Sheriff Walsh Outlines Request

Addition of three criminal division deputies would mean a full crew each day and night with two days off, except in emergencies, the sheriff said. Other county employees have been working a 40-hour week for two years, Walsh pointed out.

Under the proposed system, the jailer would also serve on the desk as complaint-taker and dispatcher. Four men would be on patrol at night, one in each of four sections.

Reduce Work Load

By having deputies operate in sections in marked cars, Walsh said, he believed the work load would eventually be reduced. Deputies would act as crime preventers, instead of waiting until a report of a crime is received, as is the current practice. The total for travel allotments would be reduced from the current figure of \$19,747 to \$19,000, Walsh said. Some of the travel time in the tax and legal division would be reduced.

Besides the travel allotment, the jail division food

expenditure ran the sheriff's office in the red during the current year. As of the first of the year the food budget was nearly depleted—even at an average cost of 22 cents per meal.

Walsh said the criminal division budget would total \$92,128 compared to the current year's total of \$71,820 and the 1957-58 fiscal year total of \$70,032. The jail division would have an increase of \$6,976, or \$34,718, compared to \$27,742. Much of the latter increase is due to an increase in the average daily jail population.

Tax Office Budget

Total budget request for the tax office is \$27,432, an increase of \$6,972 over the \$20,460 for the current year. The civil division budget request for the new fiscal year represents an increase of \$3,816 or \$12,180 compared to \$8,364 this year. The civil division is self-supporting, since expenses of the deputy serving civil papers are included in every civil action. Walsh hopes to cut the telephone and telegraph expenses from \$1,832 spent during the current year to \$1,600 by installing a teletype machine in the department. Now the sheriff's office shares the Medford police department teletype machine by paying half the operation expenses.

Another cut will be taken in purchase of routine equipment, from \$1,400 during the current year to an estimated \$700 next fiscal year, Walsh said.

Cost of miscellaneous supplies next fiscal year is estimated at \$3,400, compared to \$3,250 this year, Walsh said.
