

Philharmonic Rehearsals Continue; Concert Slated

Rehearsals are underway each week for the final concert of the 1958-59 season of the Philharmonic Society of Southern Oregon. Director Richard D. Werner has announced that the concert will be given Sunday, April 26, at 3 p.m. at Medford high school auditorium.

For an overture for the program Mr. Werner has chosen Beethoven's "Egmont," one of several which this composer

wrote as incidental music for plays or dramas. It is described as typically Beethoven in breadth and character.

Two other works to be heard are "Symphony in C Major" by Bizet and "La Botique Fantastique" by the Italian composer, Respighi.

Since being reorganized by Mr. Werner in 1956, the orchestra has given three concerts each season. It is hoped that this number may be increased in the future. The orchestra is composed of local musicians who enjoy playing fine music and who are "dedicated to bringing the cultural values of such music to the community." Director Werner is recognized as a musician of wide experience who gives his time in order that the community may have an orchestra of symphonic character.

Musicians are recruited as far as possible from the Rogue valley. Other players, particularly of instruments such as oboe, English horn, French horn and bassoon, are brought from Grants Pass, Roseburg and Eugene.

"Why should we not put together a percentage of our raw materials, our manufactured goods, our food products, some of our scientists, technologists, economists, some of our trucks, ships, aircraft-to vanquish misery, develop the resources, and help the work of less developed peoples? Let us do this-not that they should be the pawns of our policies, but to improve the chances of life and peace. How much more worth while that would be than all the territorial demands, ideological pretensions, imperialist ambitions which are leading the universe to its death."

These are the words of President de Gaulle of France as given in the first press conference ever held by a French president. William H. Stringer of the Christian Science Monitor believes that "le grand Charles" with his words "in a few mild sentences took the play away from Premier Khrushchev and pushed the problem of Berlin way down on the world calendar of urgent events-down to where it belongs-and elevated the problem of helping the vast underfed and harassed hordes of this earth."

Correspondent Stringer concluded: "Someone in high office is needed who can add up these sordid behaviours now and then in flaming words that the world will heed and then can point the way to better behaviour and dare the Communists to take the better path."-O.S.
