

Medford Grabs Two Games, Ties One, Loses One

Medford High school's hard socking baseball contingent won two games, tied one and lost one in a two-day week end jaunt into the Willamette Valley.

The Tornado diamonders split a doubleheader with North Eugene yesterday, winning the opener 11 to 2 and dropping the second 9 to 6. On Friday they nipped the Springfield high nine 3 to 2 then tied the Millers 3-all in a second mix halted after four innings because of darkness.

Yesterday in the first game, Medford unloaded with nine runs in the extra eighth inning. Bob Quinney and Ray Konopasek doubled, Ken Jensen singled twice and Jerry Anderson once and there were four walks and an error in the inning.

Durkee Homers

Ken Durkee homered for a tying Medford tally in the fifth inning. Konopasek had two doubles and a single in the fracas to knock in two runs and Jensen's singles accounted for four counters.

Tom Laurance pitched a two-hitter for Medford, walking four and whiffing nine.

North Eugene took the second mix with six runs in the bottom of the fourth panel. Medford tosser Pat McLaughlin, who gave up five walks in the game, yielded four of them in the fourth along with hits by Frybeck and Lake. There also was an error in the game. Baker had a homer in the game for the Eugene club.

Medford whacked the ball well despite the loss, with Konopasek rapping a single and triple, Jensen a single and double and Anderson a triple.

Three Hitter

Six of the Tornado's 10 hits in the 11 innings of play against Springfield went for extra bases. Second game was halted after four innings of darkness.

Dennis Barr chucked three-hit ball as Medford took the opener. Cal Dean hit a pair of two-baggers, Ray Konopasek doubled and singled, Jerry Anderson and Ken Jensen doubled and tripled in the game for the Tornado.

A dropped fly ball put Konopasek on base in the seventh inning and Cal Dean doubled him home for the winning run. Other Medford markers were in the fifth frame on a single by Konopasek, an outfield error and Cal's other two-baser in the sixth on walk to Anderson and Jensen's two-base Sox.

Springfield put over one run in the third canto on singles by Herman and Haugen and two outfield errors and one in the sixth on a dropped third strike, a sacrifice by Eaton and a single by Johnson.

Barr struck out 10 batters, hit two and walked one in the

tussle while Clark walked five and fanned seven.

The Black Tornado's three runs in the abbreviated second scrape were all in the first stanza. Konopasek and Cal Dean singled, Lowell Dean three-bagger, then home and scored himself on a wild pitch.

Two Miller markers were in the second inning on singles by Reynolds and Johnson, two bases on balls and a fielder's choice. Singles by Haugen and Eaton and a hit batter gained the knotting tally in the fourth.

Anderson, hurling a four-hitter for Medford, got eight batters out on strikeout. He yielded three bases on balls and hit two batters. Johnson for the Millers fanned two and walked one in a three-hit job.

Konopasek hit three for four for Medford, Cal Dean three for six and Lowell Dean two for five for the two games on Friday.

State Board To Check Red Sox

Boston.—UPI—A state board may investigate Boston Red Sox employment policies as an aftermath of sending Negro infielder Jerry (Pumpsie) Green to a farm club.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People disclosed Saturday that it would ask the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination Tuesday to start an inquiry of the team's hiring program.

However, the inquiry would be limited probably to a check on Red Sox employment practices in Boston. Commission Executive Secretary Walter Nolan said it was unlikely his group could look into the Green affair since it occurred in Arizona where the Red Sox held spring training.

Green, the first Negro to wear a Red Sox uniform, was optioned to Minneapolis last Tuesday on a 24-hour recall basis. Pumpsie had hit .252 for Minneapolis, a Red Sox farm club, last season.

Gus Wynn Pitches To 250th Win

Early (Gus) Wynn Saturday became the 15th pitcher in modern baseball history to score 250 victories when he pitched the Chicago White Sox to a 5-3 decision over the Detroit Tigers.

Wynn, a 39-year old knuckleballer, received long ball socking support from Sherman Lollar who hit two homers and little Luis Aparicio who hit the ninth homer of his four-year career. The supposedly weak-hitting White Sox won Friday's opener with the Tiger on Nelson Fox's first homer in more than a year.

Aparicio's homer put the White Sox ahead, 4-3, in the seventh and Lollar's second homer clinched matters in the eighth. Lollar singled home a run in the first inning and hit his first homer in the sixth.

Ray Narleski who took over in the seventh inning, was tagged for Chicago's last two runs and suffered the defeat. Narleski and Don Mossi, obtained from the Cleveland Indians during the winter, have suffered both Detroit defeats this season.

Wynn retired the last 10 batters in order. Only one run was earned as he walked three and struck out six. He leads all active pitchers in total victories. Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves ranks next with 247.

Don Ferrarese and Dick Brodowski combined in a four-hitter to give Cleveland a 3-2 win over the Kansas City Athletics in the only other game. Boston at New York and Baltimore at Washington were rained out.

Brodowski retired Bob Cerv with the bases filled and one out and then got Harry Chitt for the final out to end Kansas City's final threat in the eighth inning. George Strickland led Cleveland with two doubles.

Sac Team Nips Chico State

John Beaver of the Hornets tied the school record with a time of 9.9 in the 100 yard dash and also came in first in the 220 yard dash.

PET OR PEST?

What can we do about the stray cat problem? How can we stop them from prowling the back fences, singing their agonized love song through our slumber hours, digging up our treasured plants, chasing squirrels, killing birds—the list of complaints goes on and on.

In order to deal with the problem we must first understand its cause. America's cat population is estimated at 21,000,000. Of this total approximately 50 per cent are homeless, according to a report from the American Feline Society. How did a situation like this occur? Through the thoughtless negligence of cat-owners who permit indiscriminate breeding, and then turn unwanted kittens out to fend for themselves. Through the misguided kindness of cat-owners who say with conviction, "A cat is a wild animal and must not be confined," and put out their pet at night to annoy the neighborhood and risk an untimely death from traffic or disease.

Is there a solution? It lies, we believe, with you. First, if you have a kitten, train it to walk on a leash just as you would train your puppy. It takes patience, but it can be done. Second, keep your pet at home where it belongs. Third, unless you are a professional breeder have your female spayed. Only in this way can we cut down the tremendous over-population of unwanted kitten waifs which crowd every animal shelter in the country.

Senate Approves Traffic Code Offered by Interim Committee

Salem.—UPI—A new traffic code embracing the uniform traffic ticket and complaint form urged by the American Bar Association was adopted by the Senate Friday. The bill now goes to the House.

The new code was recommended by the Interim Committee on Judicial Administration.

Sen. Carl Francis (R-Dayton) said most of the recommendations of the interim committee were adopted but the Senate Judiciary committee did not concur on allowing a police officer to issue an arrest warrant for any accident that he did not personally view.

In cases of misdemeanors, an accused motorist may leave his drivers license in lieu of bail and receive from the state motor vehicle department a certificate allowing him to operate his car. Could Be Revoked.

Should he fail to appear at a hearing, his operator's license would be revoked. If he appeared in court to answer the charge his license would be returned.

One important change from present law is that it would permit city traffic officers who are pursuing a fleeing motorist to continue the chase outside the city limits and make an arrest when he apprehends the motorist. At present city traffic officers cannot do this.

In all cases where a motorist is charged with a felony arrests must be made, but in minor traffic cases, a motorist can present his automobile club card in lieu of bail. No traffic officer would be permitted to accept cash bail from any motorist.

Bail Collection Barred

The interim committee had recommended that police officers could collect up to \$400 in bail. But members of the Judiciary frowned on this suggestion and changed the

provision to bar any further bail collections by officers on the road.

Uniform fines may be established by a traffic rules committee, provided in the code, after such schedules have been approved by the State Supreme court.

Sen. Melvin Goode (R-Albany) said adoption of the uniform traffic ticket and complaint method would save the cost of a number of clerks in virtually every district attorney's office in the state. Clerks are now required to prepare complaints, Goode said, for all traffic cases, even those in which the accused had pleaded guilty.

Clerks in district courts likewise make up lists that will no longer be needed if the uniform plan is adopted.

36 Area Employees Of State Receive Safe Driving Awards

Thirty-six Oregon state highway department vehicle and equipment operators from the Southern Oregon area have been presented safe driving awards for accident free driving in 1958, the state highway department announced.

They are among 1,043 state employees to receive awards, which are limited to those employees who spend at least 55 per cent of their time

driving, who work all year and who have no accidents charged to them.

Sen. Neuberger Asks Klamath Indian Loans

Washington.—UPI—The Senate passed and sent to the House Friday a bill to authorize interior department loans to assist Klamath Indians in Oregon during termination of federal government control over the tribe.

Under the measure introduced by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) the loans would be made without interest from a department revolving loan fund.

Gold Hill Council Seeks Public Trash Dump Site

Gold Hill.—The Gold Hill city council last week asked the Jackson county court to provide a public trash dumping grounds.

The council adopted a resolution in which it noted that there are now no facilities provided by the county where "the general public can lawfully dispose of trash which accumulates on their premises." It noted that lack of such facilities "tends to encourage much promiscuous dumping of trash along the county and state roads and even on private property without permission."

The Council asked the county court to conduct a study of the possibility of establishing one or more public trash dumping grounds, which would be administered by the county.

In other action, the Gold Hill council approved a request for allowing a trailer house to be located within the city if proper regulations are followed.

It also changed the zone from business to residence on a piece of property.

The council reminded residents that burning permits are now necessary for burning within the city. Permits may be obtained from Fire Chief Clyde Kell. Burning will be permitted before 10 a.m., and no night burning will be permitted.

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
