

Back Stairs: Stories on Ike's Health

Washington - (UPI) - Back stairs at the White House: Conditions seem ripe for a new round of stories about President Eisenhower's health.

Press Secretary James C. Hagerly said earlier this week that the President's doctor, Maj. Gen. Howard McC. Snyder, wanted Eisenhower to get away to a warmer climate for rest, relaxation and exercise.

Unless pressing events develop in the meantime, the Chief Executive probably will fly to Augusta, Ga., next Monday or Tuesday.

Thus, there may be some who will reach the conclusion that he is going south on doctor's orders. By the time this gets told and retold a few times, his Augusta trip may

be billed eventually as having been made for medical reasons.

According to the people who seem to know the President best, this would be a complete nonsense. Basically, Eisenhower's health is good for a man of his age and medical history, and no deterioration of health is involved in his tentative plan to go south.

President Needs Exercise
There are a number of factors behind Snyder's desire to have the President rest in a warmer climate.

One is that Eisenhower has gone four months without much exercise. This is not an optimum condition in the opinion of Snyder.

If the doctor had his way, the President would play golf three times a week to work off tension and keep his weight down. But Washington winter weather is not golfing weather and the President has been reluctant to leave town during the illness of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, the crisis over Berlin, and the embattled progress of his legislative program in Congress.

Too, if the President doesn't get a fairly long break in April, chances for a golfing holiday will be fairly remote at least until after the adjournment of Congress in

July or August. The President has an unusually heavy list of foreign visitors on his schedule for May and June and July will be devoted to the closing days of Congress. It is just possible that August will be dominated by a summit meeting abroad.

So, it seems to be a matter of now or never as far as any sort of vacation is concerned.

Needed Urging
More than a little salesmanship has been required to bring Eisenhower around to even tentative planning for a week or 10 days in Georgia. This may seem odd to some of his critics who picture him as a constant golfer, but it nonetheless is true.

A shift in world conditions or the development of some urgent matter not readily visible to the public always could change his present intention to go south. But as of today, conditions seem quite favorable for a trip next week.

Playhouse 90 Drama on Unwed Mothers-To-Be Receives Double Comment

New York - (UPI) - Thursday night's CBS-TV Playhouse 90 drama about unwed mothers-to-be, "In Lonely Expectation," calls for two kinds of comment: One, about its courage and two, about its artistic worth.

In a way, it's a pretty sad reflection upon TV that William Ewald a play about unmarried mothers should be considered daring. There's no reason why TV shouldn't feel free to deal with any of the experiences of humankind, provided the treatment is done with honesty, intelligence and taste.

However, I have no doubt that some sincere viewers-together with a generous sprinkling of the usual nutballs who prefer to keep life's unpleasantness masked - will voice their objections.

I have no quarrel with Playhouse 90 on this count at all. "In Lonely Expectation" was done without leers or snickers and with a good deal of compassion. Playhouse 90's decision to tackle the subject I find commendable.

But I'm afraid I shall have to quarrel about "In Lonely Expectation" as a piece of drama. Some of its parts were quite moving, but as a whole, the play was oddly disjointed and not completely convincing.

The strange thing about the play was that it was most affecting when it stuck to matter-of-fact talk. After all, its stuffing - a group of pregnant single girls trying to cope with emotions beyond their capacities, branded as outcasts in an incest world-shrieks all by itself.

It was during the moments when the play went consciously "dramatic" that it sagged badly. Most typical of what I mean was a middle scene in which a kind of hysteria swept the girls, all of them vowing they would keep their

babies. It was played formally and fugue-like and its artificiality struck a false note. Another middle scene, in which Kathleen McGuire was given a terribly stagey speech also jounced hard against the play's texture.

Some of the acting was quite solid and I should like to single out Miss McGuire, Diana Baker, Philip Abbott and Joanne Linville. One of the principals, however - Susan Harrison - left me with mixed feelings. Miss Harrison has a tendency to grab for the offbeat semi-spectacular reaction rather than the simple statement. It is a fault of a good many of our young actors, but time and experience should iron out this sort of thing. She is quite definitely a young lady of skills.

One further note: Miss Harrison accidentally dropped a baby in one scene, but you can rest easy. It was actually just a doll in swaddling clothes.

Among the CBS-TV shows that will run off repeats this summer are: Desilu Playhouse, Playhouse 90, G.E. Theater, Name That Tune, The Texan, Father Knows Best, The Millionaire, Yancy Derringer, The Lineup, Wanted Dead or Alive, Have Gun, Will Travel and Gunsmoke.

NBC-TV and NBC radio will air the heavyweight title fight between Floyd Patterson and Brian London on May 1.

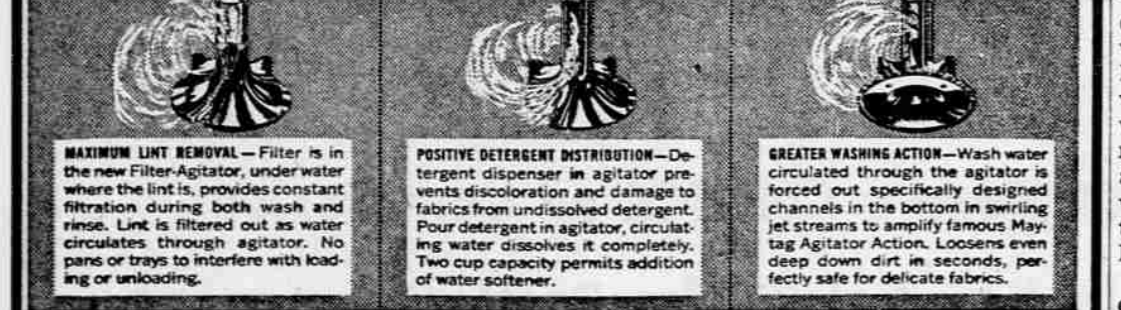

Increases in Welfare Load Noted by SA Here

A heavy increase in the welfare load was noted by the Salvation Army in Medford during the first three months of 1959.

Thirty-three families were given grocery orders and two were provided with rent orders, Capt. William Ricken reported. In addition, the SA clothing department gave out more than 357 garments to local families.

Capt. Ricken explained that help extended by the agency is for emergency needs only. Slightly less than 700 applications were received by the transient shelter for the three-month period. A total of 658 beds and 1951 meals were given at the shelter through March. Some 259 women were in the number helped.

The usual slack period of January saw a lot more activity this year than in former years, Capt. Ricken stated, and increased demands have expanded about three-fourths of the agency's budget in half its fiscal year.

The Army depends on the United Medford Crusade, as well as help from its own resources, for support of its welfare activities.

More referrals have been made from other agencies, both public and private. Ministers from various churches refer families to the Army more than they have in the past, which helps to avoid duplication of aid, Capt. Ricken added.
