The tea is planned for Friday, April 17 from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m.

The money donated by guests at the tea is given to the Cancer society to aid in its threefold programs of education, service, and research. The tea, always one of April's largest events, will be held at Hillcrest Orchards again this year, and the beauty of the trees in bloom should rival the man-made perfection of the objects d'art on display. French porcelain, belonging to Mrs. Fred C. Shere, a Staffordshire tureen, loaned by Mrs. Clinton Spencer, and jade and ivory, shown by Mrs. Sam L. Gilbert, are among the collector's items to be exhibited.

Other exhibits will be in keeping with the Centennial theme. Mrs. H. A. Stanley will loan a pitcher that came around the Horn about a century ago, and a fluting iron,

Most of the committee members, who will serve as hostesses, will be gowned in cotton copies of pioneer frocks, since the genuine old gowns are too fragile to withstand any activity by the wearer.

The upper floor of Hillcrest will display both beauty and originality, in the flower arrangements that are being done by many local groups. These exhibits will be given anonymous numbers, and the best arrangements will be chosen by popular vote, as in past years.
