

Grants Pass Coos Second Straight Rogue Diadem; Medford Second

Tornado Clips Distance Medley Record Breaker

It was the same contenders one-two again yesterday as the Medford Kiwanis club and Medford High School put on the 20th annual Rogue Valley relays.

Grants Pass high copped its second straight Rogue diadem and Medford was runner-up. The defending champion Cavemen claimed the blue ribbons in six of the 12 events and recorded 85 1/3 points. Medford's Black Tornado was 6 1/3 markers back at 79 after triumphs in five of the contests.

Marshfield of Coos Bay, which took the shot put relay, was third in the meet with 58 1/3. Crater scored 47 1/3. Klamath Falls 34 and Ashland 15.

The Tornado came up with the big highlight of the afternoon when its tremendous distance medley team clipped 15.2 seconds off the previous meet standard for the only record-breaking performance of the afternoon. Medford's quartet of Mark Norton in the three-fourths-mile, Ron Reich in the quarter, Bruce

Hill in the half and Roger Johnson in the mile combined for 10:56.2. The two-year-old former mark was 11:11.4 set by Grants Pass.

Unofficial Times
An unofficial watch across the field from the start and finish of the race caught Johnson in 4:36.3, Hill in a brilliant 1:58, Reich in :53.2 and Norton in 3:27.2.

Grants Pass gained its first places in the 440-yard, two-mile and mile relays, the shuttle hurdles, the pole vault and the javelin. Glen Winingham, Grants Pass, state A-1 champ in the spear toss, was over 200 feet in winning his specialty yesterday but short of the 207-foot 5-inch mark he set last year in the Rogues. His distance was 205-9.

The Cavemen of GP were :45 flat in the 440, 8:25.8 in the two-mile, 3:33.5 in the mile and :36 even in the shuttles. Lee Holmes won the pole vault at 12 feet for GP.

Medford high jump team of George Koch, Jerry Shultz and Wayne Ayres came within three-fourths of an inch from equalling that relay mark. Koch and Shultz went 6 feet each and Ayres 5-6 for a 17-6 aggregate.

Nored Victory
Larry Nored won the discus for the Tornado with 140-3. Medford's 880 relayers were clocked in the fine early season time of 1:32.9. Broad jump mark for Medford was 58-9 3/4.

Marshfield totaled 137-4 in the shot.

Grants Pass had one second place, a tie for second, five thirds, two fifths and a tie for fifth to go along with its firsts. The Cavemen were helped by a new rule this year which permitted the efforts of two participants of each school to qualify for points in the javelin, pole vault and discus.

Medford had seconds in three events and a third and a fourth. The Tornado was hurt by lack of entry in the pole vault because of the current surge of flu which weakened just about all of the participating squads.

Mile Relay Thrilling
The Tornado failed to place in the javelin and came in second in the shot put which it was favored to win. Mike Murray, who has put the shot over 58 feet so far this spring, managed only one good throw of 48-10 for the Tornado yesterday. Jerry Larsen of Marshfield had a best put of 53-2 1/2.

The mile relay had the most thrilling finish. Larry Johnson had the lead for Grants Pass on the final lap. He was passed as he came into the backstretch by Keran Bennett of Crater and Ron Reich of Medford. Then Reich passed Bennett only to have Johnson, with a great kick at the finish, break the tape first.

USC Cinder Team Nabs Track Win

Los Angeles—UPB—The University of Southern California track and field team rode roughshod over California Saturday in a Pacific Coast conference dual meet, defeating the Bears 80 2/3 - 50 1/3.

Most of the expected close races failed to materialize as the Trojans, favored to win, came through with unexpected victories in most of California's strong events.

Perhaps the top surprise of the day was the double win by Angelo Coia, a football halfback, in both sprints. Coia upset the favored Willie White in the 100-yard dash in 9.9, run against a slight wind, and then easily took the 220 in 21.7.

Bobby Staten scored an even bigger upset by taking the 440 from Cal's Jack Yeraman in 47 seconds flat, which tied the meet record. The San Diego sophomore then went on to take the low hurdles in 23.5 seconds.

The other double win of the day was scored by USC's Charlie Dumas who won the high hurdles in meet record time of 14.2 and easily captured the high jump with a leap of 6 feet, 8 inches.

California did not take a first place until the eighth event when Jerry Siebert won the 800 in 1:57.6 as expected. The Bears came back several events later with Wayne Crow winning at 158 feet, 6 inches.

The two mile run easily as Alan Gaylord won in 9:21.1 and took the mile relay in 3:14.3 to set a meet record.

Thanks to the McKeever twins, the Trojans swept the shot put, Marlin won the event at 55 feet 6 3/4 inches and Mike was second at 53 feet, 3 3/4.

It was Southern California's 17th straight meet win over California and 82nd dual meet in which they have gone undefeated.

PIONEERS WINNERS
Salem—UPB—Lewis and Clark defeated Willamette, 6-5, in a Northwest Conference baseball game here Friday, scoring four runs at the top of the ninth inning. It was the first conference game of the season for both schools.

Gerry Stickley paced the Pioneer attack with a home run and a single for three RBIs in four times up. Dick Hamada hit a home run with one aboard for Willamette in the third.

Best high jumps and Bob Drace and Bob Lewis, Klamath Falls, and John Burns of Crater each cleared 5-11. Crater's and Klamath's second place tie in the relay event was at 17.4, two inches back of Medford.

Hunter Jumps 21-3
Walt Hunter, Marshfield, had best individual broad jump at 21-3 and Leonard Griggs followed with 20-8 3/4 for Medford. The Marshfield second place distance was 58-5 and Grants Pass had 57-3 1/4.

Burns of Crater was second in the javelin with a fine throw of 191-7 1/2 and Rick Hughes, Marshfield, went 11-6 for pole vault runner-up.

It was the third Rogue victory for Grants Pass in four years. A question arose, however, as to whether the Cavemen retired the Kiwanis trophy. There was contention that the meet must be won three consecutive times for permanent possession. Kiwanis are looking into their records.

Cubs Pitched To 6-1 Win Over L.A.

Chicago—UPB—Bob Anderson, aided by Sammy Taylor's four runs batted in, pitched the Chicago Cubs to a 6-1 triumph over the Los Angeles Dodgers Saturday, scattering six hits, before a crowd of 12,288 at the delayed opening day contest in 42 - degree weather.

Don Drysdale, the Dodgers' starter, struck out seven men before he was replaced by Art Fowler after the Cubs' four-run fifth inning.

Rookie George Altman started the uprising with his second single of the game and advanced on Ernie Banks' sacrifice. Walt Moryn walked and rookie Earl Averill drove in one run with a double.

Dale Long was walked intentionally and, after Bobby Thomson forced Moryn at home, Taylor came through with a two-base liner down the left field line to clear the bases. The Cubs tallied twice in the fourth after Moryn and Averill singled. Both advanced on Drysdale's wild pitch and Moryn was safe at home when catcher John Roseboro dropped Don Zimmer's throw after Thomson's grounder. Taylor singled to score Averill.

Chicago made four inning-ending double plays to stifle the Dodgers' attack, and only one Los Angeles runner got past second base, Drysdale on his third inning homer for the Dodgers only run.

The win was Anderson's first over the Dodgers and gave him a major league record of four wins and four losses. Last year, when he won three games, he suffered two of his three defeats against the Dodgers.

The Comets of Central Point broke a 4-all knot in the conference scrap with runs in the fourth and sixth innings. Bill Ahnorn of Crater and Alan McKinnis of Ashland each hurled seventh ball. Ahnorn fanned 12 batters and walked three. McKinnis registered nine strikeouts and issued four bases on balls.

Three-Run Triple
Jerry Korbel's triple drove a run in the first inning to give Crater a lead in the game. But, Pete Stemple walked and Bob Johnson roundedtrip in the same can to for a 2 to 1 Ashland jump. With a little bit of luck, Jones would have had a shutout. But sloppy fielding, which plagued him when he was in a St. Louis uniform, gave the Cards their two runs in the eighth inning.

Cepeda's second double, in the seventh, scored the same two runners and Jones himself accounted for the other score with a sacrifice in the sixth to bring in Daryl Spencer.

Jones started his quest for another strikeout championship by fanning seven in his debut.

The Braves collected only six hits but three of them were homers by Del Crandall, Eddie Mathews and Hank Aaron. All those blows came off loser Vern Law, who lasted only 4 1/3 innings.

Lew Burdette was tagged for 12 hits and had to survive a ninth inning threat to post his first triumph of the season. Smoky Burgess opened the ninth with a pinch single and pinch-runner Roman Mejias moved to second on a sacrifice. After Robert Clemente beat out a hit along the first base line, Bob Skinner fled deep to Wes Covington. Mejias tried to score after the catch but was doubled at the plate on Covington's fine throw.
