Cuban Execution
Toll Rises To 549
Havana — (UPI) — The execution of 16 "war criminals" Wednesday — the largest number killed in a single day during the past month — increased the total toll of Cuba's revolutionary firing squads to 549 dead.

Nine men faced firing squads in Santa Clara, three each in Havana and Holguin and one in Jiguani.

Astoria Bridge Bill Recommended

Salem — (UPI) — The Senate State and Federal Affairs committee Wednesday recommended unanimously that House bill 425 providing for a \$24 million bond issue to construct a toll bridge over the Columbia river at Astoria be passed on the Senate floor.

A major amendment to the bill from the version passed by the House adds an additional \$4 million for improvement of Highway 42 in southern Oregon.

The committee held hearings on the bill last Monday at which time a group of "Housewives for 42" testified that Highway 42 was in urgent need of improvement between Roseburg and Coquille.

Sen. Boyd Overhulse (D-Madras), chairman of the committee, thought the bill would come up for a vote either Friday or next Monday.

Dexter Bound Over To Grand Jury

Rollin Benjamin Dexter, 49, of 12 Rose ave., Medford, was bound over to the grand jury on charges of extortion yesterday in district court. He is being held on \$1,500 bail.

Dexter had waived his rights to a preliminary hearing. He was arrested by sheriff's deputies Monday on charges of blackmailing David Lee Mathias, 28, of 724 Alder st., Medford.

Sheriff's deputies arrested Dexter shortly after Mathias had given him a roll of marked bills.

Amended Power Proposal Favored

Salem — (UPI) — The House bill which would put Oregon in the power business was reported out of the House Judiciary committee today in an amended form with a "do pass" recommendation.

The committee placed a referendum clause in the bill so that if it passed it will go to the voters at the 1960 election. The committee also restricted sale of power by the proposed power commission to wholesale sales.

Rep. George Layman (R-Newberg) chairman of the committee, commented that the bill as amended should satisfy every member of the House.

Construction Bill Debated by House

Washington — (UPI) — The House began debate today on a measure that would authorize \$1,251,907 in military construction during fiscal 1960.

This was \$109,300 more than a President Eisenhower asked for the 12 months beginning July 1.

The bill was virtually certain to be approved and sent to the Senate without major changes.

A fat slice of the defense construction money is earmarked for building missile facilities. This measure merely would authorize the work. Another bill would put up the actual cash.

The bill would authorize construction costing \$199,045,000 by the Army, \$182,283,000 by the Navy, \$808,722,000 by the Air Force and \$57,128,000 by military reserve forces.

Paignton, England — (UPI) — A smart fox has picked a well-stocked source for his dinners — the Paignton Zoo bird cage.

Stocks Cap Rally With Record Highs

New York — (UPI) — Stocks capped a five-day rally today by breaking through their historic highs.

The industrial average, sparked by sharp gains in American Telephone and DuPont, easily soared above the previous record high set March 13. The rail average rose to its best level since early in January.

The rally today added more than \$2 billion to market valuations and brought the gain for the past five sessions to about \$6 billion.

American Telephone, responding to stockholder approval of a 3 for 1 split, soared more than 9 points at its high and touched a new 29-year top.

The new stock which will be outstanding after the split becomes effective April 24 began trading today. It was quoted around 86.

Autos were firm as a group with the exception of Chrysler. Tires were firm with the exception of Goodyear.
