## Partisan Battle On Foreign Policy Seen in Congress

Washington - (UPI) - Republicans today challenged the conduct of U.S. foreign policy under past Democratic administrations as a result of an influential Democratic group's charge that the GOP bungled world affairs.

The exchange threatened to blossom into a full-scale partisan battle when Congress returns from its Easter recess next week.

The Democratic Advisory Council sparked the foreign policy debate by accusing President Eisenhower of selling out his own foreign policy convictions to GOP "clients" who believe world leadership responsibilities can be discharged at "bargain rates."

It said the result has been a "windfall" of opportunities for the Kremlin and a "ruinous course" for American diplomacy.

The statement urged the Democratic-controlled Congress to demand strong action and point the way so the nation need not "sit in paralyzed horror for two more years."

Republican National Committee Chairman Meade Alcorn quickly called the Democratic attack "massive irresponsibility" and "partisan poppycock."

His counter-attack included conduct of the Korean war under President Truman. He called it an Asiatic war "brought about by executive confusion and error; a war ended by this administration speedily."

He said the Democratic statement was "an invitation to aggression, almost as regrettable as the tragic declaration by the U.S. secretary of state in 1950 that South Korea lay outside our defense perimeter."

## Carter Warns of Ordinance on Dogs

Jacksonville - Police Chief Frank Carter has issued a notice that all dogs in Jacksonville must be tied up or otherwise confined starting today until Aug. 1.

The first time a dog is found loose, a warning will be issued to its owner; the second time the owner will be fined \$5 and the third time \$10, Carter said. The fourth time the animal is found loose it will be picked up, he added.

Carter also warned youngsters against defacing desks in the Jacksonville post office. He said such vandalism is a federal offense and arrests will be made.

Stock prices jumped ahead by as much as 2 and 3 points in the main list with some of the blue chips taking over the market leadership.

IBM, which ran up 2 1/4 points Tuesday on a stock split and proposed dividend increase, rose another 17 at its high today and held most of the gain.

Zenith, Minneapolis-Honeywell, Motorola and International Telephone all added around a point or more in the electronics industry. General Tire was up 6 at its high in this section.

Martin, 18, of Ashland, first told them of the shooting early Sunday when he brought Hill into Grants Pass for medical treatment.

The two men were reported to have attended a dance at White City and some time in Medford before deciding to drive to Roseburg in Martin's automobile. North of Grants Pass, Martin decided to return south as he did not have enough gasoline to make the round-trip to Roseburg.
