

# Hopes High for Sharpened Fan Interest in PC League

Hopes for sharpened fan interest were high today as action in the Pacific Coast league was renewed for the 57th consecutive year.

League President Leslie O'Connor has predicted a half-million increase at the turnstiles for 1959 and up and down the far flung circuit there was talk of a wild scramble for the pennant.

Six contests were on tap for the opening including a pair of day-night double-headers. Spokane was at Phoenix, Vancouver at Salt Lake City, Seattle at Sacramento (two games) and Portland at San Diego (two games). The first games of the two double-headers are daylight affairs while the rest will be played under the lights.

League pundits predict a three-way battle for the pennant among Phoenix, Spokane and San Diego. But almost any of the other clubs—all of whom are expecting additional big league assistance—could make a strong flag bid.

The spotlight tonight will be in Phoenix for the Giant-Spokane contest. The Indians are a farm club of the Los Angeles Dodgers and are loaded with promising talent along with power-hitting Steve Binko, the scourge of the PCL in 1956 and 1957.

Last season, Phoenix won the pennant while the Indians finished sixth. The Giants seem to have lost some of their pitching and some of their power while Spokane appears greatly improved.

San Diego, a second place finisher last season and the third member of the predicted powers, has a veteran cast and if the older players hold up the Padres could win it all.

With the three-way battle for the pennant predicted, and managers of the other clubs predicting first division finishes, league officials are hopeful the PCL will get back on the solid footing it knew before Hollywood, Los Angeles and San Francisco passed from the scene following the 1957 season.

Slump Last Year  
Last year, with the newly structured league, attendance was a disappointing 1,500,000, the lowest in many seasons.

Six of last season's managers have been returned to the fold. They are John (Red) Davis at Phoenix, Tommy Heath at Portland, Larry Shepard at Salt Lake City, George Metkovich at San Diego, Bobby Bragan at Spokane and Charlie Metro at Vancouver.

Bob Elliott is replacing Sibby Sisti at Sacramento which is under operation of a citizens committee which recently purchased the club. Freddy Hutchinson, hardly a newcomer to the PCL, is taking over the helm at Seattle.

## San Francisco Fans Change Attitude on Willie Mays

San Francisco —UPI— One year has brought about a big change in the affections that pass between the fans of San Francisco and the one-and-only Willie Mays.

Last year the West Coast baseball fans, fed up to the hilt with stories about the super-man called "the greatest player of the generation," expected Willie to hit a home run every time he came to the plate.

When he went into a slump and failed to hit for a few games, they booed him when he left them stranded on bases.

"But I'm sure we'll get along better this year," says Willie. "I know I understand them better and they know that they can't expect miracles from me."

Mays clouted at a .347 clip last year, was runner-up for the National league batting crown. He smashed 29 home runs and knocked in 96 runs.

Additionally, he performed near miracles in the outfield. But the fans didn't appreciate this. Willie had started the first few games at a tremendous clip and was batting around the .400 mark for the first month. Then he slumped and levelled off to the .347 average.

So they turned around and voted rookie Orlando Cepeda, a fine ball player to be sure, as the team's "most valuable player." Cepeda batted .312, knocked in 96 runs and hit 25 homers.

"Expecting miracles" was exactly the situation in the stands last year when Willie played. They thought he should run up the walls to catch flies that were going for home runs; they expected him to knock in a run every time.

They had been fed so many stories of Willie's prowess that they had built him up, in their own minds, as a sort of super-god.

And with the "super-god" worshipped over, Willie thinks that there will be less pressure on him and he'll have another fine season.

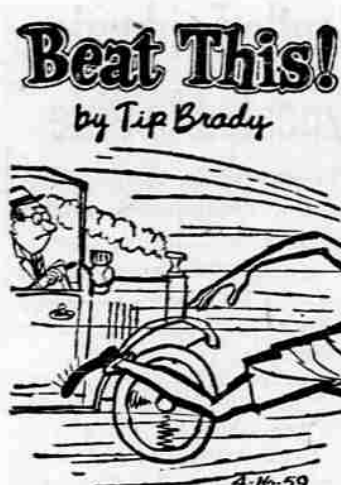

### OSC Faces Washington

Corvallis —UPI— Oregon State's track squad meets the Washington Huskies at Seattle Saturday. The Beavers coped an easy win over Idaho last week.

The squad of coach Sam Bell will be the underdogs, but the return of broadjumper Darrel Horn may give the Oregon State team a slight edge in that event. Horn has been nursing a pulled leg muscle since his showing in the northern division relays when he jumped 25 feet, 5 1/4 inches.

Two Huskies and two Beavers who hold dual meet records will be on hand. Terry Tobacco, Washington, holds the 440 record of :48.3 set in 1957, and teammate Jack Larson did the mile last year in 4:10.4 at Corvallis.

Oregon State's Wayne Moss went 6 feet 4 3/4 inches in the high jump in 1956 and Cliff Cordy shattered the 880 mark at 1:52.9 a year ago.

The last time Oregon State defeated Washington in a track meet was in 1949 at Corvallis when the Beavers edged through 66-65. OSC has won only twice since the two teams began competition in 1924. The other victory was in 1939. Last year's event saw Washington win 84-47.

### Lane Takes On Busso Tonight

Hollywood —UPI— Lightweight contenders Kenny Lane and Johnny Busso—each insisting he's the heir-apparent to aging champion Joe Brown—meet in a nationally televised 10-rounder tonight at Hollywood Legion stadium.

Top-ranked Lane, who lost a hairline decision to Brown in a title fight last July, is a 10-7 choice. But fourth-rated Busso, who upset Brown in a non-title bout and then lost a rematch with the crown at stake, scoffs at the odds-makers.

Matchmaker Jackie Leonard has offered Brown a \$40,000 guarantee to defend this summer against the winner. Manager Jack (Doc) Kearns, Lane's pilot, says he'll assure Brown a \$75,000 purse if Lane beats Busso.

New York —UPI— Clyde Beatty, who walked into a cage, full of lions and tigers with the aplomb of a man in the Easter parade, once was asked whether there was anything he feared.

"Yes," he replied, "lions and tigers."

And that's the way it is with pink-cheeked, blue-eyed Jim Rathmann, one of the world's top auto racing daredevils.

Mild-mannered Jim is the man who last June won the Miglia de Monza in Italy with a world record average of 166,788 miles per hour, which means speeds of 195 miles an hour on the straightaways; has driven 3,870 competitive miles at Indianapolis and currently is looking forward to his 10th ride in the famed 500 on Memorial Day.

Jim's afraid of automobiles. "Don't let anybody tell you that they aren't scared as they wait for the start of a race," he says quietly. "You think of everything that could happen and you've got those butterflies real bad until they cut you loose and the race is on. After that you're too busy to be scared."

Jim and his brother, Dick, who is three years his senior, are known as The Racing Rathmanns. But in this case it was the elder brother who followed in the younger's footsteps.

"I started when I was 17," says Jim, who is 30 now. "At first it was hot-rodding and then I just graduated into midlets and big cars. Dick started two years after I did."

His brother, you may recall, was involved in the first lap pile-up at Indianapolis last year which claimed the life of handsome Pat O'Connor. Jim was running 15th at the start and whizzed past his brother's battered car in fifth position after that spectacular crash.

"Man, was I worried," he said. "I knew it was Dick's car and it was several laps before my pit signalled me that he was all right. But you have to keep right on going anyhow, even at a moment such as that."

Jim will drive Sunday in the 100-mile Indianapolis Car event at the Trenton, N. J. Speedway in his final race before heading for Indianapolis. Meanwhile, and until the Indianapolis event is over, he admits to being "afraid of everything and everybody."

"The slightest accident or mishap can put you out of the 500," he explains.

### Trains Seriously

Like three years ago when his brother had qualified for the Indianapolis race. Three days before the event, Dick drove into downtown Indianapolis, backed into an alleyway to turn around and was attacked by a gang of young hoodlums. One threw a brick and Rathmann was struck on the eye. It required 13 stitches and scratched him from the race.

Jim trains assiduously for the 500, working every night

with a special weighted driving wheel to strengthen his arms and watching his diet. You can imagine how demanding it is of the driver when you consider that in the 500 he will wear out nine special Firestone racing tires, enough rubber to carry a passenger car 50,000 miles. But while he has to be an iron man on May 30, until then he'll treat himself with the caution of a hypochondriac.

"I'm scared I'll get hurt," he said. "And I'll stay that way until we barrel into the first turn."

Burdette clicked for his second straight triumph on Thursday when he pitched the unbeaten Braves to a 7-3 decision over the Phillies. He limited Philadelphia to six hits while collecting two of Milwaukee's 11 hits himself.

Robin Roberts started for the Phils but the Braves clinched their fourth straight win with a four-run rally off loser Jack Meyer in the eighth. Eddie Mathews and Ed Bouchee hit homers.

The Dodgers dealt the nose diving Cardinals their fifth loss in six starts, 7-6, and the Cubs crushed the Giants, 11-3, only other National league games scheduled.

In the American league, the Orioles handed the Yankees their first defeat of the campaign, 7-4; the Athletics defeated the White Sox 6-0, and the Senators topped the Red Sox, 7-5. The first-place Indians were idle as were the last-place Tigers.

That trick left field screen at Los Angeles coliseum got quite a workout as rookie Ron Fairly, Don Demeter and Jim Baxes each hit homers over it for the Dodgers and Ken Boyer popped one over for the Cards. St. Louis Manager Solly Hemus helped tie a major league record by using eight pinch hitters, including himself in the fifth inning and set a major league mark for a nine-inning game by using a total of 25 players.

Commit Five Errors  
Five errors by the Giants helped hand the victory to the Cubs. Second Baseman Darryl Spencer committed three of the miscues, including two on the same play in the ninth when the Cubs scored seven runs.

Billy Gardner's triple with the bases loaded in the eighth inning snapped a 4-4 tie and produced Baltimore's first victory of the season after three losses.

Ned Garver shut out the White Sox on five hits and Kansas City was in command from the second inning when Frank House belted a two-run homer off Early Wynn.

Back-to-back homers by rookie Bob Allison and Norm Zauchin highlighted a four-run rally in the Senators in the fourth inning and Reno Bertioa produced the winning runs with a base-loaded single in the eighth.
