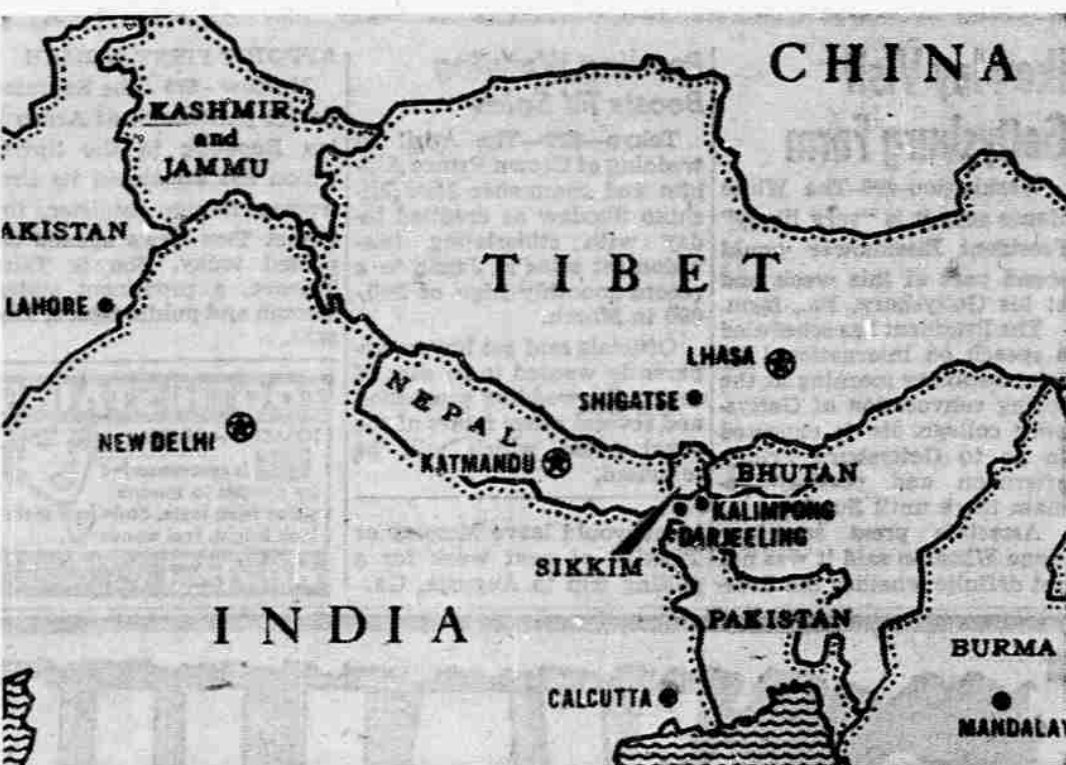

Salem—(UPI)—The Senate Tax Committee Wednesday approved an amended bill to allow people's utility district directors to issue revenue bonds without a vote of the people. As first drafted the bill would have granted PUD directors unrestricted authority to issue the bonds without voter approval. As amended the bill would allow PUD directors to issue the bonds without a vote but would give the people a procedure to veto the action.
