Flower Garden Adds Joy To Springtime, Summer

When Humbert Wolfe, the English poet, was asked what he would do, "if all of us were doomed to die," he replied "We'd let our sixty seconds run where chestnut blossoms hardens, some early morn in Kensington when spring is in the gardens". Of course, you do not have to be a flower gardener to be thrilled when spring is in the gardens. It is enough to be a human being.

But a flower garden does add immeasurably to the joys of springtime. It gives you the chance to step out of this self-centered world of dollars and cents and into a world ruled by cantabury bells, rose of heaven petunias, and morning glories—a world where there is nothing more fearful than a Snapper.

There is where life sparkles, out in the garden in the glorious, healthful sunshine! It waits for you in your own backyard. By all means have a flower garden this spring.

The first step in making a flower garden is to mark off the boundaries. Let a rectangle be the basis on which to work out your design. Unless your space is almost unlimited, use a property boundary for the back line.

A gracefully curving foreground border is usually more attractive than a straight line. You can easily achieve this effect by laying the garden hose along the ground in the position of the proposed border. In this way you can

be sure of the grace of the curve before you begin your spading.

The hose will also serve as a guide for the spade. Use the spade before the rake. Every square inch of the garden should be spaded to at least the depth of the spade and preferably to two feet. If fertilizer is used, see that it is worked well into the soil and thoroughly mixed. After the spading has been completed, give the garden a thorough raking.

Now you are ready for the seeds. There is no more important phase of flower gardening than the choice of good seeds, for the fate of your garden depends on the quality of the seeds you use. Quality in flower seeds does not just happen. It takes years of experience to produce it.

No matter how experienced you are or how rich and fertile the soil of your garden, you cannot turn out the most beautiful flowers without superior seeds.

And you cannot judge the

quality of the seeds by looking at them. You cannot tell how large the flowers will be, how well formed, or how true to color. Consequently, you must place the fate of your garden in the hands of the seedsman who produces the seeds.

Choose a reputable seedsman! One widely known firm with more than 75,000 dealers throughout the country, "triple-tests" its seeds before distributing them to dealers. The tests are for germination, quality of the flower, and completeness of mixtures so as to include a wide range of colors and types.

One of the most interesting aspects of flower gardening is

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to stand before a complete assortment of flower seeds and to choose those varieties best suited to your own needs.

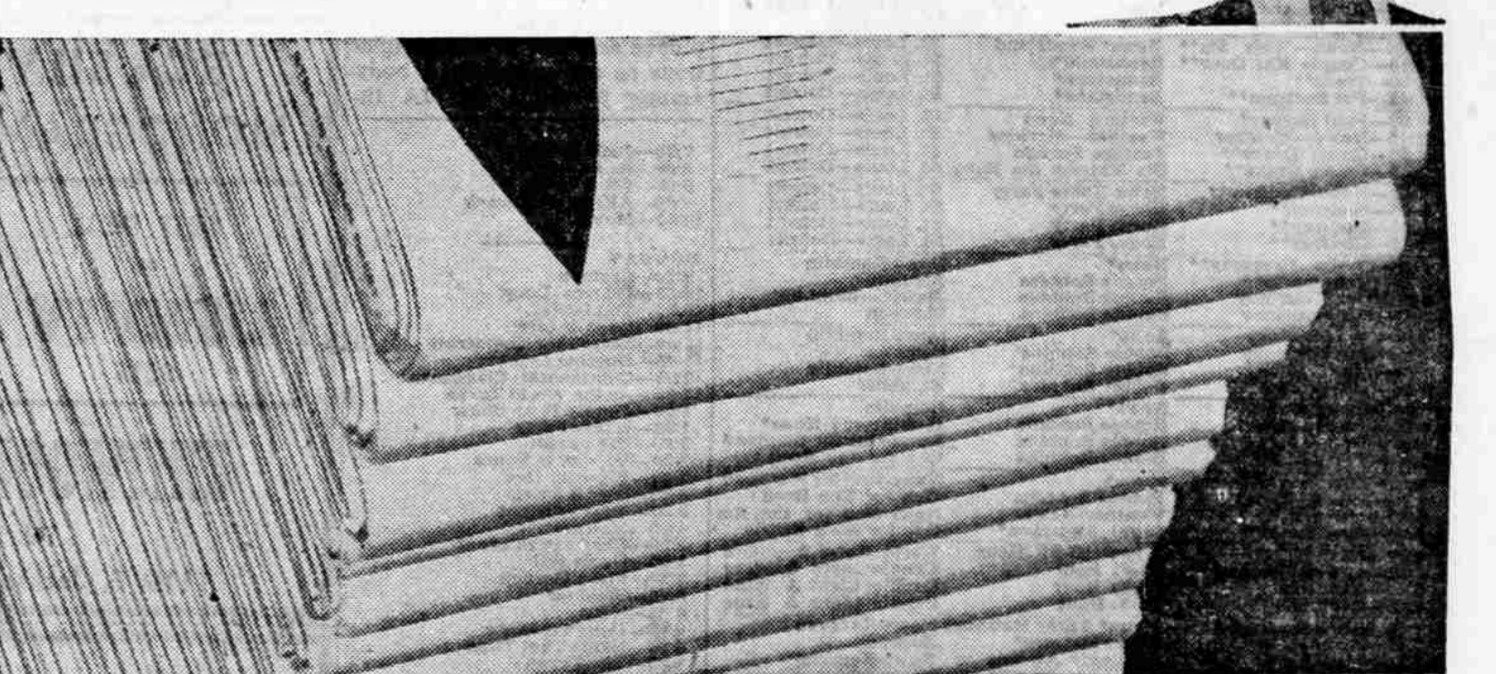
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Obligation Night To Be Observed
