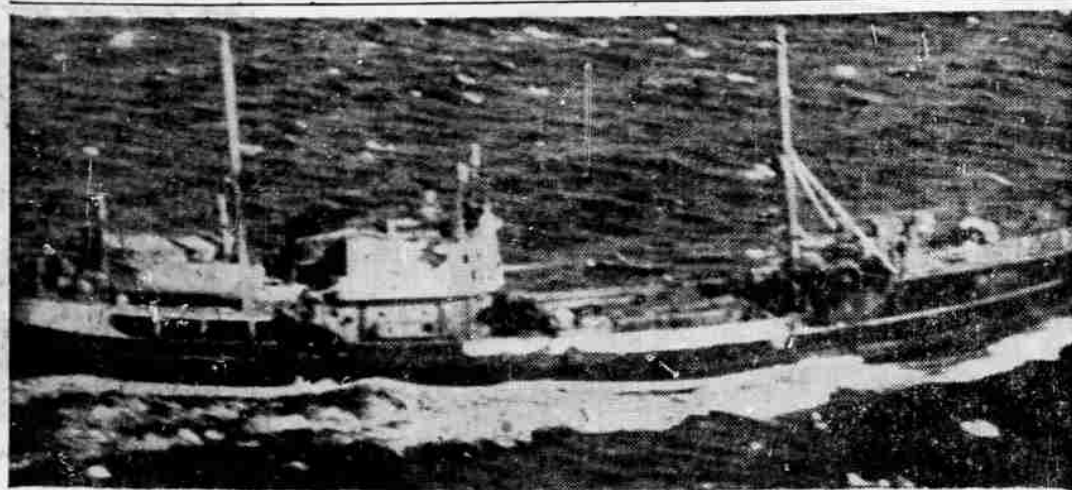

APPLGATE VALLEY Ruch PTA to Meet

Applegate Valley—Elliott Becken, assistant superintendent of Medford schools, will speak at a meeting of Ruch Parent Teacher association Friday, April 2. He will discuss the proposed consolidation of six school districts, and the prospects for Ruch in consolidation.

Becken will discuss the financial and curricular aspects the position of Ruch in the Medford district, and other effects of the proposed move. A large turn-out is expected for the discussion, and since residents will vote on the proposal April 6, announcements of Friday's meeting have been mailed to all registered voters of the district.

It has been pointed out that school expenses will be lower in consolidation. The meeting will be held in the gym at 8 p.m., and afterward election of PTA officers will be held. A movie will be shown for children, and refreshments will be served by the executive council.

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Mary R. — He doesn't talk to me anymore... or even listen.

Edgar R. — What she calls talking is nagging.

Mary R. — My husband and I have been married five years and have two young children. We were very happy at first, but everything seems to have gone wrong for the past two years.

It all started when Ed lost his job. His plant moved to a new location and we didn't want to be relocated. Ed had a lot of trouble finding a new job; as a result, we had to move in with my parents.

My parents have been very nice, as even he admits, but he is always depressed and closed into himself. The worst part of it is that he doesn't talk to me anymore. As a

matter of fact, he doesn't even listen. I can talk and talk and then I look at him and I realize that not a word has penetrated. I feel that I'll go crazy if this goes on.

Edgar R. — What Mary calls talking is always nagging. She picks on me and asks a lot of stupid questions. I get sick of listening to her.

I don't want to live with Mary's folks any more than she does. It's true they are okay, but we should have our own home. The way things are going it may take another year. My new job doesn't pay as well as the old one. Mary keeps complaining about the way we're living, but I'd like to know what she would do in my place. It wasn't my fault

that I lost the other job. I don't think that I should have to listen to a lot of stupid talk at the end of a hard day's work. I need plenty of peace and quiet. That's all I ask — peace and quiet.

The Council: Edgar's depression seems rather serious and Mary is right to be concerned, but she is going about it the wrong way.

In addition to the fact that he has been overwhelmed by financial problems, Edgar has evidently been overwhelmed by his wife's reaction to those problems. When he doesn't listen to her, he is trying to set up a barrier between them to prevent being hurt any further.

Possibly Mary tries to break down this barrier with more and more talk and this makes Edgar retreat still further. As she becomes more critical and discontented, he feels himself more and more a failure.

Talk is needed in this case, but Mary shouldn't be doing it. Edgar is the one who needs to talk and if Mary is wise and

patient she will be able to draw him out gradually. She should not question him unless he shows some interest in starting a conversation, but she should give him assurance of her affection and confidence in him. If she can learn to be quiet with him in a tender, happy spirit he will eventually lose his fear of being hurt by her and will be willing to open up and unburden himself.

Mary and Edgar need a little more perspective on their problems. They have been hit by a storm, but storms do pass. Anyway, they are part of life and nobody escapes scot free. The damage done by storms can always be repaired if the victims stick together and help one another; but all is lost forever if they turn against one another in bitterness and despair.
