## Senate Committee Votes 1.5 Per Cent Compensation Fund

Salem — (UPI) — The Senate Labor and Industries Committee voted 4 to 3 Tuesday to put the minimum rate of contribution to the unemployment compensation fund at 1.5 per cent of taxable payrolls.

Republicans voted against the 1.5 rate, favoring a 1.2 per cent minimum figure.

Sen. Carl Francis (R-Dayton) said the minority would file a report and bring to the floor the question of whether the rate should be 1.2 or 1.5 per cent. The minimum is now 1 per cent.

Proponents of the increase, headed by Chairman Dan Dimick (D-Roseburg), said the higher rate would make the fund more sound.

**Earlier Bill Tabled**  
The committee earlier agreed to raise the taxable income from \$3600 to \$3900 until the fund reached a figure of \$83 million. At that time the tax then would apply to the first \$3600 of taxable income.

The committee earlier tabled a bill providing for a so-called "payroll decline plan."

## Concrete Planters Placed Downtown

Twelve concrete planters were placed in downtown Medford along Main st. Monday as a project of the landscape architect committee of the street tree committee.

The planters are part of an expected \$4 to be placed along Main st. west from Riverside ave. It was reported there will be approximately 10 trees per block.

The planters are a joint project of a tree committee, retail merchants and the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

Twelve trees are expected to be planted soon. Each planter will be filled with gravel and dirt, with greenery planted around the tree at the top of planter.

The two species of trees to be planted will be Japanese privet, an evergreen, and arbor vitae, committee members said. It had previously been planned to have the Japanese privet along the entire street but they were not available at present, it was reported.

Once the trees have been planted they will be maintained by the merchants, it was explained. The cost of the planters and trees are also being paid by the merchants.

## Senate Committee Votes 1.5 Per Cent Compensation Fund

of financing unemployment compensation.

The action was taken in executive session. Employers had objected to the bill.

Under the plan, employers would have contributed 2.7 per cent of their taxable payroll until the fund reached 6 per cent of the total annual payroll of the state. Then merit rating would go into effect and as the fund increased above the 6 per cent employers would get tax credits for good employment records.

**Not in Effect Now**  
Under present law merit rating is not in effect now because the fund has dropped below 3 per cent of the taxable payroll of Oregon. When it goes up above 3 per cent employers again will get merit rating.

The committee has voted "do pass" on a bill to tighten up on benefits in unemployment due to pregnancy.

A motion was adopted which will speed up work in the current legislative session. The upper chamber agreed to suspend rules to permit all House and Senate bills to be read the first and second time on the same day.

Sen. Boyd Overhulse (D-Madras) made the motion, saying he wanted to "speed up this lagging session."

**Vote Machine Bill OK'd**  
A report of the Senate Elections Committee on a bill to permit counties to issue bonds to purchase voting machines was approved. The bill is sponsored by Sen. Alice Corbett (D-Portland).

A bill to give some property tax relief to elderly persons passed by a 24-6 vote. It now goes to the House.

All persons who are 70 years or older and have an income of less than \$2500 annually would be given a property tax exemption of \$5000 on their homes. The bill was sponsored by Sen. Alfred Corbett (D-Portland).

A board of inquiry to examine the governor of Oregon in the event of disability that prevents him from carrying on his duties would be created under another bill.

The board would consist of the chief justice of the State Supreme Court, the superintendent of Oregon State hospital and the dean of the University of Oregon Medical school.

**Could Declare Unfit**  
By a unanimous vote the board could declare the governor physically unfit to continue in office. The president of the Senate would then take over as governor.

**Plumbers Contract Is Clarified Here**

Plumbers in Jackson and Josephine counties were getting \$3.75 an hour before the new contract was agreed upon instead of \$3.55 an hour, Jim McCord, of Modern Plumbing and Sheet Metal, chairman of the employers' committee, said today.

The contract in Portland effective March 1 gave the plumbers there \$3.88 an hour plus fringe benefits, McCord explained. The employers here offered a 13 cents an hour increase to bring the wage scale even with Portland's, then the employees walked out, he said.

The new base scale is \$3.70 an hour beginning April 1, plus 10 cents for health and welfare, plus 10 cents for paid vacations, McCord said. Beginning Oct. 1 the base pay is \$3.80 an hour, April 1, 1960, \$3.90 and Oct. 1, 1960, \$4. The 20 cents in fringe benefits applies also in each of the periods.

**Deputies Probe School Burglaries**

Jackson county sheriff's deputies today are still investigating the burglary of Hanby and Patrick schools in Gold Hill Monday night.

The thief or thieves broke windows on the outside doors of each of the classrooms and forced others with a screwdriver, deputies said. A total of \$6 to \$7 was taken from the two schools, some from a teacher's desk and \$4.50 from an office desk.
