Big Advance Adds to Market Valuations

New York - (UPI) - Stocks ran up sharply today.

The advance added another \$2 billion to market valuations, bringing the gain in the past two sessions to more than \$3,500,000,000.

Prime investment issues met good support. American Telephone ran up more than 3 points at its high with the stock at its best price level since 1930.

DuPont held a gain running past 2 points near the close. Thiokol added more than 6 at its high in the chemicals.

The key factor in the market's improved picture was the strong showing of the rail group.
