

Tornado, Cavemen Win Series In Southern Oregon Baseball

Medford high, helped by the booming bats of Lowell Dean and Jerry Anderson in the main game of the day, and Grants Pass, spurred by Frank Sprinkle in the counting fracs, swept doubleheaders on Medford diamonds Friday to stay unmarred in Southern Oregon conference baseball.

Medford's Black Tornado topped Ashland 6 to 4 in the opener to record its second triumph in official league standings and survived a last inning Grizzly threat for a 12 to 10 decision in the non-loop second game.

The Cavemen made it three victories in the conference tabulation by blanking Crater 12 to 0 in the Friday starter at Cheney field. Grants Pass followed up with a 7 to 3 verdict in the five-inning kings-tilt.

Six-Hitters

Dennis Barr for Medford and Alan McKinnis for Ashland each pitched a six hitter in the first game on the senior high field. Barr whiffed 10 batters and walked three while McKinnis fanned four and free-passed the same number.

Lowell Dean drove three of the Medford runs with a three-bagger to the tennis court in the first inning and Anderson smashed a two run homer in the third. Dean's triple came after the bases had been filled by Ken Durkee on a single, Ray Kono-pasek on an error and Calvin Dean on a base on balls. Lowell then tallied on a dropped fly ball.

Anderson's roundtripper was after a walk to Lowell Dean. The grounder rolled to the tennis court back of left field and Andy's cause was helped when outfielder Dave Jackson tumbled as he moved over in an effort to make a play for the ball.

Ashland scored first in the mix on two errors, a sacrifice by Brad Gettling and a hit by Bob Johnson. In the third panel the Grizzlies tabulated on a walk, single by Phil Tucker and an error. Two Ashland runs came home in the fourth on safeties by Dennis Johnson and Steve Harris, a sacrifice fly by Larry Schmalz, a fielder's option and a base on balls.

Jerry Anderson made two fine throws to the plate from center field but McKinnis barely beat out one and the ball on the second heave took a high bounce that catcher Bob Pond could not handle. Harley Dickerson scored on this play but Harris, also trying to come home was hot-boxed and put out.

Next action for the Eagles, who now boast a 6-4 season record will be a non-league tilt against Jacksonville at Eagle Point on Tuesday afternoon. Jacksonville won 10-5 in an earlier meeting.

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Durkee, with two singles, was the only one with more than one hit in the game.

Triples were knocked by Lowell Dean and Pat McLaughlin for Medford and Bob Johnson, Jim Doster and Schmalz for Ashland in the free scoring second game. Johnson hit three for three and for Medford Bob Quinney had two singles, one a fly which dropped in back of the pitching mound.

Ashland Threatens
Medford went into the last inning leading by an apparently comfortable 12 to 8 but Ashland got two runs over and had the bases loaded before Jim Stewart groundered on a three-two pitch for the final out.

Ashland began the second game scoring in the opening canto on singles by Dennis Johnson and Mike Brewer, Bob Johnson's triple and a walk for three markers. The Tornado came back with three scores in the same panel. Kono-pasek walked and Lowell

EP Dumps Rogue River

Rogue River - The Eagle Point Eagles came from behind here Friday to defeat the Rogue River Chiefs 11-4 in a Rogue League baseball game. The win left the Eagles with a 2-1 league record, while Rogue River has yet to win a league encounter in three times out.

The big blow for the Eagles was freshman Steve Geren's three run homer in the fifth inning, which put the visiting team ahead to stay. Up to the fifth, the Chiefs had dominated the game, committing only two errors and collecting four runs on two hits. These two singles, off the bats of pitcher Vern Laws and outfielder Gene Van Doren, were the first hits of the year for Rogue River in league competition.

The game remained tight until the seventh inning, with the Eagles clinging to the one run lead that Geren's big fifth inning hit, which came with Dick Hertzger and Robert Osborn on base via the walk route, had provided. In the seventh, however, the Eagles started a two out rally which iced the game. A hard ground ball by Jim Nease started things moving when it got by the Rogue River second baseman, and consecutive singles by Bill Pfeiffer, Duane Anderson, Osborn, and Duke Wild accounted for the rest of the six insurance runs.

Pfeiffer, a strong armed sophomore who only Wednesday night had hurled five innings against Prospect, got credit for the win after relieving Nease in the third inning. Laws went the route for Rogue River.

In the second inning the Grizzlies made it 7 to 2 with four runs on Dickerson's single, Doster's triple, a walk and two errors. Medford then put over five runs in the second to knot the game. In the fifth the Ashlanders got their counters on safeties by Bob Johnson and Schmalz and three walks.

Sprinkle had two doubles and a triple in four times up and drove in four runs to lead Grants Pass in its first win over Crater. Gary Hune-cutt homered and singled for GP and Lee Holmes also had two hits. Dick Hayes pitched a three-hitter for the Cavemen, walking none and fanning two. Grants Pass had a total of 11 safe blows in the game. Loyal Higinbotham, Wayne Allen and Jim White singled for Crater.

The Cavemen tallied in groups of four runs. Hune-cutt's long blast, a Sprinkle double, Holmes single and two walks got the markers in the second chukker. In the sixth Ollie Woolsey, Dennis Walker and Hune-cutt singled and Marv Chandler and Sprinkle tripled, and there were a walk and sacrifice. Sprinkle's double, singles by Endicott and Holmes, a dropped third strike, two wild pitches, a fielder's choice and a balk contributed in the seventh.

Bill Anhorn gave up eight hits to GP, walked four and fanned three while John Anhorn yielded three safeties, whiffed two and walked one. Grants Pass had a five-run second inning in the concluding game. Anderson, Walker, Stevens and Cole singled, Rex Benner sacrificed and there were two bases on balls and an error.

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St. Mary's First in C Division Of Hayward Meet; Phoenix Next

Eugene - St. Mary's high of Medford and a neighboring rival, Phoenix, virtually stole the show Friday in opening day contention of the 22nd annual Hayward relays at University of Oregon.

The Crusaders of St. Mary's, picking up three first places and a tie for first and scoring in eight of the 12 events, won the Class C division of the relays with a big total of 48 1/2 points. Phoenix was runner-up in the division with 37 1/9.

Coquille was champion in the Class B skirmishing with 32 points, two more than second place Rainier.

Eagle Point and Rogue River joined St. Mary's and Phoenix in giving southern Oregon flavor to the meet. Eagle Point was sixth in Division B with 21 points and Rogue River seventh in Class C with 14 1/2.

Nine Man Crew

St. Mary's had scored only 17 1/3 points in its two previous trips to the Haywards. But on Friday a squad of nine men for the Crusaders, three seniors, two juniors and four sophomores, took it all.

Coach Bill McKibbin had figured the SM club to do well in the sprint medley with top quartermiler Roger Hout sidelined by a back ailment. But the Crusaders won that

event plus the two-mile relay and the distance medley. In the distance medley Dick Evans turned in a sparkling 4:38 and Gary Kirsch a :52.5 quarter.

Terry Cooper of SM tied for first with four others in the high jump and was third in the javelin. Bob Evans was second in the broad jump and fifth in the spear toss and Carl Michael took second in the shot put and third in the discus.

Korth Busts Mark

Don Korth, Phoenix, smashed one meet record with a javelin throw of 183 feet 1 1/2 inches. Bill Dillree won the high hurdles for the Pirates and the Phoenix shuttle hurdle team was first. The runners-up in Class C also were second in the 440 and two-mile relays. Dan Lumley was fifth in the broad jump for Phoenix and Dillree tied for fifth in the high jump.

Rogue River claimed one first place, Doug Stewart in the discus, and a tie for first place, Art Johanson in the pole vault.

In Class B Eagle Point won the sprint medley and was second in the 440 relay. Dave Huffman of the Eagles was fourth in the pole vault and fifth in the shot put. Mike Hanby, Illinois Valley, tied

first in the pole vault.

Other Records

Two records were broken Friday in Class B. Roy Cox of Scappoose leaped 21 feet 8 inches in the broad jump to erase the old mark of 20-11 1/2. Greg Macy, who was second in the event for Madras, also broke the mark with a leap of 21 feet even.

The other mark came in the shuttle hurdles when a team of Marvin Blaine, Dick Elliott, and Mike Jacobs ran it in 35.9 seconds to lower the previous mark of 36.6 set by Central of Independence in 1957. The trio ran for Reynolds.
