The week is set aside to "promote kindness toward all living things," according to William O. Herring, local humane officer. He said that most people want to be kind, and that many acts of cruelty can be attributed to thoughtlessness.

"Be Kind to Animals Week is the time when we rededicate ourselves to principles of kindness for another year," Herring said.

Animals provide an excellent medium for teaching kindness to children. "The experience of holding a wriggling, happy puppy is a stronger inducement to an attitude of kindness than the most eloquent lecture. In addition, a person who is sincerely kind to animals will also tend to be more considerate in his dealing with other people," Herring added.

Soldier of Fortune Returns From Cuba

Chicago (UPI)—Ex-Navy pilot Alan Robert Nye, convicted of trying to kill Fidel Castro and given 48 hours to get out of Cuba or be executed, made the trip in 12 hours and Monday was back home in Indiana.

"I'm not mad at anybody," Nye said on his arrival here. "Cuban politics no longer are my affair."

The lanky soldier of fortune was greeted by his mother, Mrs. Helen Lynch, 52. Nye, 32, was convicted Sunday by a three-man Cuban tribunal which took only 10 minutes to reach a verdict after a five and one-half-hour nighttime trial in the officer's club of Cabana Fortress at Havana. The court said Nye was offered \$100,000 to kill Castro.

Nye denied all the charges. After his conviction, Nye was told he would be shot on sight if he stayed in Cuba more than 48 hours.

Talent Man's Newspapers Date Back to One Published in 1884

Two newspapers from a collection of Bernard Roberts, route 1, box 516, Talent, are of interest to valley residents. The newspapers are the Oregon Sentinel, published in Jacksonville, and dated Jan. 5, 1884, and Medford Monitor, published here and dated Feb. 20, 1885.

Roberts is a grandson of J. S. Howard, who opened the first store and post office in Medford. He first transacted business in a tent, it was reported, while the building for his business was constructed.

Howard, who also operated a store in Jacksonville which burned, moved to Medford where he and his brother, Charles Howard, surveyed the Medford township for the Southern Pacific railroad.

In Jacksonville County Roberts also owns an envelope which is addressed to J. S. Howard, Esq., Jacksonville, Ore., postmarked from Grants Pass, Jackson County, Oregon, Jan. 1, 1884. Postage on the envelope was two cents.

The letter was mailed prior to the time when Jackson county was divided to form Josephine and parts of Douglas and Curry counties.

The Sentinel was published Saturdays by Frank Krause and the Monitor was edited by M. A. McGinnis and appeared on Fridays. They contained no pictures except in advertisements and each had seven columns of news with the majority of page 1 advertising.

Real estate ads dominated the front pages of the newspapers with one land agent proclaiming the area the "Italy of Oregon" and simply stated "Seek, and Ye shall find" them at the office of A. L. Johnson.

J. S. Howard's pioneer post-office store was advertised as "where the naked are clothed and the hungry fed."

Nearly buried on page 3 of the Jacksonville paper is an article headed "Our New Year's Fire," which described about half of the block on California st. from the corner of Third.

It destroyed the Noland and Ulrich saloon, postoffice building, C. S. Savage New State hotel, and buildings owned by Max Muller, J. S. Howard, B. Fisher, L. Solomon (post office), P. J. Ryan, C. W. Savage, H. M. Rise (photographic gallery), and T. T. McKenzie.

The buildings on the opposite side of the street were scorched, the newspaper reported, and the Beekman express office and Jones saloon in the rear of the block damaged.

Another news story comments on a proposed home-stead law amendment. Construction progress on the California and Oregon railroad from north of Redding to Willamette valley was explained as being "through a country in which railroad building is very difficult."

The city charter of Medford was mentioned in the first issue of the Medford paper. "The question of incorporating Medford has been the occasion of much dissatisfaction and wrangling among the citizens. The articles of incorporation were voted upon by the people of Medford, and soon after submitted to the State Congress for approval. Notwithstanding the fact that a strong remonstrance was sent to congress, it has passed both houses, and now awaits the signature of the governor."

McGinnis readily admitted "of the article of incorporation we know nothing, and are therefore unable to pass judgment upon the wisdom of the same. But one thing we will say, let there be harmony. We will gain nothing by being divided upon questions that effect our vital interests."

The Fruit-Growers Association of Southern Oregon scheduled a meeting, which was announced in the Monitor, and stressed that fruit-growing "is destined to become in the near future, the leading industry of this section of our state."

Another article mentioned that a Joseph Stuart of Illinois had arrived in the valley with "a large number of pear grafts and other fruit trees."

Postal service also received its share of complaints in the 1880s. The Sentinel reported



that it had been two weeks, since the last mail reached Jacksonville from the north, and stated, "notwithstanding the fact that considerable railroad track has been washed out between Grants Pass and Glendale it does seem to us that some arrangements could be made for the carrying of the mail around the break by wagons. To say that this order of things is getting monotonous to the residents of southern Oregon doesn't half express it and whoever is to blame should suffer the damages."

Voting For Senator

In a news story on the voting for senator, the Medford editor comments "our senatorial elections are always a drawback to good legislation. The method of electing senators ought to be changed. They should be chosen by direct vote of the people, and the Constitution of the United States ought to be amended so as to permit it."

Under Jacksonville local items a variety of topics were discussed. They mentioned the road work recently done on Fifth st. seems to have made that thoroughfare worse instead of better, and stated that B. F. Alley had arrived from California to assist Mr. Lang in writing Walling's history of Southern Oregon.

Governor Moody's appointment of L. R. Webster of Jacksonville as circuit judge of the first judicial district was announced by the Sentinel upon the resignation of H. K. Hanna.

Editorial Comment

Editorial comment also crept into the news. Krause wrote that the Honorable L. R. Webster "is now the circuit judge—the first Republican that ever filled the office. Notwithstanding this fact we predict that he will make an able, honest and upright judge."

Medford local items claimed that "our streets will soon be graded." Trout was also reported to be plentiful in the Rogue river with many 12 pounders having been caught.

The column closes with, "Medford is the center of Jackson county and will no doubt in the near future, become well we don't like to make our friends under the foot hills feel bad."

"Members of the board are pledged to abide by a strict code of ethics in real estate transactions, which require him to affirm that his every undertaking shall be in the interest of his client and the community."

All real estate dealers are not Realtors, Herried explained, and added that the Realty board as an agency has certain policing powers over its members.

Herried assumed the presidency of the Medford Realty board recently, following the death of John C. Malone, who was president for the year beginning Jan. 1. Herried, who served as president several years ago, will serve for the balance of 1959.

He said he will continue with the same policies, looking toward a better understanding between home buyers and sellers, and the Realtors.
