County Health Association Announces Annual Meeting

Jackson County Tuberculosis and Health association will hold its annual meeting and election of officers Friday, April 24, in the Red Cross auditorium on Hawthorne street at 12 noon. The public is invited.

The program will consist of a panel of local physicians

who will discuss the various phases of tuberculosis. Those participating will be Dr. Edward Sickels, Dr. Florian Shasky, Dr. Lawrence Buonocone and Dr. John Brandenburg. Dr. A. Erin Merkel will discuss tuberculosis testing.

The tuberculosis picture is changing as new drugs and techniques are developed, the association points out. The patient no longer faces a prolonged period of bed rest and isolation, but rather most patients are up in a relatively short time. Emphasis is constantly placed on early diagnosis so that the quickest and best treatment can be given.

This is the 42nd annual meeting of the local Tuberculosis and Health association.
