New York—Bache and Co. notices strong formations being built by such rail leaders as Atlantic Coast Line, Great Northern, Denver & Rio Grande, says improvement in these pivots is bound to bring a greater following into other rails, thus reinforcing the technical pattern of the market as a whole.

Val Alstyne, Noel & Co. feel the current hesitation is an indication the market is bracing itself for a further upward move and says it would expect

the latter to occur soon.

American Telephone always has been regarded as one of the highest quality common stock investments. If there is added to this the belief the stock may now be regarded as a growth equity, Reynolds & Co. says, a basic reappraisal of the stock should take place. Senior Center Has Library of More Than 500 Volumes

With a donation of 400 books from the private library of L. G. McLaren, 1820 Crown ave., by him to the Rogue Valley Council on Aging for use at the Senior Activity Center, more than 500 books are now available at the center, Frank Glonning, chairman of the council, announced.

The books at the center have been donated by interested persons and clubs, it was reported, with the library given by McLaren the largest group to be received from one person.

The books are available to any adult over 50 years of age who may either read them at the center or take them home.
