## Annual Hillcrest ACS Tea Large Event

More than 200 valley women attended the annual silver tea held at Hillcrest orchards Friday afternoon for the benefit of the American Cancer society. The Medford Committee of the ACS, which sponsors the tea each year, reports that the attendance was greater than ever before this year. The cooperation of many Valley collectors of antiques, and of the 22 organizations that submitted entries in the flower arrangements contest, made the afternoon a success for the guests, as well as for the committee. The weatherman cooperated, also, in providing a pleasant, sunny day. For the first time in several years, contestants were able to arrange their displays on the wide verandas that surround Hillcrest.

The two women, whose light touch and artistic efforts on flower arranging won the most votes from the guests at the tea, were Mrs. Peter Trim, who won first prize with the arrangement that she entered for the Junior Service League, and Mrs. Myers Jones, who won second prize with her entry for Chapter AA, PEO.

Winning Entry

Mrs. Trim placed an old sideboard against a wall, and hung a century-old picture, loaned to her by Mrs. Bayard Getchell, on the wall above the sideboard. On the sideboard, she arranged a small, fluted, pink and white hobnail glass vase, a pink glass cruet, two white china doves, a gold candleholder with a gold and white candle in it, and a nosegay that she copied from one in the picture. The nosegay was of white lilac, pink rock daphne, pink tulips, Japanese cherry blossoms, and anemones in shades of pink, lavender and purple, with pink and purple ribbons floating from the white dolly that provided the backing for the flowers.

Mrs. Jones also used lilacs and tulips in her bouquet, but she selected her flowers in varying shades of lavender and purple, and arranged them in a 100-year old silver sugar bowl. Her bouquet was placed on a cardtable that was covered by a white, embroidered linen cloth, and she arranged an antique glass and silver cruet set, and a tall silver candlestick, with a purple candle and a black china bird perched in its rim, to dramatize her floral arrangement.

Guests commented on the many original, as well as beautiful, arrangements. Several tables displayed items of Centennial interest along with the lovely flowers, for the theme of the tea this year was the Centennial, 1859 to 1959.

The centerpiece on the tea table was an arrangement of purple and lavender lilacs and tulips, and pink snips and pink tulips; it was the work of Mrs. John Holmer of Central Point. Pink candles in tall silver candelabra, belonging to Mrs. Ralph Thompson, and the antique silver tea services that belong to Miss Elizabeth Burr and Mrs. John S. Day, completed the table decor.

Mrs. L. G. Gentner, assisted by Mrs. Carl Norris, arranged numerous bouquets that were placed in the rooms of the house, and on the verandas. Tea guests complimented the arrangements that had been made by these women who donated their time to the Cancer committee to help with the tea.

Mrs. Ida Wharton was present again this year, donating her time and her culinary knowledge in the kitchen.

Committee members, who served as hostesses, and also some of the guests, wore Centennial gowns, both old and new. Mrs. H. A. Stanley, who poured during the afternoon, wore a black and yellow print with circular flounces, a dress that she remodeled to fit the theme of the afternoon. Luper displayed a rose-point lace dress over blue satin; Mrs. Lewis Ulrich loaned three ensembles that had been purchased in San Francisco in 1880 for the trousseau of her mother, Ella Prim Nickell.

Two christening gowns were shown. One belonged to the great-grandmother of Mrs. E. V. Meyerding; the other, of rosepoint lace, belongs to Mrs. Fred Shere, a pair of 92 year-old shoes, the property of Mrs. Frank Haseltine of Central Point, were displayed.

On display, also, were many old pieces of china and glassware, and some of them handed down from generation to generation, and others purchased as items in a collection. Miss Elizabeth Burr, Mrs. H. A. Stanley, Mrs. N. J. Wilson, Mrs. Charles W. Lemery, Mrs. W. L. Walden, who loaned a handwoven blanket from Sweden, and Mrs. Fred Scheffel, who loaned washstand set of Mason's Ironstone and some old spectacles, were among the contributors.
