Students To Sing In Chorus

Portland - Two original musical works by members of the Marylhurst College faculty will be performed at the Holy Names centenary concert at Portland's Civic Auditorium, Friday, May 1.

A 75-piece orchestra, including guest players from the Portland Symphony Orchestra and conducted by the noted director, Roger Wagner, Los Angeles, will play three movements from the "Chronicle of Creation," an orchestral suite composed by Sister M. Anne Cecile. The "Magnificat," a choral work by Sister Mary Teresine, will be performed with orchestra by a 175-voice chorus made up of students from Marylhurst college, Holy Names college, Spokane, and high schools in Portland, Spokane, Seattle, Astoria, Eugene, Medford and Salem.

The concert commemorates the centennial observance of the admission of Oregon to the Union and the founding of St. Mary's academy, Portland, the first educational establishment of the Sisters of the Holy Names in the Pacific Northwest. The Community now teaches 19,000 students in Oregon and Washington schools stemming from the 1859 foundation.

Box office exchange is being handled by J. K. Gill's in Portland.

St. Mary's school, Medford, will send five girls to take part in the chorus. They are Sharon Roberts, Marilyn Martin, Toni Adams, Irene McGowan, and Virginia Michael. Carol Robinson, a St. Mary's graduate of 1958, will sing as a representative of Marylhurst college.

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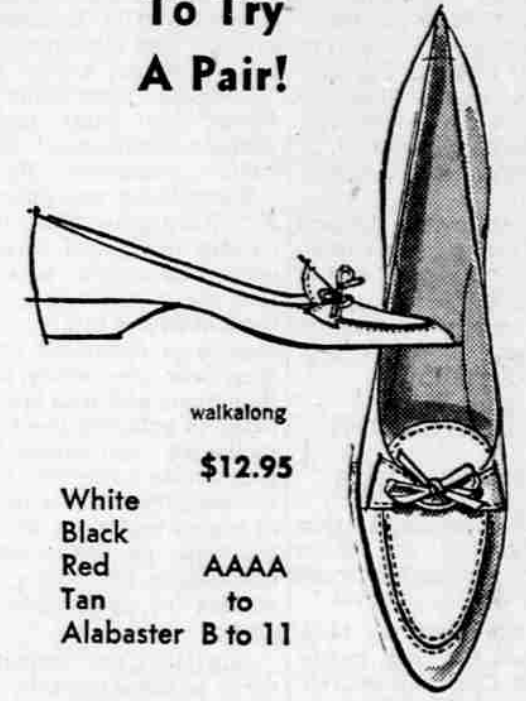
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"Let's talk dry cleaning"
