Brush Eradication To Be Discussed Saturday

Establishing brush eradication plots in Jackson county will be discussed Saturday night at a meeting of the Jackson County Stockman's association, according to Armin Richter, president.

At the meeting, scheduled for 7:30 p.m. at the Central Point Grange hall, a program similar to that tried successfully in south Texas will be discussed for Jackson county.

An especially designed tractor will be brought to Jackson county by the Caterpillar Tractor company by June 15, according to tentative plans, Richter said. This brush-ripping machine will be tried on four or five experimental plots in the Applegate area and special range grasses planted. A more wide-scale operation is planned in the county for this fall, the association president said.

A motion picture of the Caterpillar Tractor company's work in south Texas will be shown Saturday night. Committee reports will include membership and finance, transportation and marketing, forestry range and public land use.

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Ashland Council Supports School

Ashland—Members of the Ashland city council Tuesday voted to support the proposed \$1,275,000 junior high school. Ashland residents will vote on the bond issue April 22.

The council's support of the issue was not unanimous, however, as on the first count Mayor Richard Neill's vote in favor was necessary to break a tie.

Opposition to the council's support of the proposed school was that the question was up to the voting public and was not a function of the city council to express an opinion.

Councilmen also commented on the fact that the school will be built outside the city limits making it necessary to install sewage facilities. Council members seemed to feel that another site within the city sewage system area would have been available.

All councilmen were reported to have agreed that another junior high school was needed.
