Missions Institute Planned in Valley By Presbyterians

The Rev. Harold Voelkel of Korea will preach at both morning services of the First Presbyterian church Sunday on the theme "Open and Closed Doors."

This will be the opening message of the Missions Institute which is being held in the church from Sunday through Wednesday.

Mr. Voelkel has served in Korea since 1929. During World War II when work was interrupted, he spent time in Japan studying that language and then served as a U. S. Army chaplain from 1943 to 1946. Since 1950 he has been on special service for the United States government as a chaplain among Korean prisoners-of-war and has helped serve the more than 15,000 Protestant prisoners.

At the first service Westminster choir will sing the anthem "I Will Lift Up Mine Eyes" and at the second service the chancel choir will sing "Open Our Eyes." James Baker, tenor, will sing the solo "The Lord is My Light" at both services.

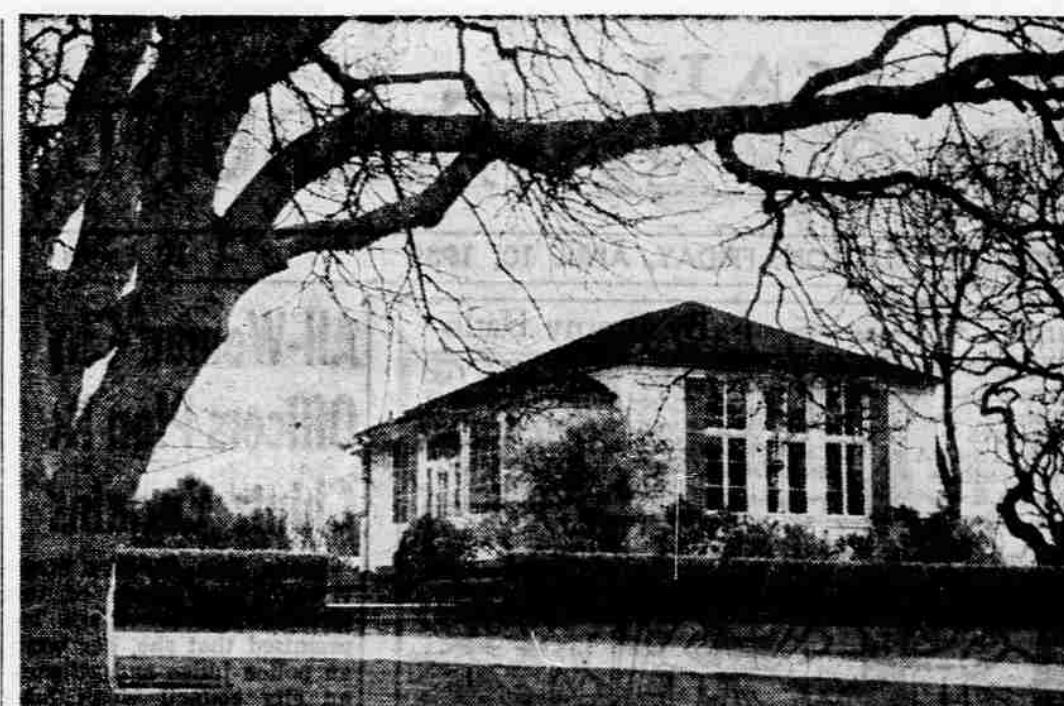
