City Council Awards Contract, Other Projects Considered

A contract for constructing the Berrydale sanitary sewer system at a cost of \$221,912.75 was awarded by the Medford city council last night to Jeske Brothers Construction company, Eugene.

The Jeske Brothers bid over five per cent below the engineer's estimate, includes the alternate of asbestos cement service connections.

The contract does not include two pumping stations in the system, for which Den Herder Construction company, Lebanon, was apparent low bidder. City Manager Robert A. Duff asked that the contract for this part of the project be deferred until the bids are qualified and until bids are adjusted for a new site location.

The council approved, following public hearings, a sanitary sewer project for an area east of South Riverside ave. and a water main project for Mary st. between Saling ave. and East Jackson st. Duff was authorized to call for bids on each.

The sewer project would serve most of the area from the intersection of Spencer ave. and 12th st. south to Stewart ave., and from South Riverside ave. east to the proposed Highway 99 freeway right of way.

Duff estimated assessments for the sewer at \$2.35 per front foot, \$84 per acre and \$45 per connection. He stated that property owners already served by a city sewer would not be assessed for the new project.

Property owners at the hearing spoke both for and against the sewer, with several asking the council and city officials for clarifications.

Duff stated that since the state in acquiring right of way land for the freeway would assume any liens on properties it acquired, property owners losing their lots would not be paying full sewer assessments as well.

Harry Skyrman, Medford attorney representing members of the Earhart family who own a large portion of property in this area, asked several questions and stated that the Earharts should have a voice in deciding the sewer route across their property.

Paul Rynning, county road engineer representing the county court, stated that the court approved of the project since it would serve the county shops and fairgrounds. Two owners of commercial properties in the area agreed a sewer was badly needed.

Duff told the council with respect to the sanitary sewer needs of Eastover terrace that a third alternative for that area had proved unfeasible. Property owners turned down two previous proposals when bids submitted on them proved to be well above the engineer's estimates.

Three Buildings Planned at College

Yreka — Three buildings for the new College of the Siskiyou at Yreka are in sight today following opening of bids last week by the college board.

Construction of the college was in doubt earlier because of the tight budget. Redding Engineering Contractors was low bidder at \$101,967 for the three main buildings. D. L. Enloe, Mt. Shasta, was apparent low bidder at \$4,086 for the drilling of a well.

The board's estimate for the construction had been \$100,000, but Dr. M. J. Green-shields, college president, calculated that the district could get by during the 1958-59 and 1959-60 fiscal years with \$115,000 cost and be able to equip the school on a minimum basis.

The low bid was accepted subject to approval of the architect, Mario J. Ciampi, San Francisco, who will be asked to reduce the footings specified for the buildings. The district's building inspector told the board that the proposed buildings were "over-engineered" for the footings by Ciampi's consulting engineer.
