Foxy American Males Not Henpecked; Soviet War Unlikely, Briton Asserts

New Brunswick, N. J. (UPI)—Many a European has gone home from a visit to America convinced that women run the country and that American men are a henpecked lot. But to Prof. Denis W. Brogan, "the foreigner who knows America best," this is a false impression deliberately created by foxy American males. "The American woman is the victim of a confidence trick," says Brogan. "The American man who is much smarter than the American woman realizes, has given her the appearance—but not the reality—of power and equality."

Brogan is professor of political science at Cambridge University. Virtually every year since 1925, he has ventured forth from his native Britain to inspect at first hand that fabulous tribe across the Atlantic, the American people. Here is Brogan on the Berlin crisis:

Now in this country for a series of lectures at Rutgers University, Brogan granted this reporter a lengthy interview at which his barbed wit roamed widely over the American scene and abroad to Moscow and Peking.

The interview was conducted, at his suggestion, in the tap room of a New Brunswick hotel where Brogan refreshed himself from time to time with an imported Danish beer he favors because "it tastes almost as vile as English beer."

Brogan, like many British intellectuals, is enormously indifferent to trivial details of personal attire. He appeared before one formal lecture audience at Rutgers wearing a dark blue pinstriped suit and a flaming red flannel shirt. But there is nothing untidy about the penetrating mind that has made him the most respected foreign commentator on the American scene since Alexis de Tocqueville.

Here is Brogan on the Berlin crisis: "I do not believe there will be war. I am hopeful that the world will somehow get through to Khrushchev that Eisenhower is not bluffing. But I would feel better if I had more confidence in Soviet intelligence. We worry about the successes of Russian spies when we ought to be troubled about their incompetence."

On China and Russia: "The Chinese Communists are much more dangerous than the Russians. When you add the conceit of Marxism to the traditional vanity of the Chinese, you get a double dose of megalomania. And the Chinese Communists are still

Frank Lloyd Wright, Famed Architect, Dies in Arizona

Phoenix (UPI)—World-famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright, 89, founder of the modern school of building craftsmanship and storm center of artistic controversy most of his life, died today in St. Joseph's Hospital.

The "rebellious old gentleman," as friends referred to him in his later years, succumbed following an emergency operation Monday for treatment of an intestinal tract obstruction. He had responded well to the surgery, his doctor said, but apparently his age made recovery impossible.

Greatness Disputed Critics often disputed whether Wright was the greatest American architect of the 20th century but all agreed he certainly was the most famous for his individualistic style—a blending of precision machine-age lines with nature's living forms in stone, steel, wood or glass.

Wright maintained a home and school called Taliesin West on the desert near here, although he normally spent his summers in Wisconsin where he built a spacious, low, native-stone, rambling house named Taliesin—Welsh for "radiant brow"—at Spring Green during his mid-years.

He is survived by his widow, a noted architect son, Frank Lloyd Wright Jr., and

Pickin' Pears News and Notes From Camp White

The domiciliary library is observing National Library Week with an open house for members, personnel and visitors Tuesday, April 14, Enid Holmes, chief librarian, has announced.

The Camp White library is unique in many ways. It serves the special needs of the home members in their program of interests as well as those who live here and work here, including the doctors. A well stocked medical library is part of the equipment, the only completely catalogued medical library in the county.

Miss Holmes stresses the fact that while a specialized procedure is followed to conform with VA requirements for service in the planned living program, the usual professional standards maintained in library work are observed.

The library itself has the

atmosphere of a club room, with comfortable chairs and smoking stands. Books are easily accessible and one of the uses to which the librarians are put is to "settle arguments" by means of information and references.

In addition to the usual range of fiction, collateral reading matter is provided in local and metropolitan newspapers, magazines of current and special interest, and handbooks reflecting the hobbies and other interests of the members.

"The library serves in another capacity, which is not recognized as distinctly as its regular reading and lending service," Miss Holmes said. "This is the educational service and the effort made to adapt the library to the entire program as an integral part of this community."

The library and staff cultivate interest in reading to gain "wider horizons" in outlook, through a knowledge of distant places and world affairs, the chief librarian pointed out.

Supplementing this project is the promotion of interests such as "travel talks" the organization of a readers and writers club, and a class in the Spanish language. Another service is provided in obtaining books that are not available, through cooperative arrangements with the Medford and state libraries.

A new pamphlet covering federal benefits for veterans is now available. It is prepared by the Veterans Administration Information Service and can be obtained for 15 cents from the superintendent of documents, government printing office, Washington, D. C.
