Progress Reported In Shortage Study

Salem - The emergency Transportation Committee appointed by Gov. Mark Hatfield to study a possible railroad car shortage in Oregon this summer reported "gratifying progress" in an all-day meeting Saturday with representatives of major railroads serving the state.

Chairman R. J. Hogue, Medford lumberman, said the committee approved a plan calling on shippers and receivers of freight to expedite efficiency in loading and offered other suggestions to avoid a "tight-car situation."

New York - Stocks came to life today in moderate trading. Profit taking and selling to raise cash for tax purposes hit some issues but the market on balance made its best showing in more than a week.

The drugs, chemicals, and electronics were among the strongest groups. Tires were firm on the outlook for an early settlement of the strike now curtailing operations in that industry.

The market received a boost from a prediction that Du Pont's first quarter earnings may run 70 per cent ahead of a year ago. That issue ran up more than 4 points before running into some resistance.

Jennings Lodge Fire Fatal To Two

Oregon City, Ore. - Two small children burned to death and their parents suffered serious injuries when fire destroyed their home early Sunday at nearby Jennings Lodge.

The dead were Terri Lee Jones, 20 months, and her 6-month-old brother, Allen David Jones. The mother, Mrs. Maleta Lynn Jones, 20, suffered second and third degree burns over one third of her body.

Authorities said the father, David A. Jones, attempted to save the children by smashing the windows of the burning one-story frame structure. He was brought to a hospital here in deep shock and treated for severe wrist and hand cuts.

National Chain to Build Drive-in Here

The Golden Hamburger Drive-in corporation, a new national chain with headquarters in Chicago, has announced that they will construct a drive-in in Medford this year.

The local drive-in will be one of five scheduled to be constructed in Oregon cities. The company was reported to be currently negotiating for locations and operators throughout the state.

President of the chain, Thomas A. Anderson, estimated each drive-in will represent an investment of approximately \$100,000. Each building in the chain has a vermillion roof which slopes to the ground and is topped by a 21-foot golden spire. Exteriors are of porcelain enameled steel and will be lighted at night by floodlights.
