injunction

Portland — (UPI) — Cecil Edwards, former steward for the Oregon Racing Commission, has lost his bid for a preliminary injunction which would have ordered the Commission not to name a successor.

Circuit Judge Pro-Tem Barnett H. Goldstein refused to issue the injunction. Hearings on the request were held last week.

Edwards had sought the temporary order pending trial of his suit to be restored to the position, which he had held since 1951.

Judge Goldstein, in 15-page opinion, said "granting of this preliminary injunction before trial on the question of law and fact involved, would in effect be tantamount to a final determination of the case."

Wayne Ruben Buttram, 43, of Shady Cove, was treated by Rogue Valley hospital for a broken collarbone following a one-car accident Saturday night near the Butte Falls junction on Highway 62, state police said.

Buttram's car apparently left the pavement on the north side of the highway, travelled 37 feet, hit the rock lining of a culvert and the car tumbled end for end, coming to rest on the shoulder.

The car hood and trunk lid were torn off and the car top crushed in, state police said. The driver was thrown into the back seat. Buttram told officers that the vehicle's front wheels locked while he was travelling about 45 miles an hour.

Hatfield Praises Negotiators

Salem — (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield today praised all participants in recent negotiations designed to avert a strike of carpenters and pile drivers against Associated General Contractors.

The governor said "a commendable desire by representatives of the contractors, pile drivers and carpenters has resulted in what may be a solution to the problem."

The governor said that, under any circumstances, the state had avoided a damaging strike until "the voice of the individual union member is heard."

Members of the Pile Drivers union went back to work Monday pending a vote April 12 on a three-year 53-cent hourly wage package proposal. They had gone on strike last week, but the parent Carpenters International Union ordered a halt to picketing on Sunday.

Portland locals of the Carpenters Union also were scheduled to vote on the proposal which was winning favor in Oregon and Southwest Washington districts of the union.

Dulles Begins Rest At Florida Retreat

Hob Sound, Fla. — (UPI) — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, thinner than usual but in good spirits, settled down today for a quiet rest at a secluded millionaires' island retreat where even neon lights are taboo.

Dulles, accompanied by a doctor, his wife, and a small staff, arrived here during a lull between two thunderstorms Monday afternoon. The 71-year-old State Department head planned to spend an indefinite time recuperating from his recent cancer attack.

He is staying at the home of Undersecretary of State C. Douglas Dillon, located on nearby Jupiter Island. Sparsely but richly populated, the island is a community of millionaires that doesn't even have a service station.

Island's population density is about eight times that of the United States.

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
