Senate Debates Labor Legislation

Washington — (UPI) — The Senate today resumes debate on labor reform legislation amid promises of an all-out effort to strengthen the Kennedy-Ervin bill.

Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark.), chairman of the Senate Rackets Committee, was to spearhead the fight for strong amendment to deal with corruption in the labor-management field.

The bill's sponsor, Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), has predicted his measure will pass the Senate substantially as it was reported out of the Senate Labor Committee. Actual voting will begin Tuesday on some 100 amendments offered last week during three days of debate.

Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.), said Sunday he would vote against the bill in its present form. He called the measure "pantywaist" legislation.

Algerian Rebels Keep Voters Away In Day of Terror

Algiers — (UPI) — Algerian rebels burned one candidate alive and cut off the head of another in a campaign of terror that kept Moslem voters away from the polls Sunday in Algeria's municipal elections.

Nationalist terrorists killed at least 20 persons and injured 67 others in a 48-hour period. French officials announced that balloting on the first day of the week-long district-by-district elections was well below normal.

Simple Treachery
The French army, fighting to offset the rebel attacks, killed 11 nationalists and wounded or captured an indefinite number in counter-raids in rebel-infiltrated districts.

Paratrooper Gen. Jacques Massu, commander of the Algiers region, broadcast a radio appeal to the voters saying, "To abstain is to betray the army. It is pure and simple treachery."

Massu's words had little effect as the rebels turned Sunday into Algiers' bloodiest election day in history.

Terrorist bombs killed two persons and injured 20 others in Algiers in the first such attacks in the heart of the capital since August, 1957.

Another rebel bomb outside a polling place in Constantine, Algeria's third largest city, killed two persons and injured 39 others, many of them women and children.

Candidates Seized
In La Barbinas, near Setif, a rebel band seized all the Moslem members of a candidate slate. They cut off the head of the chief candidate and beat the others severely before letting them go.

Other rebels fatally burned Abouella Baoudi, chief of the list of Moslem candidates in Tizi N'Bechar, also in East Algeria, in his home.

The new terrorist offensive was aimed at President Charles de Gaulle's plan to guide Algeria toward peace by democratic reforms.

Joan Crawford's Husband Found Dead in Bed

New York — (UPI) — Alfred N. Steele, 57, husband of actress Joan Crawford, died at his home here Sunday. Steele joined the Pepsi-Cola Company in 1949 as a first vice president and built that firm into a multi-million-dollar concern. He and Miss Crawford were wed in a Las Vegas elopement four years ago.

Miss Crawford found Steele dead in his bed when she awoke Sunday morning in the couple's penthouse apartment.

The couple had just returned from a six-week business trip across the country and had planned to leave today for a 10-day vacation in Jamaica.

A family spokesman said Steele had had no hint of illness and apparently suffered a heart attack in his sleep.

Unusually Tired
However, Miss Crawford told friends her husband had complained of being unusually tired when he retired at midnight Saturday.

Steele's death probably will strengthen Miss Crawford's position as a large stockholder in the Pepsi-Cola Company. She held considerable and she is expected to inherit stock before marrying Steele.

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Truman Birthplace State Monument

Lamar, Mo. — (UPI) — Former President Harry S. Truman's birthplace — a small, white frame cottage in this little southwest town of 4,000 — was a state monument today. Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) said the United Nations, Point Four and the Marshall Plan also were monuments to Truman.

Truman listened to it all Sunday, watched the more than 4,000 persons gathered for the dedication, then remarked:

"They have called me a statesman here. But do you know what a statesman is? He's a dead politician. I'm a politician and expect to stay one."

It was the first time Truman had visited his birthplace in 15 years.

Along with Symington at the birthplace enshrinement were Walter Reuther, president of United Auto Workers, who presented the cottage's deed to Missouri Gov. James T. Blair Jr., and three Democratic members of Missouri's congressional delegation, Reps. William Randall, William Hull and Richard Bolling.

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Panama Braces For Invasion Try by Yacht

Panama City — (UPI) — Invasion-jitters Panama looked nervously to sea today for the yacht Nola reported cruising offshore with Roberto Arias, former Panamanian ambassador to Britain, his wife, British ballerina Dame Margot Fonteyn, 39, and a supply of arms.

Minister of Justice Max Heurtematte said the government had received reports the Nola, a fishing launch, was involved recently in the raising of a sunken arms cache of rifles, revolvers, machineguns and grenades 15 miles outside the Pacific entrance to the Panama Canal.

Plans to Capture Port
The report came from the crew of a shrimp boat who told the government they had helped the Nola raise the sunken launch. Heurtematte said the fishermen reported Arias, 40, son of former President Harmonio Arias, had planned to capture the port of Chorrera.

Heurtematte dispatched national guard units to Chorrera but no attack occurred.

The government announced last week that rebel expeditionary force assembled in Cuba planned a landing attempt to coincide with the arrival of the duke of Edinburgh, husband of Queen Elizabeth of Britain.

The duke arrived Sunday night aboard the royal yacht Britannia on his world tour but no attack occurred and the government went ahead with an official reception.

Miss Fonteyn, who had been invited to the reception, did not appear.

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Nixon Expected To Have To Fight For Nomination

Washington — (UPI) — Republican National Chairman Thurgood B. Morton has said he assumes Vice President Richard M. Nixon will have to fight on the convention floor for the GOP presidential nomination.

Morton expressed his views Sunday in a meeting with Sen. Kenneth B. Keating (R-N.Y.). Keating disagreed and indicated he though Nixon would have the nomination sewed up before the convention.

The Republican chairman said he was confident the party's standard bearer in 1960 would be elected president.

Asked for Guess
Keating asked Morton for his guess about chances for a convention fight such as developed in 1952 between the late Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio and then Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

"I assume there will be; I don't know," Morton replied. "I should think you'd be in a better position to comment on that."
