Stocks Turn Higher; IBM Split Proposed

New York — (UPI) — Stocks turned irregularly higher today. Market sentiment was bolstered by a proposed 3-for-2 stock split and dividend increase by IBM and by a prediction of increased railroad loadings in the second quarter.

IBM was the star, rising more than 23 points at its best and holding most of the gain. The rails could not generate any steam and ruled mixed on balance. Steels also moved within a narrow range. Zenith jumped more than 9 at its high in the electronics but lost part of the gain on profit taking. Maytag was off more than a point.

Chrysler, which announced it plans to go into the glass fabricating field, rose a full point, while Pittsburgh Plate Glass, Chrysler's major supplier, lost more than 2 points.

Washington — (UPI) — Americans smoked more cigarettes than ever last year despite conflicting claims over their possible relation to lung cancer.

The Agriculture department estimated that 436,300,000 cigarettes were used within the continental United States in 1958—a yearly total of 185 packages, or 3,700 smokes, per person 15 years of age or older.

That figures out to roughly half a pack a day. Total U.S. cigarette output reached 470 billion, up 28 billion over 1957, or 6 percent from the previous high that year.

The Agriculture department said the upturn in sales could be attributed to an increase in the teenage population, the increasing percentage of women smoking, and the tendency of persons who switch to filter-tipped cigarettes to smoke more than when using non-filter tips.

Various medical groups and studies have offered statistics that link the use of cigarettes and the incidence of lung cancer. The tobacco industry denies that the studies offer conclusive evidence that there is any relation at all.

A new colorimetric method developed by the National Bureau of Standards can detect and measure quickly and accurately acetylene pollution in the air—even quantities as low as 10 parts per billion.

Ninety-five new luxury type motor vehicles with a total of 9,785 rooms were built in the United States last year at a cost of \$138,626,000.
