

Zonta Names Civic Leader Women of the Year

Mrs. O. A. Eden, 211 Genesee street, is Medford's Woman of the Year for 1959. Selection of Mrs. Eden by Medford Zonta club was announced at the club's annual dinner Thursday evening at the Medford hotel. Zonta is a classified service club for business and professional women.

Mrs. Eden, one of the city's best known civic leaders, was chosen for her work with youth - including Cub and Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Beta Sigma Phi sorority. In addition Mrs. Eden has been co-chairman in charge of the disaster work of the Jackson County Red Cross chapter for many years, has been on the Medford Planning commission, is now a member of the city's Park and Recreation Commission and works with the newly organized Rogue Valley Council on the Aging. For a number of years Mrs. Eden was secretary of Rogue Valley Knife and Fork club.

Mrs. Eden is now chairman of an extensive project to encourage planting of trees along the city's streets and in yards under a coordinated plan outlined by landscape architects and other experts. She was main speaker for the dinner, and during her talk explained the project.

Mrs. Bonnie (Clarence E.) Wilson, club president, presented Mrs. Eden an arm bouquet of talisman roses and a scroll. The honored woman was also presented a white orchid from her husband, and a bouquet of red roses from her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Leigh Eden, Portland.

In introducing Mrs. Eden and making the announcement, Mrs. Fletcher Fish, toastmistress, listed the women who have received the award in the past. First Woman of the Year award in 1946 went to Miss Vera Humphrey

for her work with the Junior Red Cross. Subsequent awards went to Mrs. A. Orin Schenck, Red Cross volunteer; Mrs. Blanche Canode, elementary school teacher; Mrs. G. Q. D'Albini, member of Crater Lake chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, for work preparing the foreign born for American citizenship; Mrs. Justin B. Smith, for international relations' study work for American Association of University Women and Medford League of Women Voters; Mrs. Clarence A. Meecker, now editor, of the National magazine, Methodist Woman for service in the field of religion; Mrs. John E. Gribble (now deceased) for work with the blind; Miss Hazel Swayne, for public safety work; Mrs. Henry Padgett, for service in the field of public health; Mrs. B. Brandt Bartels, for service to deaf children and with the Junior Service League's kindergarten for hard-of-hearing children; Mrs. Scott V. Davis, for Girl Scout service; Mrs. Stephen G. Nye, for service in the field of education; Mrs. Alfred S. V. Carpenter, for Red Cross and other civic endeavor.

A number of those honored in the past were present, and were given gifts and rose buds.

Mrs. Paul R. (Maxine) Smith, president of Oregon Education association, Mrs. Glenn L. Jackson and Mrs. Dorothy Crosier were also guests at the dinner.

Project Reviewed

During her talk Mrs. Eden stressed that the beautification project which she heads for the city is a community endeavor and is not costing the taxpayers or the city any money. The trees are being purchased by property owners and cared for by them. The Parks and Recreation committee, aided by a number of volunteers, surveyed the city's needs and decides which type of tree should be planted on each street. Trees are purchased in quantity in order to secure reductions in price. Citizens are instructed how to plant the trees, how to space them and how to care for them.

In deciding on the types of trees for each locality, the experts took into consideration location, growing conditions, species, height and ultimate size of the trees and many other factors. When the trees have grown to a size to produce mass effects of bloom and foliage, the result will be a much more beautiful city, Mrs. Eden explained.

Working with Mrs. Eden on the project are Mrs. Fred C. Lorish, John Adams, Chester Corry, Ashland, all trained landscape architects; C. B. Cordy, county horticultural agent and Mrs. Minnie Ball, former garden club worker. Others are Mrs. William Tucker, a retired draftsman, who made a map of the city giving the location of the various tree types; Robert Johnson and Paul Jorgenson, who aided with promotion; John Williams and Verne Thorpe, superintendent of public works for the city.

Mrs. Eden said John Gribble, retired forester, has given valuable assistance in inventory work and by identifying species and estimating size of trees.

ashes, sweetgums and others. She displayed a certificate which may be secured if trees are planted as a memorial, this having been the idea of Mayor John Snider. A record of the tree, the name of the honored person and the location is kept in a book at the city hall.

An unexpected dividend of the project has been the location and identification of a number of unusual trees already growing in the city, the speaker said. She listed a Cornelian dogwood cherry, native of Central and southern Europe growing in the yard at 645 Palm street. It has a blanket of yellow flowers in the spring, and in the fall has scarlet fruit. An oak known as a chestnut or rock oak is growing in the front yard at 111 Washington street, and a good specimen of a redbud tree is growing at 607 King street in the parking strip.

A curiously named tree is the pawlonia, known to a known either as Prince of Netherlands or Empress of China, she said. One of these is growing in front of the Evelyn apartments. A cryptomeria, 150-foot forest tree from Japan, is growing at Eighth and Laurel street, across from the Jackson county courthouse and a Japanese privet, bush form, at the corner of Peach and Dakota streets across from Washington street.

A fine specimen of the ginkgo, or maidenhair tree, can be seen at the entrance of the driveway to the Bengtson home on Oregon terrace; this import from China and Japan is a link with the prehistoric in a tree-free age and the remains of a petrified ginkgo forest is in eastern Washington. These are now being planted on Havana and Sutter streets in Country Club estates.

The committee is also using a new tree propagated by Edward Scanlon particularly for street planting, she said. The tree, which grows in a columnar manner, is known as the Scanlon maple. It has been planted on Holly street by St. Mary's academy, these having been dedicated to the Academy Sisters, and at other places in the city. The Modesto ash is also being planted on several streets this year.

Benno and Sylvia Rabinof, violin and piano duo, will be presented in concert Saturday, April 11, by the Jackson County Civic Music association at the Medford High school auditorium at 8 p.m.

The program scheduled by the Rabinofs includes selections by Giuseppe Tartini, Johannes Brahms, Felix Mendelssohn, Franz Schubert, Claude Debussy, Georges Bizet-Sylvia Rabinof, Bedrich Smetana, Robert Russell Bennett, and Niccolò Paganini.

Benno Rabinof was born the son of immigrant parents and as a ranking athlete renounced the Olympic track team for the violin. He was the last in the line of Leopold Auer pupils and was introduced to New York by his teacher, who conducted the Philharmonic for Rabinof's debut.

Mrs. Rabinof first played for the musical world in her Paris debut as the 20-year-old Sylvia Smith, protegee of Paderewski and Sarkin. She is not only one of the foremost women pianists of the day but the composer of more than 150 works, including instrumental soli, chamber music, an orchestral suite, and an opera.
