St. Louis—UPI—The San Francisco Giants were to work out in Busch stadium today in preparation for Friday's lid-lifter with the St. Louis Cardinals.

The Giants closed out a so-so spring swing Wednesday in chilly Omaha as they blanked the Cleveland Indians, 2-0.

Five San Francisco hurlers paraded to the hill and held the punchless Indians to three scattered hits. The piecemeal shutout was accomplished by Jack Sanford, Al Worthington, Paul Giel, Joe Shipley and Don Zanni.

The Giants were only able to muster six hits, but Daryl Spencer and Andre Rodgers ripped back-to-back doubles and Leon Wagner singled in Don Tausig to give the San Franciscoans the win.

Manager Bill Rigney started the same lineup Wednesday which is most likely to take the field Friday: Jim Davidson, 3b, Jackie Brandt, cf, Willie Mays, cf, Orlando Cepeda, 1b, Willie Kirkland Jr., Daryl Spencer, 2b, Andre Rodgers ss, and Bob Schmidt, c. Wednesday's quintet of hurlers will be replaced by Johnny Antonelli on Friday.

The shutout of the Indians gave the San Franciscoans a 15-13 exhibition record. Cleveland lost 9 out of 12 with the Giants, but San Francisco had an especially hard time with Boston, which captured 5 out of 7 games against the bay city team. San Francisco won 4 and lost 5 against the Chicago Cubs.

Truman Blasts False Charges In Government

Los Angeles—UPI—Former President Harry S. Truman blasted what he termed hysteria in government in a talk before an overflow crowd at UCLA Wednesday.

Many false charges are made against individuals under the cloak of congressional immunity, the former chief executive told a crowd of 2,000 at Royce Hall on the UCLA campus where another 2,000 students had to be turned back because of limited seating.

"One of these immunity birds once called me a traitor and General Marshall, a traitor," said Truman. "If General Marshall and I are traitors, this country is in a helluva fix."

Most Un-American

Truman said the course of hysteria in government extended from the pre-revolutionary witch-hunts up to the House Un-American Activities Committee.

He described the committee as the "most un-American thing in the country."

Truman returned to Kansas City after the speech, promising to consider accepting a short-term post as a professor at UCLA. "When I get here you may be sorry," he cracked to Chancellor Raymond Allen.

The 1959 Cadillac, sold in Medford by Skinner Buick-Cadillac, 143 South Riverside ave., has a "sweeping elegance matched by the youthful surge of the tremendously powerful new engine."

Advanced Principals

The new Cadillac engine is the result of 45 years' ex-

perience in the creation of the V-8 type. In the new models, the power plant incorporates advanced principles of design permitting extremely smooth operation while delivering vigorous maximum power for all occasions, Roche announced.

Major redesigning has resulted in greater displacement, higher compression ratio and more effective engine breathing.

Another new engineering design was for shock absorbers which prevents the mixing of air and oil in the cylinder, a heretofore unsolved problem which greatly reduced shock absorber effectiveness.

The 13 current models have Cadillac's dramatic styling and artfully crafted and functional chrome bumpers, headlamps, parking lights and grille. The wider hood extends on either side to the New Windshield.

Longshoremen Favor Trade, Reunification

Seattle—UPI—The International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union was on record today favoring resumption of U.S. trade with Red China and reunification of Germany.

Delegates approved resolutions on the subjects here Wednesday during the 13th biennial convention.

There was only one dissenter among the 231 delegates on the Red China question and the vote on Germany was unanimous.

In Fourth Day

The convention moved into its fourth day today, with a talk by James Burns, Hawaiian delegate to Congress, scheduled as a highlight in the program.

Wednesday the delegates adopted resolutions calling for outright repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act and support of only political candidates "who actively work for a program of peace, security and jobs."

The convention went on record demanding vigorous enforcement of all civil rights laws and U. S. Supreme Court decisions; outlawing nuclear weapons tests by all nations; overhauling immigration statutes; opposing actions of the House Un-American Activities Committee; opposing the McClellan Committee and union regulatory legislation.

The German issue brought a blast at the U.S. press from Harry Bridges, president of the international union. Bridges, who recently traveled through Eastern and Western Europe and the Middle East, charged that the press in general had distorted the German situation.

He said the newspapers were "lying like hell" about what was happening in Berlin.

The ILWU's resolution called for "reunification of Germany with stringent guarantees that as a reunified nation she shall not be permitted to possess, manufacture or be supplied with conventional or nuclear weapons which give her the ability to wage war."

MAY RUN AGAIN

Atlanta—UPI—Former Georgia Gov. Ellis Arnall said Wednesday night he may run for governor again in 1962. He left office in 1947.

Brake Fade, Wear Reduced in Design

Brake fade and brake lining wear have been reduced with Oldsmobile's new "Air-Scoop" brake design for 1959, according to company engineers.

The new system operates with a large flange which literally scoops in the cooling air around the brake drums and more efficiently cools them under the most severe driving conditions.

Fiat Car Made in Turin, Italy

The Fiat automobile, available in the Medford area at Jay Allen company, 1078 Court st., is manufactured in Turin, Italy.

Fiat was started in 1899, as the Fabbbrica Italiana Automobili Torino, the first in Italy on industrial lines, from which it derives its name. The company was formed by a group of Turin notables near the river Po and employed only about 50 workmen.

In more than 50 years of development Fiat has become one of the biggest industrial groups in Europe, manufacturing motorized means of transport for land, sea and air. Fiat employees now number approximately 80,000 in about 20 production plants.

Its buildings and land cover about 6,000 acres.

Fiat makes motor cars and commercial vehicles, including farm and industrial tractors, railway rolling stock, diesel marine and land engines, aircraft engines, tools and electrical household appliances.
